J&K: MORE THAN 200 PEOPLE RESCUED IN KATHUA AMID FLOOD DAMAGE

Diary Times Desk : More than 200 people have been rescued so operations underway in the aftermath of heavy flooding in Jammu division's Kathua district, a police officer said. On Saturday, Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Saxena told reporters, "...DGP nat has detailed Nalin Prabhat done inspection of border arrangements. He was our first senior officer to visit after the floods... We had a floods... PM MODI RAISED CROSS-BORDER TERRORISM IN TALKS WITH XI JINPING: **MEA**



Diary Times Desk: Prime Minister Narendra Modi raised the issue of cross-border terrorism in his bilateral meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping earlier today, Foreign secretary Vikram Misri said on Sunday.

PM Modi underlined the fact that cross-border terrorism impacts both India and China and that it is important for the two countries to support each other in combating the issue, Misri said during a special briefing. "Cross-border terrorism was mentioned by the Prime Minister as a priority. He did underline the fact that this is something that impacts both India and China, and that it's important, therefore, that we extend understanding and support to each other as both of us combat cross-border terrorism," Misri said.

"I would, in fact, like to say that we have received the understanding and cooperation of China as we have dealt with the issue of crossrrorism in the context of the ongoing SCO Summit," he added.

Modi, on his first visit to China in seven years to attend the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Summit in Tianjin, met Xi for the second time since the two sides agreed last October to end a military standoff on the Line of Actual Control (LAC) which began in April-May 2020. The face-off took bilateral ties to their lowest point since the 1962 border war.

The foreign secretary said that the India-China boundary issue was also discussed in the bilateral meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping earlier today.

During their talks, Modi underlined the need for peace and tranquillity on the border areas for continued and smooth development of bilateral relations, Misri said. "The boundary issue also figured in the discussions. Both leaders took note of the successful disengagement last year and the maintenance of peace and tranquillity in the border regions since then," Misri said while briefing the



Diary Times Desk: Known for his light hearted banter both in and out of the courtroom, senior Supreme Court judge Justice Vikram Nath on Saturday said the 'stray dog" case has made him famous in civil society across the world.

A special three-judge bench headed by Justice Vikram Nath on August 22 modified the August 11 order of a two-judge bench that prohibited the release of captured stray dogs from shelters in Delhi and neighbouring areas.

Speaking at a regional conference on human-wildlife conflict organised by the National Legal Service Authority (NALSA) in Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala, Justice Nath said he was grateful to Chief Justice of India BR Gavai for assigning him the

"For a long time, I have been known in the legal fraternity for my odd jobs, but I am also grateful to stray dogs for giving me also grateful to stray dogs for giving me recognition not only in this country but in the entire civil society across the world. And I am grateful to our Chief Justice for assigning me this case," Justice Nath, who is in line to be the Chief Justice of India in 2027, said. He said he recently attended a summit, where lawyers, including the president of the lawyers' association, asked him questions about the stray dog

"I am also getting messages that, apart from dog lovers, dogs are also giving me blessings and best wishes," he said. Justice Nath-led bench said the dogs can be sterilised, vaccinated and released back into the same area from where they were picked up.

Telangana Chief Minister Revanth Reddy said the Telangana Municipalities and Panchayat Raj Amendment Bills were moved due to the continued pendency of two previously passed bills and a subsequent ordinance with the President of India. This legislative action comes as the state faces a Telangana High Court deadline to hold local elections by September 30.

Speaking in the Legislative Assembly, Mr Reddy launched a sharp attack on the opposition Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS), accusing them of deliberately creating obstacles and spreading "false information" to stall the government's efforts on a crucial social justice issue. He stated that the new bill aims to achieve what the stalled ordinance was intended to do - lift the 50 per cent reservation ceiling, which is a key barrier to implementing the 42 per cent reservation for BCs, "The law brought by (then CM) K Chandrashekar Rao in 2018 has now become an obstacle," the Chief Minister said, referring to the Telangana Panchayat Raj Act. He explained that his government had already passed two separate bills-one for reservations in education and jobs and another for local bodies-and sent them to the Governor

'89 LAKH COMPLAINTS IGNORED': CONGRESS DEMANDS THAT SIR BE CONDUCTED AGAIN IN BIHAR



Diary Times Desk: The Congress party on Sunday intensified its criticism of the Election Commission and demanded that the Special Summary Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in Bihar be conducted again. Senior party leader Pawan Khera, while addressing a press conference in Patna, claimed widespread irregularities in the process and accused the poll panel of ignoring nearly 89 lakh complaints submitted by its Booth Level Agents (BLAs).

"Congress demands that SIR be conducted again, as 'large-scale irregularities' cast a doubt on EC's intention," Khera said while speaking at the press briefing in Bihar capital. Khera further claimed that a staggering 89 lakh complaints of irregularities, flagged by the party's Booth Level Agents (BLAs) in Bihar during the SIR, was ignored by the Election Commission.

"The EC keeps getting news planted through its sources that no complaints are coming from any political party. The truth is that the Congress submitted 89 lakh complaints pertaining to irregularities in the SIR to the EC." he said.

Khera alleged that the EC told Congress workers that only individuals could file complaints and not political parties. The SIR exercise in Bihar has already come under fire from the Opposition after several parties in the INDIA bloc have approached the Supreme Court, warning that the current process could disenfranchise millions, particularly from marginalised communities, due to missing names and a lack of proper notice.

'MINI-CLOUDBURSTS' ARE ON THE RISE, SAYS



Diary Times Desk: There is no "increasing trend" 'cloudbursts' over India in recent years and they remain "impossible" to forecast. However, there has been an increase in 'mini cloudbursts', Mrutyunjay Mohapatra, Director-General, India Meteorological Department (IMD), said at a press briefing on Sunday (August 31, 2025).

Rainfall in September – the last official monsoon month – is like in previous months, expected to be 'above normal', or 9% more than the usual average of 16.7 cm. Except for the northeastern States and parts of "extreme" southern India, the rest of the country is expected to receive above-normal monsoon

The three monsoon months so far have seen 'above normal' rainfall, in line with what the IMD had forecast in May, Rain from June 1- August 31 was 6% above the normal 70 cm that is usual for the three months. Northwest India - comprising Uttarakhand, most parts of Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana, Jammu, Kashmir, Rajasthan, and Delhi – saw 26% more rain than what is typical for these three months.

BIG BOY INDIA CONVEYED IT WON'T BE BOSSED ON OIL **PURCHASE': US JOURNALIST SLAMS TRUMP TARIFFS**

Diary Times Desk: An American journalist on Sunday said India is "the big boy", "not a schoolchild", that conveyed that the US cannot boss it over where to buy or not buy oil from, prompting a "cataclysmic moment". He was referring to the tariffs imposed on Indian goods by United States President Donald Trump.

journalist and political American commentator Rick Sanchez called the US decision to impose tariffs on India for purchasing Russian oil is a "disrespectful and ignorant policy".

US President Donald Trump has imposed 25 per cent tariffs on India plus a penalty of 25 per cent additional duties for Russian oil purchase, taking the total levies to 50 per cent.

Rick Sanchez, in an ANI news agency interview, said the US decision on secondary tariffs is "extremely preposterous in the eyes of most people" and amounts to treating India like schoolchildren who need to be told what to do.

CONGRESS GEARS UP FOR TABLING OF KLIS REPORT

In an informal interaction with reporters, Deputy Chief Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka said there was no precedent for permitting the Opposition to give presentations in the Assembly.

HOME MINISTER SHAH VISITING J-K SOLELY TO ASSESS FLOOD DAMAGE CM OMAR ABDULLAH

Diary Times Desk: Union Home Minister Amit Shah is visiting Jammu and Kashmir to assess the damage caused by flash floods triggered by cloudbursts and record rainfall early this week, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah said on Sunday.

Shah is scheduled to arrive in Jammu later this evening on a two-day tour and is expected to conduct an aerial survey of the flood-hit areas before chairing a high-level meeting at the Raj Bhavan on Monday.

More than 130 people were killed and over 120 injured while 33 remained untraced following cloudbursts, landslides and flash floods in Kishtwar, Kathua, Reasi and Ramban districts since August

The record rainfall on August 26-27 also caused flash floods in low-lying areas across the region, causing widespread damage to public and private infrastructure.

The home minister is solely coming here to assess the situation in the aftermath of the heavy rains.

IN TIANJIN, PM OLI EXPRESSES NEPAL'S "STRONG OBJECTION" TO INDIA-CHINA TRADE THROUGH LIPU LEKH PASS

Diary Times Desk: Prime Minister K. P. Sharma Oli of Nepal became one of the first foreign leaders to meet President Xi Jinping of China on Saturday (August 30, 2025). During the meeting, Mr. Oli highlighted Nepal's "strong objection" to India-China restarting trade through the Lipu Lekh Pass that Kathmandu considers a part of Nepal's sovereign territory, the Embassy of Nepal in Beijing said in a press statement.

"Referring to the recent understanding reached between India and China on border trade through Lipu Lekh Pass, the Rt. Hon. Prime Minister stated that the territory belongs to Nepal and Government of Nepal has registered strong objection on the same," said the press statement. Referring to the discussion between the two teams, Foreign Secretary Amrit Bahadur Rai also reiterated the Nepalese position on the Lipu Lekh Pass and said, "According to the 1816 Treaty of Sugauli, the entire area to the east of Mahakali river is part of the sovereign territory of Nepal."

BEYOND DIPLOMACY: ROBOTS ADD SPARK TO SCO SUMMIT

Diary Times Desk: While world leaders gather in Tianjin to discuss weighty matters of security and cooperation at the SCO Summit, the real stars of the media centre aren't diplomats in dark suits — but robots.

From ice-cream vendors with mechanical arms to calligraphy artists wielding brushes with surprising elegance, a fleet of futuristic helpers has turned the media hub into something straight out of science fiction.

At one counter, a robot in a crisp white shell carefully swirled vanilla ice cream into cones, its precision drawing smiles from weary journalists. Nearby, a delivery robot rolled silently across the hall, dodging camera tripods and hurried reporters as it dropped off bottles of water.

Another desk had a resident host — "Xiaohe", a multimodal interactive robot. Equal parts receptionist and guide, Xiaohe greets visitors with a bow, answers questions and even cracks a joke or two in three languages — English, Mandarin and Russian.

US TRADE WAR, INDIA-CHINA TIES LOOM LARGE AT SCO SUMMIT IN TIANJIN



Diary Times Desk: Russian President Vladimir Putin and Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi are among the more than 20 world leaders attending the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation summit, which is now the world's largest regional grouping by population.

The Beijing-backed bloc will convene on Sunday and Monday in the northern Chinese city of Tianjin, bringing together a diverse range of power brokers from across Asia, Europe and the Middle East. Founded by China, Russia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan,

EU IS DIVIDED ON GAZA ISSUE: EUROPEAN COMMISSION VICE PRESIDENT KALLAS

Diary Times Desk: The European Union remains divided when it comes to Gaza, Vice-President of the European Commission, Kaja Kallas said after the informal meeting of the bloc's foreign ministers in Copenhagen, as per EuroNews.

Kallas said the division is negatively affecting the global credibility of the EU, and expressed disappointment about not being able to reach unity among ministers. "If you ask personally how that feels, that I'm the face that is to blame, that we don't have a decision, then it's hard. It's very hard," Kallas said, as quoted by EuroNews.

"It's clear that member states disagree on how to get the Israeli government to change course. The options are clear and remain on the table. We have presented the options paper. But the problem is that not all EU member states are on board." Kallas added.

Kallas said that member states still have no agreement on plan to suspend free trade with Israel as part of the EU-Israel Association Agreement. Some countries expressed their opposition, including Germany and Hungary, while Denmark, currently holding the rotating presidency, signalled it would support the suspension.

CHINA'S FACTORY ACTIVITY CONTRACTS IN AUGUST DESPITE EXTENSION OF TRADE TRUCE WITH US

Diary Times Desk: China's factory activity contracted in August, marking five consecutive months of decline, according to an official survey released Sunday, after a trade truce between the US and China was extended for another 90 days.

China's purchasing managers index in the manufacturing sector rose from 49.3 in July to 49.4 in August, indicating the decline slowed from the previous month, the National Bureau of Statistics said. PMI is measured on a scale from 0 to 100, where 50 marks the cutoff between expansion and contraction.

The indices measuring manufacturing, new orders and raw material inventory edged up in the sector. But the index measuring employment saw a slight drop.

The survey results came weeks after US President Donald Trump extended a pause in sharp hikes in import duties for 90 days. But uncertainty over tariffs on exports to the US is still looming over the world's second-largest economy. This compounds the pressures on China's economy, from a property sector downturn to a rise in the jobless rate, among other factors.

MODI MEETS MYANMAR MILITARY CHIEF, EXPRESSES 'FAIR ELECTION' **HOPE**

Diary Times Desk: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday (August 31) met Senior General Min Aung Hlaing of Myanmar, on the sidelines of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation Summit in Tianjin and expressed hope that the upcoming elections in the country would be held in a fair and inclusive manner.

Hlaing is the chairman of the State Administration Council of Myanmar – the military junta which is in power in the country. Modi had last met Hlaing in April on the sidelines of the BIMSTEC Summit in Bangkok.

According to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) Modi "expressed the hope that the forthcoming elections in Myanmar will be held in a fair and inclusive manner involving all stakeholders."

"He underlined that India supports a Myanmarled and Myanmar-owned peace process, for which peaceful dialogue and consultation is the only way forward," an MEA statement said.

The MEA said that Modi had reiterated India's readiness to support the developmental needs of Myanmar and noted that India attaches importance to ties with the country as a part of its Neighbourhood First, Act East and Indo-Pacific policies.

'PANDEMIC OF ARMS' AFTER MINNEAPOLIS SCHOOL SHOOTING

Diary Times Desk: Pope Leo XIV has pleaded for an end to the "pandemic of arms" as he made his first public comments on gun control while offering prayers for the victims of the shooting at Annunciation Catholic school in Minneapolis.

The first American pope made his remarks following the August 27 shooting which killed two children and injured 18 others as students and staff gathered for a school Mass.

"Let us plead [to] God to stop the pandemic of arms large and small which infects our world," the Chicago-born pontiff told the crowd in St. Peter's Square following the weekly Sunday Angelus prayer.

Leo, speaking in his native English, said he was offering "prayers for the victims of the tracic shooting during a school Mass in the American state of Minnesota" and the "countless children" who are killed and injured every day.

Leo's predecessor, Pope Francis, condemned the arms industry and warned that the use of guns by civilians to defend themselves had become a "habit." Leo, who was elected in May, has continued to condemn the "logic of weapons" and the arms trade.

US COURT RULING CALLING TARIFF ILLEGAL NOT APPLICABLE TO INDIA, **CLAIMS EXPERT**



Diary Times Desk: The legal battle over US President Donald Trump's reciprocal tariffs has intensified after a federal appeals court ruled that the levies were imposed illegally under emergency powers.

In a 7-4 decision issued on Friday, the US Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit concluded that the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA) was never intended to authorise tariffs. declaring it "illegal".

The ruling upheld an earlier decision by the Court of International Trade in May, which also found the tariffs unlawful. However, the judges stopped short of striking them down immediately, leaving the duties in place while litigation continues.

Trump slapped 50% punitive tariff on India earlier this month for continuous buying of Russian oil. Trade lawyer Mollie Sitkowski of Faegre Drinker Biddle & Reath LLP clarified in a client note that the judgment does not directly apply to India or Brazil, reports Bloomberg.

HAMAS SPOKESMAN ABU OBEIDA KILLED IN GAZA, ISRAEL SAYS

Diary Times Desk: Abu Obeida, the spokesman for Hamas's armed wing, has been killed in an air strike in Gaza City, Israel has said.

Israel's Defence Minister Israel Katz congratulated the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) and Israel's security agency, Shin Bet, for the "flawless execution" in a post on X.

He gave no detail on the time or location of the operation, but the IDF earlier said its aircraft attacked "a key terrorist" in the al-Rimal neighbourhood on Saturday, prompting reports in Israeli media that Obeida had been the target.

Hamas has not confirmed his death. The Palestinian armed group earlier said dozens of civilians were killed and injured in Israeli strikes on a residential building in the district.

Katz warned on Sunday that many more of Obeida's "criminal partners" would be targeted with "the intensification of the campaign in Gaza" - a reference to a recently approved Israeli plan to seize control of Gaza City.

RUSSIA SAYS ITS UNITS DESTROY 21 UKRAINIAN DRONES IN SOUTH, SOUTHWEST

HAMAS CONFIRMS DEATH OF ITS CHIEF MOHAMMED SINWAR MONTHS AFTER ISRAEL SAID IT KILLED HIM



group Hamas confirmed on Saturday the death of its Gaza military chief, Mohammad Sinwar, a few months after Israel said it killed him in a strike in May.

Hamas did not provide details on Sinwar's death but published pictures of him along with other group leaders, describing them as "martyrs".

Mohammad Sinwar was the younger brother of Yahya Sinwar, the Islamist faction's chief, who comasterminded the October 7, 2023, attack on Israel, and whom Israel had killed in combat a year later.

He was elevated to the top ranks of the group after the death of his brother.

His confirmed death would leave his close associate Izz al-Din Haddad, who currently oversees operations in northern Gaza, in charge of Hamas' armed wing across the whole of the enclave.

CHINA'S XI SAYS SCO BEARS 'GREATER RESPONSIBILITY' FOR KEEPING PEACE



Diary Times Desk: The Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) security forum now bears "greater responsibility" for safeguarding regional peace and stability, Chinese President Xi Jinping has told about 20 world leaders he hosted for a summit in northern China's Tianjin.

Xi also underscored the SCO's mission for the development and prosperity of its member states as he hosted and addressed the high-profile gathering at a banquet on Sunday evening.

The ongoing SCO summit shoulders the important mission of building consensus among all parties and stimulating momentum in cooperation, Xi was cited as telling the assembled leaders, Chinese state news agency Xinhua reported.

Among the most notable guests at the two-day summit is Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who is on his first visit to China since 2018 after years of difficult relations in the wake of Indian and Chinese troops clashing in 2020 at a disputed Himalayan border.

Also attending is Russian President Vladimir Putin, who faces an arrest warrant issued by the International Criminal Court (ICC) in 2023 over the war in Ukraine.

China is not a member state of the ICC and is not a party to the Rome Statute that founded it, so the court has no authority in the country.

PUNJAB GUV KATARIA DIALS SEECHEWAL TO REVIEW FLOOD SITUATION IN KAPURTHALA

Rajya Sabha Member Sant Seechewal apprised the Governor of the miserable conditions of the victims and discussed the urgent need for immediate relief and rehabilitation measures.

FLOOD-RAVAGED PUNJAB RECEIVES 74% EXCESS RAIN IN AUGUST, HIGHEST IN 25 YEARS

Diary Times Desk: Flood-ravaged Punjab received 253.7 mm of rain in August, which was not only 74 per cent in excess of normal, but also the highest the state witnessed in the past 25 years, officials said on Sunday. Neighbouring Haryana received 194.5 mm of rain in August against an average of 147.7 mm for the month, marking a 32 per cent increase, they said. According to the meteorological department here, at 253.7 mm, the August rainfall in Punjab was 74 per cent more than the month's normal of 146.2 mm.

"Punjab received deficient rainfall multiple times in the past couple of decades, but this year it recorded the highest rainfall figures for August in the last 25 years," the Met department said.

In August, 18 of Punjab's 23 districts received excess rain, while a few districts like Patiala and Fatehgarh Sahib recorded deficient rainfall.

HOLIDAYS IN PUNJAB SCHOOLS EXTENDED TILL SEPTEMBER 3



Diary Times Desk: Amid the grim flood situation, the Punjab Government has extended holidays in all schools till September 3.

Earlier, the schools were closed from August 27 to August 30.

In a post on X, Education Minister Punjab Harjot Singh Bains stated that in accordance with the directives of Chief Minister Bhagwant Singh Mann, considering the flood situation in Punjab, holidays have been declared in all government/aided/recognised and private schools in the state till September 3.

PUNJAB GOVT'S TIMELY INVESTMENT SAVES ROPAR FROM FLOODS: HARJOT BAINS

Diary Times Desk: The Punjab Government's investment of Rs 15 crore in creating embankments along the Sutlej and its tributaries in Ropar district has paid off, saving the region from severe flooding this monsoon season. This was stated by Minister for Education Harjot Singh Bains while interacting with the public under the 'Sada MLA Sade Vich' programme organised by the AAP party.

Bains said that for the past many years, dozens of villages near Bhakra Dam in Anandpur Sahib constituency of district Ropar used to be severely affected during monsoon rains. However, this time, the Punjab Government under the leadership of Chief Minister Bhagwant Singh Mann paid special attention to flood-prevention by constructing embankments and strengthening the corners of villages located along the Sutlej.

The water level of Bhakra Dam was expected to reach 1,673 feet, but due to timely preventive measures, it remained at 1,672.62 feet. For the first time in 30 years, despite repeated heavy inflow in the Swan river, the villages in Ropar district have not suffered any major damage.

PUNJAB FLOOD SITUATION WORSENS AS RAIN CONTINUES IN MANY DISTRICTS

Diary Times Desk: The Punjab flood situation worsened on Sunday with incessant rain lashing many districts and the Ghaggar and Beas rivers being in spate.

Even the Ravi, which four days back saw 14.11 lakh cusecs of water, has brought most of the water towards Ajnala in Amritsar, inundating many parts of the town and 15 villages. Officials say the situation will improve only once the water starts moving towards Pakistan.

Ajnala MLA Kuldeep Dhaliwal told The Tribune that most of his constituency, located along the international border with Pakistan, has witnessed severe destruction because of the floods. "The Centre should come to the aid of Punjab immediately," he said

Till date, 26 people have died in the devastating floods, including an employee of the irrigation department, who had fallen into the Ravi river last week while trying to open the flood gates at Madhopur barrage. More than 1,000 villages have been affected by the floods caused by the rivers being in spate and because of the controlled release of water from the dam reservoirs.



DESPITE BAN HIMACHAL'S CHAKKI, MAND AREAS PLAGUED BY ILLEGAL MINING

Diary Times Desk: Illegal miners continue to operate with impunity in the Chakki and Mand areas, despite recent efforts by the Nurpur district police to crack down on their activities. The police have reaistered challans and cases against mining mafia and seized their earth-excavating machinery, but this has failed to deter them from extracting minerals from riverbeds in Nurpur, Indora and Fatehpur sub-divisions in the lower Kangra region.

Although the state government has imposed a blanket ban on mining activities in rivers, khuds and other natural water bodies, it has not been effective in stopping the mining mafia. Inquiries reveal that stone crushers in the Chakki River area and Mand area have been using heavy machinery to extract raw materials from the riverbed at night.

The Chakki, Beas and Chhonchh rivers in the lower Kangra region are considered lucrative for miners and illegal mining is a highly profitable business in the area. A recent video clip showing illegal miners extracting raw materials from the Chakki rivulet in Khanni and Lodhwan areas in Nurpur has gone viral, highlighting the brazen nature of these activities.

WOES CONTINUE: NO WATER IN NURPUR TOWN FOR 5TH DAY

Diary Times Desk: Residents of Nurpur town went without piped water supply for the fifth consecutive day on Saturday. However, HPSEBL had restored power supply late on Friday night and the Jal Shakti Department (JSD) was set to restore piped water supply on Sunday morning. According to reports, heavy rain triggered a landslide, damaging water supply pipes of the main Chakki water supply scheme at three different locations near Manuha village in Aundh panchayat.

Besides, the torrential rain that lashed the area on Friday night flooded the pump house of the second water supply scheme for Nurpur town at Letri village. Residents who were expecting piped water supply on Saturday morning were disappointed to find their house taps dry for the fifth day in a row.

DALAI LAMA TO RETURN ON SEPT 1

Diary Times Desk: Tibetan spiritual leader the Dalai Lama will return back to his residence, Chunglakhang Monastery, in McLeodganj on September 1, after spending nearly one-and-a-half months in Leh, Ladakh. However, the scheduled date of coming back to home may be changed by a day or two if the weather is not favourable for incoming flights at Gaggal (Kangra) airport.

He has reached Delhi from Leh on Thursday and will stay there for a couple of days before travelling to Dharamsala. He will go for a medical check up in Delhi as per a routine exercise as he had returned back from a high-altitude area.

After celebrating his birthday in Dharamsala on July 6, the Dalai Lama left for Leh on July 12 by air. During his stay in Ladakh, he travelled to Zanskar, inaugurated the KarGön Mega Summer Symposium, laid the foundation stone of the Zanskar Mönlam Chörten, and gave teachings to more than 21,000 devotees.

SHIPKILA TRADERS LIST DEMANDS AS INDIA, CHINA REOPEN TRADE

Diary Times Desk: As India and China agree to reopen trade through the Shipkila Pass, local traders have called for a revision of the export and import items list to make business more viable. The last batch of traders returned from the Tibet Autonomous Region (TAR) of China on November 30, 2019, following the outbreak of Covid. Trade has remained suspended since then.

Traders have also sought the lifting of the ban on livestock trading, imposed in 2012 due to the absence of guarantine facilities.

Following directives from the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) on resuming border trade, the Kinnaur Deputy Commissioner, who also serves as the Trade Commissioner, has sought suggestions from traders.

"We have asked them to revise the trade list, which has not been changed since 2012, and also to get the expired Import Export Code (IEC) revived since it has lapsed as no trade has taken place after 2019," said Hishey Negi, president of the Kinnaur Indo-China Trade Association.



10 PILGRIMS LOST LIVES DURING MANIMAHESH YATRA: CHAMBA



Diary Times Desk: In the wake of rumours about a large number of deaths of pilgrims headed for Manimahesh Yatra, the Chamba administration released the list of casualties reported in the district since August 24, when the region was battered by heavy rains.

According to report, 10 persons have died in different incidents, while eight others sustained injuries and four remain missing. On August 24, Nirmala Devi went missing after being buried under debris in a landslide at Dugi village in Salooni. The following day, three devotees from Punjab lost their lives due to lack of oxygen. On the same day, Darshana Devi, died after being struck by a shooting stone in Bharmour.


RED ALERT IN HIMACHAL: HEAVY RAINS TO CONTINUE; 666 ROADS, INCLUDING 4 NATIONAL HIGHWAYS, BLOCKED

Diary Times Desk: In an alarming situation, Himachal Pradesh, which has already suffered immense loss of lives as well as properties due to torrential rains, is very likely to witness extreme rainfall in isolated areas, as the State's Meteorological Department has issued red weather warnings for several districts for the next two days.

As per the department, a red alert has been issued for Mandi, Kangra, Sirmaur, Una, Hamirpur and Bilaspur districts for September 1, resulting in a few spells of extreme rain in isolated parts of these districts. Additionally, an orange weather warning has also been issued for Shimla, Kullu, Chamba, Kinnaur and Lahaul and Spiti for September 1 while a yellow weather warning has been issued for Solan.

Red weather warning has also been issued for Chamba, Mandi, Kullu and Kangra districts for September 2 while an orange weather warning has also been issued for Shimla, Una, Bilaspur, Hamirpur, Kinnaur, Lahaul and Spiti and Sirmour districts along with another yellow weather warning for Solan district for the same day.

In view of heavy rainfall, several districts, including Shimla, Solan Sirmaur and Salooni subdivision in Chamba district have announced to keep all the educational institutions closed on September 1.

Indonesia's president cancels


China trip

ndonesian President Prabowo Subianto on Saturday canceled a planned trip to China as days of protests spread further outside the capital Jakarta, with several regional parliament buildings set ablaze

Prabowo had been due to attend a "Victory Day" parade in China on September 3 to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of World War Two following Japan's formal surrender

The protests, the first major test for Prabowo's nearly year-old government, began in Jakarta this week over lawmakers' pay and worsened after a police vehicle hit and killed a motorcycle rider

"The president wants to continue monitoring (the Indonesia) situation directly...and seek the best presidential solutions, spokesperson Prasetyo Hadi said in a video statement on Saturday.



Another consideration in canceling the trip was a United Nations General

Assembly session in September, Prasetyo said.

In the light of the protest, short-video app TikTok. which is owned by China's ByteDance, said on Saturday it had suspended its live feature in Indonesia for a few days.

Jakarta had this week summoned representatives of social media platforms, including Meta Platforms Inc and TikTok, and told them to boost content moderation because disinformation had spread online. The government says that such disinformation has spurred protests against it.

Regional parliament fires

Earlier on Saturday, protesters caused fires at regional parliament buildings in three provinces -West Nusa Tenggara, Pekalongan city in Central Java and Cirebon city in West Java, local media reported.

Local media Detik.com said protesters had looted parliamentary office equipment in Cirebon and police fired teargas to disperse protesters in Pekalongan and West Nusa Tenggara.

Three people were killed on Friday in an arson attack on a parliament building in Makassar, the capital of South Sulawesi province, Indonesia's disaster management agency said.

State news agency Antara said the victims had been trapped in the burning building, and the disaster management agency said two people were injured after jumping out of the building to



Local media outlet metrotynews.com reported one further death from a fire at the Makassar parliamentary building. This could not be independently confirmed.

Protests also occurred on the holiday island of Bali, where tear gas was used against protesters

Local media also reported that a crowd had looted the Jakarta home of Ahmad Sahroni, a lawmaker from the political party NasDem, and taken items including household furniture.

Not all smooth sailing

But they rerouted to Cairns due to bad weather. "The last couple of weeks have been really hard," Jamie told ABC. "Our expectations being crushed when we thought we were going to arrive and then getting hit by storm after storm, just getting knocked back, getting thrown

It followed Lachlan's terrifying man-overboard incident during a night shift when Ewan managed to rescue him.

"A side-on wave came in out of nowhere. I had like a couple of seconds to react and it just hit me," Lachlan told ABC. "Took me right off my feet. I kind of hit the life lines on the starboard side. basically did like a backwards somersault into the water."

Brotherly bond

Ewan, Jamie and Lachlan believe their familial bond was pivotal in their mission.

Despite the extreme challenges, they were able to stay positive, often finding moments of joy in the harshest of times.

"We are able to speak very directly to one another," Jamie previously. "Good communication has been key to this iourney."

Their boat, named Rose Emily in honor of their sister who was lost during pregnancy, is believed to be the fastest and lightest ocean rowing boat ever built, created with ocean rowing legend Mark Slats

The Macleans embarked on the ocean crossing in pursuit of both a world record and the goal of raising £1m to fund clean water projects in Madagascar.

Lion Population

CAUSE FOR CELEBRATION, BUT IT'S ALSO A DEADLY PROBLEM



Chellam is among a group of conservationists who have been urging the government to move some of the lions to Kuno Wildlife Sanctuary, in the central Indian state of Madhya Pradesh. A survey he and other scientists completed three decades ago found it to be a suitable habitat for lion conservation.

Tive-year-old Pulsing Ajnera was playing with his brothers in a field near their home in the western Indian state of Gujarat, when a lion "came out of nowhere," his grieving father told CNN.

*This lion grabbed the child, mv youngest, and left. My family tried everything to rescue him. They threw stones at the lion and a few wooden sticks as well, but (it) dragged him into the jungle, Heera Ajnera said. The boy's body was later recovered

Pulsing was one of seven people in India killed by lions in the year to June 2025, taking the total number of fatal attacks in five years to more than 20. Attacks on cattle have almost doubled during the same period, Gujarat officials told CNN.

Sporting an unmistakable dark mane and unique folds of skin along their bellies, Asiatic lions are slightly smaller than their African cousins. They once prowled the Middle East and Asia but now Gujarat is home to the world's last population of wild Asiatic lions.

The lions were hunted to the brink of extinction in India, before a ban on killing the cats was put in place in Gujarat a century ago. Recent conservation efforts, have seen the state's lion population rise by 30% to 891 in the last five years

Conservationists say a large part of the success stems from a unique human-lion relationship, locals profit from the where presence of lions, and lions are given space to roam. But that symbiotic relationship is being tested as the lion population grows.

have been found in basement parking lots of hotels... on top of people's homes. They are resting on terraces. They're sitting there and roaring," said wildlife biologist Ravi Chellam, the coordinator of conservation network Collaborative.

"The minute a lion moves into human-dominated habitats, the probability (of it attacking humans) just increases," he said. For more than a decade, Chellam and other conservationists have been pushing the Gujarat government to move some lions to a second habitat outside the state

But Gujarat's lions haven't gone anywhere, and their numbers are continuing to grow - creating the potential for conflict - despite a Supreme Court ruling ordering the government to relocate them.

An expanding population

Gir National Park - a 545-squaremile protected area about the size of Los Angeles City - was established in 1965 to protect endangered species, including Asiatic lions. Most of Gujarat's



Asiatic lions now live outside the park's borders, mixing with humans in towns and villages

"But when you have too many animals, they claim space outside of the protected area. and then they start coming into conflict with local (people)," he said.

Bhujwala says India's conservation model was never intended to separate lions from humans, noting that villages are built within national parks.

They all coexisted, and that coexistence. that tolerance, is something which is very unique to India's conservation history," he said.Local people rely on lions to generate tourism income, and in return big cats feed on old cattle abandoned by local herders, wrote Yadvendradev Vikramsinh Jhala, the former dean of Wildlife Institute of India, in an academic paper published last year.

Jhala and his co-authors said the lions also prey on pigs and nilgais - a type of antelope which helps eliminate animals the local farmers consider to be pests.
