VIJAY'S RALLY IN TAMIL NADU

36, INCLUDING 8 CHILDREN, KILLED IN STAMPEDE AT TVK CHIEF VIIAY'S RALLY



Diary Times Desk: A massive tragedy unfolded at Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK) chief Vijay's rally in Tamil Nadu's Karur district, where 34 people were killed in a stampede. Officials said 46 people were injured.

Police sources told NDTV some people had fainted at a point where large numbers had surged forward, triggering the stampede. A senior police officer estimated that "at least 30,000 people had gathered" at the venue, where Vijay was scheduled to speak after his earlier rally in Namakkal.

His arrival, however, was delayed by more than six hours, by

The Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) has sought a report from the Tamil Nadu government on the incident, sources said

Tamil Nadu Chief Minister MK Stalin, who is coming to Karur tonight, in a post on X expressed shock over the tragedy

"Reports from Karur saddening. I have ordered urgent treatment for those who fainted, and instructed the health minister, collector and former minister Senthil Balaji to help. The ADCP [senior police officer] has been tasked to restore normalcy. Minister Anbil Mahesh has been directed to extend help on a war footing. I appeal to the public to cooperate with the police," Mr Stalin said. Prime Minister Narendra Modi said the unfortunate incident during the political rally in Karur is deeply saddening.

"My thoughts are with the families who have lost their loved ones. Wishing strength to them in this difficult time. Praying for a swift recovery to all those injured," he said.

After the incident, Vijay went to the airport in Trichy and took a flight to Chennai. He declined to give a comment to the media and hid

his face from cameras at the airport.

Citing safety concerns, the police had imposed 23 conditions for TVK rallies, including a ban on joining convoys, public receptions, and advisories for pregnant women, the elderly and the differently abled to follow events online.

Courts, too, had made strong observations about public safety and the actor-politician's responsibility even as TVK alleged bias against

the party. Despite Vijay's repeated appeals, most of these conditions were openly defied by his supporters. Many had brought in children and infants

PM MODI UNVEILS DEVELOPMENTAL PROJECTS WORTH OVER RS 50.000 CRORE IN ODISHA

Diary Times Desk: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday laid the foundation stone and inaugurated development projects worth over Rs 50,000 crore across telecommunications, railways, higher education, healthcare, skill development and rural

The prime minister laid the foundation stone for Rs 11,000 crore infrastructure expansion projects in eight IITs - Tirupati, Palakkad, Bhilai, Jammu, Dharwad, Jodhpur, Patna and Indore - in order to increase 12,000 seats over the next four years.

PM Modi laid the foundation stone for the construction of a rail flyover between Sambalpur

City and Sarala at an investment of Rs 273 crore, and for the setting up of a semiconductor and electronic system design and manufacturing (ESDM) park in collaboration with IIT-Bhubaneswar.

The PM launched the MERITE (Multidisciplinary Education and Research Improvement in Technical Education) scheme, designed to improve quality, equity, research, and innovation in 275 state engineering and polytechnic institutions across the country.

He also launched Odisha Skill Development Project Phase-II, which will establish world skill centres at an investment of Rs 1,979 crore in Sambalpur and Berhampur, covering emerging sectors such as agritech, renewable energy, retail, marine, and hospitality. Five ITIs will be upgraded into 'Utkarsh ITIs', 25 ITIs will be developed as Centres of Excellence, while a new Precision Engineering Building will provide advanced technical training.

ARRESTED PAK INTEL **OPERATIVE LINKED TO SONAM** WANGCHUK: LADAKH TOP COP

He also informed about the arrest of a Pakistan Intelligence Operative (PIO) linked to Mr Wangchuk's arrest and clues regarding the activist being in touch with

"We also arrested a Pakistan PIO in the recent past who was in touch with him and was reporting back across. We have a record of this. He (Mr Wangchuk) had attended a Dawn event in Pakistan. He also visited Bangladesh. There is a big question mark on him," said DGP Jamwal in response to an NDTV question. Later speaking to NDTV's Aditya Raj Kaul about the PIO, he said, "We found somebody who was sending things across. We have put that person on surveillance." Sonam Wangchuk has been charged

under the stringent National Security Act (NSA) that provides for long preventive detention without any scope for bail. Sources suggest he has been shifted to a facility in Jodhpur, Rajasthan. A curfew has been imposed in Leh, and internet services have been snapped to stop the spread of misinformation.

WHO IS PETAL GAHLOT, INDIAN DIPLOMAT WHO GAVE SHARP RESPONSE TO PAKISTAN PM AT UN



Diary Times Desk: Petal Gahlot, First Secretary at India's Permanent Mission to the United Nations, has emerged as the face of the country's strong diplomatic pushback after she issued a scathing reply to Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif. Exercising India's right of reply at the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), Gahlot dismantled Sharif's assertions over Operation Sindoor and the tensions between the two nuclear-armed neighbours. As per reports, she charged that the Pakistani PM had "once again glorified terrorism."

IN BIHAR MAHABHARAT FOR WOMEN'S VOTE, A TALE OF DIFFERING STRATEGIES



Diary Times Desk: In the heart of Bihar, as the sun sets, casting golden hues across the green fields, a different kind of light is emerging - one that illuminates the evolving role of women in the political landscape. The forthcoming Assembly elections are poised to be a battleground not only for parties but also for ideologies, and one issue that is set to dominate is women's empowerment and welfare. Call it the Mahabharat for the 'mahila' vote in Bihar.

In what was partly a coincidence and partly fierce electoral competition, Congress MP Priyanka Gandhi reached Patna and Motihari on Friday, the same day Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched the Mukhyamantri Mahila Rozgar Yojana via videoconference from Delhi.

The political landscape suddenly became awash with promises and proclamations for the women of Bihar. The elections have, thus, shifted the focus to what is one of the most pressing issues in contemporary Bihar: women's empowerment in a largely patriarchal

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the main vote getter of the Bharatiya Janata Party, has descended with a promise of a direct transfer of cash. The Mukhyamantri Mahila Rozgar Yojana (brainchild of Chief Minister Nitish Kumar) is not a promise of future gain but an immediate deposit: Rs 10,000 each for 75 lakh women, a sum so big that it feels like a tectonic shift in the poor state's financial landscape. It is a move that bypasses the long, winding road of structural reform for the straight-line immediacy of the bank account, betting that the weight of a rupee in hand is worth more than the promise of a distant institution. It is not surprising, then, that some experts are calling it a "game-changer" and comparing it to similar schemes in Madhya

Pradesh (Ladli Behna) and Maharashtra (Ladki Bahin Yojana).

VOTE FOR DMK IS VOTE FOR BJP, CHARGES TVK CHIEF VIJAY AT NAMAKKAL RALLY



Times Desk: campaign in the western Kongu region for the first time, TVK chief Vijay said a vote for Tamil Nadu's ruling DMK in the 2026 Assembly election is a vote for the BJP and slammed the main opposition AIADMK's alliance with the party as "inappropriate opportunistic."

In his address, Vijay alleged the "DMK family" has underground dealing with the BJP and hence, a vote for DMK is a vote for the BJP and reiterated that the Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam will never make any compromises with the "fascist BJP regime."

"Did they do? he asked, targeting the ruling DMK over its 2021 poll assurances and he listed promises made in chronological order. He asked if promises such as implementing the Old pension scheme for government employees had been operationalised. Hitting out at the main opposition AIADMK for forgetting the ideals of late party matriarch J Jayalalithaa despite often "chanting Amma's name," he said it has forged an inappropriate, and unsuitable alliance with BJP and it is also opportunistic.

The AIADMK claims that such an alliance was for Tamil Nadu's welfare and the TVK will not replicate such an opportunistic political stand.

HARJIT KAUR, HANDCUFFED AND DEPORTED BY US, HAS JUST ONE WISH



Diary Times Desk: Over 30 years ago, when Harjit Kaur moved to the United States with her two sons, she couldn't imagine this day. Originally from Punjab, she was an undocumented immigrant in California; she worked and paid her taxes in the US and diligently marked her attendance to authorities every six months, as required by the law. Fast forward to 2025, the 73-year-old grandmother to five US residents was shackled and sent back to India, after a prolonged custody without food and medicines.

Ms Kaur is yet to come to terms with being uprooted from her family after three long decades in the US. While she's unaware of the reason behind her sudden deportation, the action points to the unrelenting crackdown on immigrants by the Trump administration and a sheer lack of compassion.

Struggling to hold back her tears, she recalled being handcuffed and arrested by the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

'THE UNHOLY NEXUS': CBI RAIDS BUILDERS, FINANCIERS IN KOLKATA, BENGALURU AND MUMBAI OVER ALLEGED HOMEBUYER FRAUD

Diary Times Desk: The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) on Saturday carried out searches at 12 locations across Kolkata, Bengaluru and Mumbai after registering six new cases against builders and officials of financial institutions accused of cheating homebuyers, officials told PTI. The fresh action, which includes the seizure of documents and digital records, comes on the back of Supreme Court directions to investigate a suspected nexus between developers and lenders that allegedly exploited unsuspecting buyers through controversial home loan schemes. INDIA MAY IMPORT US CORN FOR ETHANOL PRODUCTION AS TRADE TALKS ADVANCE

Diary Times Desk: India is exploring the purchase of US corn for ethanol production, along with increased energy imports, as part of fresh proposals in ongoing trade negotiations with the United States. The discussions aim to conclude a bilateral trade agreement (BTA) by this fall.

New Delhi has also pressed Washington to lift the 25 per cent additional tariffs imposed as a penalty for Indian imports of Russian crude oil, which the US claims is funding the war in Ukraine. A report by Economic Times cited an official saying, 'Fresh offers have been made... there is discussion to buy corn for ethanol production.'

US pushes for soybean and corn imports

The US has been encouraging India to increase imports of American soybean and corn. India, however, has resisted, citing concerns over genetically modified (GM) crops entering the food chain. Officials have emphasised that protecting domestic farmers and preventing GM products from entering the market remain key priorities for the Indian side.

In August, India exported goods worth \$6.86 billion to the US, while imports were valued at \$3.6 billion, according to government data.

WEATHER AGENCY PREDICTS RAINFALL DURING 5-DAY DURGA PUJA FESTIVAL IN WEST BENGAL



Diary Times Desk: The Durga Puja festivities may get somewhat dampened as a new low pressure area likely to form over the Bay of Bengal on October 1 would bring rain in many areas during next seven days with downpour at isolated places in some districts of south Bengal, the IMD said on Saturday. The five-day Durga Puja festival is going to commence from September 28 and conclude on October 2, the 'Vijaya Dashami' day. However, the idols are immersed in many places later. The existing depression is very likely to continue to move across south Odisha and Chhattisgarh and weaken gradually into a well marked low pressure area by Sunday.

MUMBAI-AHMEDABAD BULLET TRAIN TO BE OPERATIONAL BY 2029, SURAT-BILIMORA SECTION READY BY 2027

Diary Times Desk: The Mumbai-Ahmedabad bullet train will be operational by 2029, and the 50-km stretch of India's first high-speed rail corridor between Surat and Bilimora in Gujarat is expected to open by 2027, Union Railways Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said on Saturday. Vaishnaw inspected the under-construction Surat station, including track installation and the first turnout. According to him, people will be able to cover the distance between Mumbai and Ahmedabad in two hours and seven minutes on the bullet trains, against nine

"Overall progress of the first bullet train project is very good. The first 50 km section between Surat and Bilimora will be open by 2027. By 2028, the Thane-Ahmedabad section will be commissioned, and by 2029, the full Mumbai-Ahmedabad line will open," the minister said. Vaishnaw highlighted the use of modern technology to ensure safety, including vibration absorption mechanisms along the track and special safety features to handle high winds and earthquakes.

SETBACK FOR HIMANTA AS BJP MANAGES ONLY FIVE SEATS IN BODO TERRITORIAL REGION POLLS

Diary Times Desk: In a setback to Assam chief minister Himanta Biswa Sarma, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) fared badly in the autonomous council elections of the Bodo Territorial Region (BTR).

Sarma, who led the party's campaign through marathon rallies, had gone ahead with the polls without continuing the ruling alliance of the BJP with the United People's Party-Liberal (UPPL) in the hope of dissociating itself from the anti-incumbency faced by the local party. He had told reporters that whichever of the two major local parties would win the elections, BJP would tie up with it, thereby hinting at a fractured mandate of the elections, held on September 22.

However, the counting of votes of the elections for the 40 constituencies showed that the opposition Bodo People's Front (BPF) has swept the polls, cornering 29 seats, while the other local party with which BJP had an alliance, the UPPL, could pocket only seven seats.

BJP itself could win only five seats. The voting of the Council elections was held through paper ballot. Counting began on September 26.

Both the posts offer a salary up to Rs. 1,12,400. Interested candidates can apply for the posts on the official website of the commission – ssc.gov.in.

Applications are invited for Sub-Inspector General Duty (GD) in Central Police Armed Forces (CAPFs) and Sub-Inspector (Executive) (Male, Female) in Delhi Police. Both come with a pay range of Rs. 35,400 to Rs. 1,12,400.

10 per cent of the total vacancies in Central Armed Police Forces (CAPF) are reserved for Ex-Servicemen.

5 DEAD AS SPEEDING THAR LOSES CONTROL, HITS DIVIDER ON GURUGRAM HIGHWAY

Diary Times Desk: Five people died and one was left severely injured after a speeding Thar they were in lost control and crashed into a divider on the National Highway in Gurugram on Saturday morning. The incident took place around 4:30 am near the highway's exit number 9.

According to officials, the group of six people - three men and three women - had travelled to Gurugram from Uttar Pradesh for some work.

As the driver of the high-speed SUV lost control, it crashed into a divider. Four people died on the spot, and the remaining two were rushed to a nearby hospital - where one of them died. The injured victim, undergoing treatment, is said to be in a critical condition.

The impact of the collision was so severe that Thar was left in a completely mangled wreck.

This is yet another incident involving the Mahindra Thar – which is known for often featuring in reels and short videos. The SUV, in recent times, has been under the spotlight for rash driving and accidents. Last month, a biker died after a speeding Thar hit him in Delhi's Moti Nagar area. Visuals showed the bike completely crushed between the car and a truck. Many cracks could also be seen on the car's windshield.

DELHI ASHRAM BABA WITHDREW OVER RS 50 LAKH AFTER CASE WAS FILED AGAINST HIM



Diary Times Desk : Self-styled godman Swami Chaitanyananda Saraswati, accused of sexually harassing 17 girl students of a Delhi institute, allegedly used different names and particulars to operate bank accounts and withdrew over Rs 50 lakh after FIR was registered against him, investigators claimed on Friday.

During the investigation, it was revealed that <u>Saraswati</u> had allegedly been operating a bank account under two different names by submitting documents with varying particulars at the time of account opening and transfer. Police also said that around Rs 50-55 lakh had been withdrawn since the registration of the FIR.

Meanwhile, a Delhi court on Friday dismissed the anticipatory bail plea of Saraswati in a case of alleged cheating, forgery and criminal conspiracy against him.

WANTED IN PUNJAB, BABBAR KHALSA LINKED TERRORIST EXTRADITED FROM UAE

Diary Times Desk: In a landmark operation, Punjab Police on Saturday extradited Babbar Khalsa International (BKI) terrorist Parminder Singh Pindi, from Abu Dhabi in the UAE to India with the close coordination and support of Central agencies, Director General of Police Gaurav Yadav said. He said Pindi is a close aide of foreign-based terrorists Harwinder Singh, alias Rinda, and Happy Passia and is involved in multiple heinous crimes, including petrol bomb attacks, violent assaults, and extortions in the Batala-Gurdaspur region. Acting swiftly on a Red Corner Notice (RCN) requested by Batala Police, a dedicated four-member team led by a senior police officer travelled to the UAE on September 24, coordinated with the Ministry of External Affairs and the UAE authorities, completed all legal formalities, and successfully brought the accused back to face justice, said the DGP. "This successful extradition underscores Punjab Police's zerotolerance policy towards terrorism and organised crime as well as its advanced investigative capabilities.

TELANGANA GETS NEW POLICE CHIEF AFTER MAJOR RESHUFFLE OF IAS. IPS

Diary Times Desk: In a major reshuffle of IPS officers, the Telangana government on Saturday issued orders appointing B Shivadhar Reddy as the new Director General of Police of Telangana, and VC Sajjanar as Hyderabad Police Commissioner. B Shivadhar Reddy, an officer from the 1994 batch,

Mr Reddy was also the first Intelligence Chief of Telangana in 2014. Mr Sajjanar, an officer from the 1996 batch, who has been appointed to replace CV Anand, is wellknown for his tenure as the head of the Telangana State Road Transport Corporation (TSRTC) and for his earlier role as the Commissioner of Cyberabad Police, when the four accused in the 2019 veterinary doctor's rape and murder case were killed in an

THIRD CAR LINKED TO ACTOR DULQUER SALMAAN IN BHUTAN LUXURY VEHICLE SMUGGLING CASE SEIZED

Diary Times Desk: Customs officials investigating the smuggling of luxury vehicles from Bhutan seized another car belonging to Malayalam actor Dulquer Salmaan on Saturday, officials said.

With this seizure, the agency has confiscated 40 vehicles in the case, including three linked to the actor

A red Nissan Patrol SUV was taken into custody from an apartment complex in Vennala, where a relative of Dulquer resides, Customs sources said. Investigators stated that the SUV was smuggled from Bhutan and brought to Himachal Pradesh, where it was re-registered before being sold to the actor. According to Customs, details of Dulquer's four cars are being collected, though all were purchased from previous owners in India.

MP HORROR: CHILD BEHEADED IN FRONT OF MOTHER IN DHAR, ACCUSED DIES FOLLOWING MOB ATTACK

Diary Times Desk: In a horrific incident on Friday, a five-year-old boy, Vikas, was brutally beheaded in front of his mother by a man believed to be mentally unstable.

As per eyewitnesses, the accused, identified as 25-year-old Mahesh, arrived on a motorcycle and entered the home of resident Kalu Singh. The family reportedly did not know him.

Without warning, Mahesh allegedly grabbed a spade-like tool lying inside the house and attacked the child, severing his neck. The attacker also struck the boy's shoulder, leaving the body mutilated, stated an NDTV report.

The boy's mother attempted to intervene but sustained injuries in the process. Neighbours and villagers rushed to the scene and, in a surge of anger, caught hold of Mahesh. He was severely beaten before police arrived.

Dhar Superintendent of Police Mayank Awasthi described the crime as "extremely heartbreaking" and confirmed that the accused died en route to the hospital. "The real cause of death will be confirmed after the post-mortem. Initial investigations suggest he was mentally unstable," Mr Awasthi said.

A case has been registered against the accused, and a judicial inquiry has been ordered into his death. According to preliminary investigations, Mahesh was a resident of Jobat Bagdi in Alirajpur district. His family told police that he had been mentally unstable and had been missing for the past three to four days.

GLOBAL ARMS EMBARGO, STIFF ECONOMIC SANCTIONS NEEDED TO HALT ISRAELI ATTACKS ON GAZA

Diary Times Desk: THE Malaysian Government has urged the international community to impose a comprehensive global arms embargo and tighter economic sanctions on Israel, in an effort to immediately halt its military offensive in Gaza. Foreign Minister Datuk Seri Mohamad Hasan said the world could no longer remain silent while "thousands of innocent lives are lost". "We must intensify engagement with members of the UN Security Council to invoke Chapter VII of the UN Charter — a crucial step toward enabling global arms and economic sanctions," he told the High-Level Meeting on Halting the Genocide in Gaza, organised by The Hague Group in New York.

Mohamad called for closer cooperation with the UN Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People, and the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), to build collective diplomatic pressure.

Diary Times Desk: Iraq has resumed crude oil exports from the semi-autonomous Kurdistan region to Turkiye after an interim deal broke a two-and-a-half-year deadlock over legal and technical disputes. The resumption started at 6am local time (03:00 GMT), according to a statement from Iraq's oil ministry on Saturday. "Operations started at a rapid pace and with complete smoothness without recording any significant technical problems," the ministry said. Turkish Energy Minister Alparslan Bayraktar also confirmed the development in a post on X.

The agreement between Irag's federal government, the Kurdistan regional government (KRG) and foreign oil producers operating in the region will allow 180,000 to 190,000 barrels per day (bpd) of crude to flow to Turkiye's Ceyhan port, Iraq's oil minister told Kurdish broadcaster Rudaw on Friday. The resumption follows a tripartite agreement reached earlier this week between the ministry, the Kurdish region's natural resources ministry, and international oil companies operating in the region. Iraq's OPEC delegate, Mohammed al-Najjar, said his country can export more than it is now after the resumption of flows via the Kirkuk-Ceyhan pipeline, in addition to other planned projects at Basra port, state news agency INA reported on

"DANGEROUS CONSEQUENCES": MOSCOW DENOUNCES IDEA OF NATO DOWNING RUSSIAN AIRCRAFT; CALLS IT RECKLESS



Diary Times Desk: Moscow has denounced the idea that NATO allies shoot down Russian aircraft entering their airspace as "reckless", after US President Donald Trump said alliance members should do so.

Several NATO countries say Russian fighter jets and drones have violated their airspace in Europe over recent weeks, accusing Moscow of testing the alliance.

Asked on Tuesday whether he thought NATO states should shoot down any Russian planes that violate their airspace, Trump said: "Yes, I do."

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov on Friday denounced what he called "irresponsible statements about the need to shoot down Russian aircraft, which are, at the very least, reckless, irresponsible and carry dangerous consequences," in an interview with Russian state TV.

Peskov did not specifically refer to Trump and instead cast the calls as coming from Europe.

NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte said Thursday he supported the idea of targeting Russian jets if they violate members' airspace.

UN LISTS 158 FIRMS TIED TO ILLEGAL ISRAELI SETTLEMENTS

Diary Times Desk: The United Nations has released a report, revealing that more than 150 companies, including Airbnb, Booking.com, Expedia and TripAdvisor, are profiting from Israel's illegal settlement enterprise in the occupied West Bank.

The UN human rights office on Friday updated its database, listing 158 firms operating inside settlements deemed unlawful by the International Court of Justice (ICJ).

While most of the companies are Israeli, the list also includes multinationals registered in the United States, Canada, China, France, and Germany.

The report emphasised that businesses have a duty to avoid fuelling abuses.

"Where business enterprises identify that they have caused or contributed to adverse human rights impacts, they should provide for or cooperate in remediation through appropriate processes," it said.



'I'M ABSOLUTELY TERRIFIED': FEDERAL WORKERS BRACE FOR POTENTIAL GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN, MASS LAYOFFS

Diary Times Desk : Federal employees from agencies across the US government say they're "terrified," "disoriented" and filled with anxiety as they brace for a possible shutdown that the Trump White House has threatened will pave the way for new rounds of fast-tracked mass layoffs.

There is widespread confusion and fear among federal workers as the Tuesday night deadline approaches for Congress to approve a spending package, according to more than a dozen employees from 11 federal agencies who spoke to CNN. Many are still waiting to find out who will be required to work through a shutdown — and who will be furloughed.

Complicating matters, the White House budget office has directed federal agencies to "use this opportunity" to prepare sweeping new layoffs, based on which programs lose funding in the event of a shutdown and which don't align with President Donald Trump's priorities, according to a memo obtained by CNN.

EU TO DEVELOP 'DRONE WALL' AMID REGIONAL AIRSPACE VIOLATIONS

Diary Times Desk: European Union defence ministers have agreed to develop a "drone wall" along their borders with Russia and Ukraine to detect, track and intercept violations of their airspace, according to the bloc's defence chief.

Friday's announcement comes after rogue drones entered Polish airspace on September 10, rattling eastern EU members.

Earlier this week, Denmark closed some of its airports after drones were flown near them, with the country's Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen warning that hybrid attacks were becoming more frequent.

Although Danish authorities have not concluded their investigations, Frederiksen stressed that Russia was currently the primary threat to European security.

The Kremlin has denied any involvement in the drone incidents in Poland and Denmark. "The repeated violations of our airspace are unacceptable. The message is clear: Russia is testing the EU and NATO. And our response must be firm, united and immediate," EU Defence Commissioner Andrius Kubilius said after chairing a virtual meeting of 10 countries on Europe's eastern flank on Friday.

AFTER U.S. & RUSSIA, PAKISTAN IS 3RD COUNTRY TO OFFER IT "NUCLEAR UMBRELLA": WHAT LIES AHEAD OF SAUDI-PAK DEAL?



Diary Times Desk: The new mutual defence treaty inked by Pakistan and Saudi Arabia astounded many. It came just days after the Gulf region was shell-shocked by Israeli strikes on a Hamas compound in Qatar.

The pact comes at an especially volatile time in the wake of both Iranian and Israeli strikes on Doha, uncertainty over the future of Tehran's nuclear programme, and clashes between India and Pakistan in May.

"Even those accustomed to dramatic developments in the Middle East and South Asia were caught off guard by the announcement," said Joshua White from the Brookings Institution.

While the agreement follows decades of close military ties between the countries, questions remain unanswered regarding its exact parameters, particularly any potential nuclear dimensions.

"The pact clearly formalises and deepens decades of Saudi-Pakistani security and defence cooperation, building on a landmark 1982 protocol agreement," said White, which saw a significant deployment of Pakistani troops to Saudi Arabia.

"There are a large number of Saudi military personnel who have been trained by Pakistanis, and there are Pakistani officers seconded within the Saudi Ministry of Defence," added Camille Lons, a Gulf expert at the European Council on Foreign Relations.

According to Lons, the pact likely resulted from lengthy negotiations.

US GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN LOOMS: HOW IT COULD UNFOLD

They want to reverse the Medicaid cuts in President Donald Trump's mega-bill passed this summer as well as extend tax credits that make health insurance premiums more affordable for millions who purchase through the marketplaces established by the Affordable Care Act. Republicans say that's all a non-starter.

TRUMP ASKS SUPREME COURT TO DECIDE WHETHER HE CAN END BIRTHRIGHT CITIZENSHIP



Diary Times Desk: The Trump administration asked the Supreme Court on Friday to review the constitutionality of President Donald Trump's executive order seeking to end birthright citizenship, pushing the issue before the justices for the second time this year.

Despite more than a century of understanding that the 14th Amendment confers citizenship on people born in the United States, the Trump administration told the Supreme Court in an appeal that notion was "mistaken" and that the view became "pervasive, with destructive consequences." "The lower court's decisions invalidated a policy of prime importance to the president and his administration in a manner that undermines our border security," wrote Solicitor General D. John Sauer, the administration's top appellate attorney. "Those decisions confer, without lawful justification, the privilege of American citizenship on hundreds of thousands of unqualified people."

BANGLADESHI DIASPORA RAISES 'GO BACK TO PAKISTAN' SLOGANS AGAINST MUHAMMAD YUNUS OUTSIDE UN HEADQUARTERS IN NEW YORK

Members of the Bangladeshi diaspora staged a demonstration outside the United Nations headquarters on Friday (26 September), voicing strong opposition to Muhammad Yunus, the interim Chief Adviser of Bangladesh, India Today reported.

EX-US PREZ OBAMA TAKES AIM AT TRUMP, SAYS 80% OF WORLD'S PROBLEMS INVOLVE 'OLD MEN'

Diary Times Desk: Former US President Barack Obama has remarked that a significant portion of the world's issues, ground 80 per cent, stem from elderly men clinging to power and legacy, in comments widely interpreted as a veiled dig at 77-year-old Donald Trump. Speaking in London on Friday with British historian David Olusoga, Obama, 64, said, "It's fair to say that 80 per cent of the world's problems involve old men hanging on who are afraid of death and insignificance, and they won't let ao. They build pyramids, and they put their names on everything. They get very anxious about it."

The timing of his remarks is notable, coming just weeks after Trump defended the deployment of National Guard troops in Washington, DC, justifying it as a response to what he described as rising violent crime. "They say: 'We don't need him. Freedom, freedom, he's a dictator.' I don't like a dictator. I'm not a dictator. I'm a man with great common sense and a smart person," Trump had said at the time.

Trump, who returned to office on 20 January after defeating Democrat Kamala Harris, made those comments amid mounting criticism that his actions mirrored authoritarian tendencies.

Obama has previously voiced concerns about ageing political figures refusing to step aside. Back in 2019, he said, "If you look at the world and look at the problems.

The stunning on-camera confession from Lorenz Kraus, 53, came Thursday, a day after police say they recovered two bodies from the home in Albany as part of an investigation that found Kraus' parents, Franz and Theresia Kraus, were still receiving Social Security payments despite not having been seen or heard from in years.

Lorenz Kraus contacted local news outlet CBS6, and sat for a half-hour interview, in which he described the deaths as mercy killings for aging parents who were becoming more frail.

"They knew that this was it for them, that they were perishing at your hand?" news anchor Greg Floyd asked Kraus.

"Yes," said Kraus. "And it was so quick."



Diary Times Desk: Chinese Premier Li Qiang warned Friday against a return to a "Cold War mentality" and defended multilateralism and free trade, in a veiled criticism of the United States from the United Nations.

The Chinese premier made no explicit reference to US President Donald Trump as he addressed the UN General Assembly. But he cast the Asian power as a defender of the global order, of which Washington until recently was the chief custodian.

Diary Times Desk: Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu lashed out on Friday at Western countries' recent recognition of Palestinian statehood, accusing world leaders of "buckling under the pressure of a biased media, radical Islamist constituencies and antisemitic mobs."

Addressing the UN General Assembly in New York, Netanyahu rejected growing global criticism of Israel's war in Gaza, stretching over almost two years, as "political and legal warfare against Israel." 

Gurung, 36, rose to prominence as the face of a grassroots uprising led largely by Nepal's Gen Z.

The demonstrations erupted after the government blocked social media platforms, including Facebook, X and YouTube, saying the companies had failed to register and submit to government oversight.

But the protests soon spiralled into broader discontent, fuelled by anger over alleged corruption, state violence and impunity. Dozens of young demonstrators were killed, and thousands more were injured.

IRAN RECALLS ENVOYS TO UK, FRANCE, GERMANY AS UN SANCTIONS REIMPOSED



Diary Times Desk: Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Friday faced a mass walkout during his speech at the United Nations General Assembly in New York. As he vowed to continue the devastating war on Gaza, he was met with a mix of jeers and applause. He said that Israel "must finish the job" against Hamas.

He explained that his speech was being broadcast through loudspeakers in Gaza so that Israeli hostages could hear it. He also claimed that in an 'unprecedented operation' the speech was being streamed through the cell phones of people in Gaza after the devices were taken over by Israel's intelligence services.

"We have not forgotten you, not even for a second. The people of Israel are with you," he spoke to the hostages. In a message to Hamas, he said, "Lay down your arms. Let my people go". Threatening them, he said, "If you do, you will live. If you don't, Israel will hunt you down."

PAK SECURITY FORCES KILL 17 TALIBAN MILITANTS IN RAIDS IN KHYBER **PAKHTUNKHWA**

Diary Times Desk: Pakistani security forces on Friday raided a militant hideout in the country's restive northwest, triggering a shootout that left 17 Pakistani Taliban fighters dead, police said. The clash took place in Karak, a district in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, according to regional Police Chief Shehbaz Elahi. He said three officers were wounded in the gunbattle. Elahi provided no further details but said that the killed militants were "Khwarij," a term often used by Pakistani authorities to refer to members of the Pakistani Taliban. While security forces frequently carry out such operations, Friday's raid followed a similar intelligence-based operation two days earlier in Dera Ismail Khan, another district in the northwest, where 13 Pakistani Taliban fighters were killed in a shootout. Pakistan has seen a rise in militant violence in recent years, much of it claimed by separatist aroups and the Pakistani Taliban, also known as Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan, or TTP.

US SUPREME COURT LETS TRUMP WITHHOLD \$4 BILLION IN FOREIGN AID

Diary Times Desk: The U.S. Supreme Court sided again on Friday with Donald Trump, allowing his administration to withhold about \$4 billion in foreign aid authorized by Congress for the current fiscal year as the Republican president pursues his "America First" agenda.

The justices blocked Washington-based U.S. District Judge Amir Ali's order that had directed the administration to promptly take steps to spend the aid at issue in the dispute. Ali's decision came in a lawsuit by aid groups challenging the administration's action.

The case centers on the degree to which a president has the authority to rescind funds Congress has appropriated for programs that do not align with his policies.

The administration said in court papers that the money it targeted is "contrary to U.S. foreign policy," reflecting Trump's effort to scale back U.S. assistance abroad as part of an "America First" agenda.

THERE WAS A DIFFERENT VIBE AT THE U.N. GENERAL ASSEMBLY. 5 **ATTENDEES WEIGH IN**

Diary Times Desk: It's the first United Nations General Assembly since President Donald Trump shook up the foreign aid landscape by cutting billions of dollars in assistance.

"There's a lot of anxiety, apprehension. It's almost like everybody's waiting for the other shoe to drop," says Solomon Zewdu, the CEO of The END Fund, a group that focuses on eliminating neglected tropical diseases.

He's one of thousands of people from all over the world who descended on Manhattan for a week of high-level meetings at the 80th session of the U.N. General Assembly.

NPR reporters were on the ground in New York and spoke with global health leaders about their impressions of the week. Here's what they told us – edited for length and clarity.

Solomon Zewdu, the CEO of The END Fund

Dr. Solomon Zewdu is based in South Africa and he says the thing that struck him most this General Assembly is that global health leaders are "talking in silos."

"We're not hearing each other," he says. Some are having conversations about how dependent countries are on aid, while others are lamenting the cuts.

"But now, what's the next step? Let's move on. There's urgency. Time kills people," he says. He's afraid "everybody's going to scatter, and then we might wait for the next summit to happen — and, in between, people dying, people's health is being compromised."



US REVOKES COLOMBIAN PRESIDENT'S VISA OVER 'RECKLESS AND INCENDIARY' **REMARKS**

Diary Times Desk: The US has said it will revoke Colombian President Gustavo Petro's visa, after he urged US soldiers to disobey his American counterpart Donald Trump during remarks at a rally in New York.

The State Department described Petro's comments at a pro-Palestinian street protest on Friday as "reckless and incendiary".

The Colombian leader was in the US for the UN General Assembly. where earlier this week he called for a criminal inquiry into the Trump administration's airstrikes alleged drug-trafficking boats in the Caribbean.

He was already on his way back to Bogota when the US announced it would cancel his visa, Colombian media reports.

Petro shared a video on social media of him addressing a large crowd through a megaphone in Spanish on Friday.

He called for the formation of a "world salvation army, whose first task is to liberate Palestine".

"That is why, from here in New York, I ask all soldiers in the United States Army not to point their rifles at humanity," he said. "Disobey Trump's order! Obey the order of humanity!"

US UNVEILS 21-POINT PEACE PLAN: ISRAEL TO EXIT GAZA. **HAMAS TO DISARM**

Diary Times Desk: The United States has shared a 21-point proposal to end the war in Gaza and for the creation of a pathway for a future Palestinian state. The plan further entails proposals for immediate release of hostages, encouraging Palestinians to remain in the Strip and granting amnesty to peaceful Hamas members, among others, according to Times of Israel.

The document was shared by the US with a few Arab and Muslim nations this week on the sidelines of United Nations General Assembly. However, the plan to urge Palestinians to remain in the Strip signals a major shift in US policy as US President Donald Trump had said in February that America will take over Gaza and relocate two million Gazans permanently. Moreover, the idea of a future Palestinian state also departs from Trump's policy as the administration has never backed a two-state solution.

The proposal has favourable points for Israel as well, such as a commitment for Hamas to disarm, demilitarisation of Gaza and establishing a process to deradicalise the population.

SILICON VALLEY'S SENIORS GET A CRASH **COURSE IN AI**

Jacob Shaul is the kind of rising high school student who spends Saturdays playing chess and devours books by Malcom Gladwell and Angela Duckworth. TRUMP SAYS

Diary Times Desk: President Donald Trump announced Thursday that brand-name or pharmaceutical patented products will be subject to a 100% tariff starting October 1 unless the drugmaker is building a manufacturing plant in the US.

Trump has been promising for months to levy tariffs on pharmaceutical imports, which avoided tariffs during his first term. The president sees tariffs as a way to pressure drug manufacturers to ramp up production in the US and to strengthen the supply chain for essential medicines.

Also, Trump has pointed to tariffs as a way to fulfill his vow to lower drug costs, though experts say that is unlikely to happen.

Drugmakers have taken Trump's tariff threats seriously, unveiling hundreds of billions of dollars of commitments to build or expand US manufacturing operations in the coming years.

HOW LARRY AND DAVID ELLISON REACHED THE PEAK OF THEIR **WEALTH - AND POLITICAL POWER**

Diary Times Desk: He may be 81-years old, but Oracle chairman and mega-billionaire Larry Ellison, a database technology pioneer and a mainstay of Silicon Valley for five decades, is at the peak of his influence, wealth and political power.

He is leading a group of investors who will buy and oversee the bulk of TikTok's US assets, affirmed by an executive order President Donald Trump signed on Thursday. He is backing his son David's massive ambitions to become one of the country's top media moguls. And earlier this month, Ellison briefly became the richest person in the world, eclipsing Elon Musk, as Oracle's stock exploded on its prognostications for its booming Al business.

Ellison is cementing his place as one of the most powerful business figures in the world. A big part of that evolution has come as a result of his relationship with Trump.

Like many in Silicon Valley, Ellison's political positions have evolved - from Bill Clinton loving Democrat, to a quiet Republican donor, to standing alongside Trump at the White House.



WHY STARBUCKS IS CLOSING HUNDREDS OF STORES

Diary Times Desk: The days of a Starbucks on every corner seem to be coming to an end.

For years, Starbucks staked its reputation on its ability to expand relentlessly in cities and suburbs. Comedian Lewis Black even riffed in 2001 that the "end of the universe" was in Houston, Texas, where he found one Starbucks directly across the street from another.

But both the universe - and Starbucks - have changed since then. More competition, inflation and consumer shifts have hurt Starbucks' bottom line.

Starbucks announced Thursday that it will close 1% of its stores in North America this month. The closures – and layoffs of 900 corporate employees - are part of a \$1 billion restructuring plan. Starbucks CEO Brian Niccol said the stores it will shut weren't "what our customers and partners expect" or weren't makina money.

Closing roughly 400 stores is like a rounding error for the coffee giant, which has more than 32,000 locations worldwide. And it still plans to open new stores next year. But the fact that Starbucks is shrinking right now represents something significant for its business.



NO ONE CAN SEEM TO KILL AMERICA'S ECONOMY, DESPITE EVERYONE'S BEST **EFFORTS**

Americans hate this economy, but they keep spending like they love it.

The Commerce Department reported Friday that consumer spending rose 0.6% in August. Although that may not sound like a lot, it represented significantly stronger growth than economists had expected.

The report wasn't an outlier: Retail sales also rose 0.6% in August, the Commerce Department said in a separate report two weeks ago. Corporate earnings and sales have proven resilient in the past quarter, with many companies saying customers continue to give them business despite concerns about a flagging economy. And a revised report issued Thursday on the secondquarter gross domestic product, the broadest measure of US economic growth, showed that GDP grew by the fastest rate in almost two years, buoyed by strong consumer spending.

In the spring of 2024, Li Hongxing, who runs a social media ad agency, took on a client he believed to be a rising star in China's electric vehicle market.

A marketing veteran in the auto industry, Li went so far as to borrow to cover the cost of ads for Ji Yue, expecting payment later from the EV startup he thought had everything it needed to succeed: efficiency, growing sales, and deeppocketed backers.

Rut it didn't

Within half a year, the carmaker collapsed, turning Li's gamble into a nightmare, saddling him with debt of 40 million yuan (\$5.6 million).

"It was a feeling of sheer despair," Li said.

Ji Yue's downfall is hardly unique in China's auto industry, where hundreds of brands have gone under in a brutal race to the bottom over the past few years. The country's EV boom not only gave rise to global leaders like BYD; it has also led to extensive overcapacity in which a crowd of carmakers are scrambling for market share.



Americans ramped up their spending in August; however, their costs of living were on the rise as food and other goods became even more expensive last month and services prices remained stubbornly high.

New economic data released Friday showed that consumer spending rose 0.6% in the key back-to-school shopping month of August, and 0.4% when adjusting for inflation. That's further indication that a critical driver of the US economy continues to chug along despite broader uncertainty and a slowdown in the labor market. However, that spending is increasingly being focused on essential purchases, such as health care, at a time when income gains aren't keeping up.

THE JIMMY KIMMEL BLACKOUT IS COMPLETELY OVER: NEXSTAR AND SINCLAIR BACK DOWN

The blackout of "Jimmy Kimmel Live!" is over.

Sinclair and Nexstar, the two major station groups that preempted the talk show earlier this month, are allowing the show to return to their ABC-affiliated stations on Friday evening.

This means that Kimmel will be seen again in major cities like Washington, DC, Nashville, and Seattle, as well as several dozen other markets.

The reversal is a victory for Kimmel and ABC and a reflection of the power that national networks have over local affiliates

Both Nexstar and Sinclair, which together operate nearly a quarter of ABC-affiliated stations, have been accused of trying to curry favor with President Trump and TV station regulator Brendan Carr by keeping Kimmel off the air even after ABC reinstated the show nationally earlier this week.

BOEING IS ONCE AGAIN ALLOWED TO CERTIFY 737 MAX AND 787 DREAMLINERS AS SAFE TO FLY ON BEHALF OF THE FAA



Diary Times Desk:

For years, following significant and continuous quality and safety errors, Boeing has been barred from certifying the safety of some of its own aircraft on behalf of the US government. Following 18 months of intense oversight and scrutiny from US regulators, the Federal Aviation Administration is restoring Boeing's safety certification ability for some of the 737 Max and 787 Dreamliners it manufactures.

Manufacturers are typically delegated permission to perform some functions on behalf of the FAA, such as issuing airworthiness and production certifications, but Boeing lost that delegation for the two models.

The FAA revoked Boeing's authority to issue airworthiness certificates for 737s in 2019 after the deadly Lion Air and Ethiopian Air crashes and 787s in 2022 for production quality issues. A 737 Max door plug blowout in January 2024 – and the embarrassing government-led investigation that followed – led Boeing to commit to monumental changes to its quality and safety controls.

But the FAA isn't ready to turn over the safety certification keys entirely: On Friday, the FAA announced Boeing would be allowed to issue airworthiness certificates on alternating weeks while the agency itself would issue them on the other weeks.

"Safety drives everything we do, and the FAA will only allow this step forward because we are confident it can be done safely," the agency said in a statement. "This decision follows a thorough review of Boeing's ongoing production quality and will allow our inspectors to focus additional surveillance in the production process." The agency said despite the changes, it would still maintain "direct and rigorous oversight of Boeing's production processes."

PUNJABI SINGER RAJVIR JAWANDA IN CRITICAL CONDITION AFTER **ROAD ACCIDENT IN** HIMACHAL

Diary Times Desk: Punjabi singer and actor Rajvir Jawanda was admitted to Fortis Hospital in Mohali on September 27 after a severe road accident in Himachal Pradesh

He was referred to the hospital in critical condition after sustaining serious head and spine injuries earlier that morning. Jawanda had also suffered a cardiac arrest at Civil Hospital before beina transferred to Fortis Hospital.

The 35-year-old's bike met with an accident near Baddi.

Upon arrival at 1.45 pm, the Emergency and Neurosurgery teams immediately assessed him. Detailed examinations and investigations were conducted, and he was placed on advanced life support. Currently, Jawanda is on ventilator support and remains in critical condition under close monitoring.

LAND TRANSFER CLEARS WAY FOR POLICE LINES IN DEHRA

Diary Times Desk: The longpending demand for a Police Lines in Dehra Police District has taken a step forward with the transfer of one hectare (2.5 acres) of land in Dhaliara to the Police Department.

The order for the transfer was issued by the Deputy Commissioner of Kangra on September 25, a spokesman of the district administration confirmed on Friday.

Dehra Congress MLA Kamlesh

Thakur, wife of Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu, who had been pursuing the matter for a long time, welcomed the development. "The allotment of land is a significant step in strengthening the newly created district. The dream of a Police Lines in Dehra is about to come true," she said, thanking CM Sukhu and the state government. The Police Department had originally sought around three hectares of land through the SDM of Dehra. Of this, one hectare has now been transferred. The MLA added that efforts would continue to secure the remaining land for a sports ground and an administrative building.

MINERAL RICHES UNLOCKED BILASPUR MINES AUCTIONED FOR RS 3.46 CRORE

Diary Times Desk: The auction process for minor mineral mines in Bilaspur district was successfully conducted on under the chairmanship of Additional Deputy Commissioner Om Kant Thakur at Bilaspur on Friday. A total of 11 identified mining sites were put up for auction during the session and seven are auctioned at Rs 3.46 crore.

Om Kant Thakur said of the 11 mines approved by the auction, seven mines were allocated in favour of the highest bidders for a period of one year, with an advance security deposit of 25 percent, amounting to Rs 86.53 lakh. He added that all participants strictly followed the guidelines laid down for the transparent allocation of mineral resources.

Highlighting the importance of this process, Thakur emphasised that such auctions play a vital role in ensuring the proper utilisation of mineral resources while also boosting mineral production in the district. He said these transparent auctions would promote the growth of the mineral industry, strengthen the district's economy and create new employment opportunities.



MONSOON WITHDRAWS AFTER INFLICTING HEAVY DAMAGE

Diary Times Desk: The monsoon withdrew completely from the state today, a day after the normal date of return. The state received a precipitation of 1,022 mm this monsoon, 40 per cent more than normal. Also, the rainfall received this monsoon was the highest since 1995 when the state had received 1,029 mm of rain. The region had received the highest rainfall of 1,314 mm in 1922

The southwest monsoon had entered the state on June 20 and covered the entire state by June 24, a day earlier than the normal date of June 25. Starting from September 24, the complete withdrawal was recorded todav.

The monsoon has withdrawn from the state in September for the first time in the past five years. From 2021 to 2024, the monsoon withdrew in the first or second week of October. Heavy rain during this monsoon season triggered extreme-weather events like cloudbursts, flashfloods and landslides frequently across the state, resulting in a massive loss of human life and damage to both public and private property.

'WAS HANDCUFFED, GOT COLD TREATMENT': 73-YEAR-OLD HARJIT KAUR RECOUNTS ORDEAL IN US DETENTION

Diary Times Desk: Harjit Kaur, a 73-year-old woman deported from the US after 33 years, said her grandchildren are repeatedly calling her to ask whether she has a bed to sleep on, clothes to wear, and whether she had food in the morning, afternoon and night.

Harjit and her two young sons made it to California in 1992 to make a living; she has now been deported back to India on September 22. Her home, her children, and her grandchildren remain in Hercules in the San Francisco Bay Area, where she worked in a saree store.

BKU PROTESTS IN KARNAL OVER DELAY IN DIGITAL SCALES, PADDY PROCUREMENT

Diary Times Desk: Farmers under the banner of the Bharatiya Kisan Union (BKU) staged a dharna outside the Karnal market committee on Friday, alleging negligence by the government and officials in paddy procurement and in implementing the state's order to install digital weighing machines in grain markets.

The protest was led by district president Surender Singh Ghumman, while state president Rattan Mann launched a sharp attack on the government. "It is shameful that despite being a farmer himself, Chief Minister Nayab Saini has failed to address the plight of farmers. He should step into the field and review the situation personally," Mann said.

He alleged a nexus between marketing board officials and commission agents for delaying the installation of digital weighing machines. Warning the administration, Mann said, "If arrangements for digital scales and proper procurement of paddy are not ensured by Monday, we will lock the main gate of the Karnal market committee from Tuesday, and the administration will be held responsible."

AAP PROTESTS IN PANIPAT, SEEKS RELIEF ON PUNJAB PATTERN FOR FLOOD VICTIMS

Diary Times Desk: The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) on Friday organised a protest march in Panipat demanding compensation for farmers and flood-affected residents on the lines of the Punjab Government.

Led by AAP state vice-president Surender Ahlawat, party leaders and supporters marched from Red Light Chowk to the Mini Secretariat, where they submitted a memorandum addressed to the Haryana Chief Minister through District Social Welfare Officer (DSWO) Jaipal Hooda.

Ahlawat said farmers and villagers had suffered huge losses during this year's monsoon floods. "Their livelihoods, crops, land and livestock have been severely damaged due to heavy floods," he said.

He accused the state government of providing meagre relief compared to Punjab. "The state government has provided relatively little compensation, while neighbouring Punjab has provided full compensation," Ahlawat said.

10 HISAR VILLAGES STILL MAROONED, IRRIGATION DEPT INTENSIFIES WATER-DRAINAGE DRIVE

Diary Times Desk: Nearly 10 villages in Hisar district continue to reel under waterlogging even after the withdrawal of monsoon, with stagnant water persisting in homes and fields.

The Irrigation Department has deployed machinery at 284 locations in the affected villages, including Arya Nagar, Gangwa, Kaimri, Litani, Gurana Mirkan, Kulana, Karar Alipur and Puthi Mangal Khan.

Balraj, a resident of Litani, said: "The water inundated fields and residential areas. Unfortunately, it remains stagnant in many places. Our entire crop is lost. Now, the stagnant water is causing diseases and threatening homes as foundations are weakening." Officials said additional pump sets and turbines have been requisitioned from neighbouring districts. "Water remains in low-lying areas and dhanis (hamlets). Many villagers are yet to return, taking shelter with relatives or in rented accommodation," a senior officer said.

The floods have been compared to the 1995 deluge, with officials admitting the situation was worsened by a breach in the Hisar-Ghaggar drain. "We are facing a shortage of machinery. A proposal for Rs 8 crore to buy new equipment was submitted earlier, but approval delays hampered timely procurement. Last year, we got only Rs 2.4 crore for drainage work," the officer added.

By the time we reached the tire shop, the sky was darkening and the sidewalk in front of the little shop partially blocked by a group of drunken men, one quietly vomiting between his knees

Now 49, she finally has her own income and her own car, a carefully polished four-door Chevrolet watched over by a painted wooden folk-art dog glued to the dashboard. A feathered dreamcatcher sways from her rearview mirror.

"I love to drive. I love to meet people in the car that I call my little cherry. This for me is my safe place, It's one of my safe places. There I cry, scream, sing, dance, cry out loud, everything and anything I feel like," she said.



"It has happened to me that when I get to my destination, I tell them to get out, and they don't want to leave. They'll say something like, 'I told you we're going to have sex," she said.

Archaeologists Have Uncovere

he discovery of a sunken port off the coast of Egypt may offer a puzzle piece in the longstanding search for Cleopatra's lost tomb and glimpses into the country's ancient maritime according to researchers.

team underwater of archaeologists, including Geographic Explorer National Kathleen Martínez and National Geographic Explorer-at-Large Bob Ballard, uncovered rows of towering structures that may have been columns, reaching over 20 feet (6 meters) high within the Mediterranean Sea. researchers also found evidence of polished stone floors, cemented blocks, ship Disney+ and Hulu. anchors and tall storage jars - all dated to called amphorae the time of Cleopatra.

The team found the port after tunnel miles (48 kilometers) west of Alexandria, to the sea

Cleopatra was born in Alexandria in 69 BC, crowned queen at the age of 18 and died in 30 BC after being defeated by Octavian, also known as Emperor Augustus and the founder of the Roman Empire. during the Battle of Actium in 31

As part of their victory, the Romans destroyed images of Cleopatra so that she would be forgotten, and only seven statues survive that appear to depict the gueen. Martínez said.

There were gaping striped trousers. tops, vest leather jackets, and shimmery gowns, worn by models walking lively soundtrack included Prince, George Michael Eurythmics. and the Some signature Versace motifs also appeared, like the Medusa symbol on cardigans or sparkly patterns checkerboard patterns on dresses — reminiscent of the look worn by Claudia Schiffer on the brand's 2023 runway.

Growing up in Italy meant that Vitale was familiar with Versace's codes early on, he told a group of editors after the show. The sense of familiarity is impermeable, he said, drawing comparisons to pop culture, "It's almost like Coca Cola, you know. Everybody knows Versace, it's so popular." And so, when exploring the brand's archives, he sought to extract "the feeling of (the late founder) Gianni." Rather than draw inspiration from specific pieces, he questioned: "What is the spirit of Versace beyond the clothes?"

There were also plenty of shirts, which despite being a key part of Versace's heritage appear to have only returned to focus now. At the Venice Film Festival in August, Hollywood stars Julia Roberts and Amanda Seyfried had voluntarily shared the same Versace outfit.

10 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT EDWARD WESTON



Diary Times Desk: 1. He was given his first camera on his 16th birthday

Edward Weston was born in Highland Park, Illinois, in 1886. His father, an obstetrician, bought him his first camera (a Kodak Bulls-Eye No. 2) for his 16th birthday. The gift came with a note that included the helpful advice: 'Don't be too far from the object you wish to take, or it'll be very small'. Weston dropped out of high school soon afterwards, before taking his only formal training in the medium to which he would devote his life: a six-month programme at the Illinois College of Photography in Effingham.

2. He fell in love with California

Weston's elder sister Mary had moved from the Midwest to the Los Angeles suburb of Tropico (present-day Glendale). On a visit to see her, he fell in love with California's wide-open terrain, and when he was 20 he decided to move to Tropico himself. Unlike the other great pioneers of American photography — notably Alfred Stieglitz and Edward Steichen, who lived and worked in New York — Weston preferred to stay on the West Coast for the rest of his life, and would shoot many of his most famous photographs there.

3. John Singer Sargent was an early influence

Weston opened a photography studio in Tropico in 1911, producing soft-focus portraits of well-to-do customers modelled on paintings by John Singer Sargent. These were images in the so-called 'pictorialist' style associated with artists like Stieglitz, which, taking a cue from Victorian portraiture, rejected photography's raw, documentary roots in favour of a more sumptuous aesthetic. Satisfying the demands of his clientele was something Weston came to loathe.

4. Cubism offered escape from an artistic dead end

Portraiture allowed Weston to financially support his wife Flora and their four sons, but he found it an artistic dead end. In his early thirties, largely inspired by Cubism, he began to experiment with geometric compositions featuring angular shafts of darkness and light. In Betty in her Attic, his disparately-lit female subject is tucked into a network of intersecting planes formed by the floor, walls, rafters and an unseen dormer window.

IN THE FRAME: WILLO PERRON

What are you working on currently?

Willo Perron: 'A mix of studio and personal projects that aren't public yet, but we did just launch a new chair with Knoll.'

What ritual or routine keeps you going?

WP: 'Most mornings start with tennis before heading into the studio. If we're talking creative input, I'm always researching across different sources – books, film, exhibitions, online, etc. And when I travel, I'm on the ground exploring the area through its museums, galleries, local markets, restaurants – whatever exposes me to what is distinctive about that place'

What work of art made you see things differently?

WP: 'Music was probably my gateway drug into any of the creative fields. There's a moment in Straight, No Chaser, the documentary on Thelonious Monk, that has stayed with me: he's rehearsing before a show in Europe, shifting time signatures mid-performance, while the band continues on. Watching him deconstruct time like that made me understand the depth of his genius. When you get so good at something it's at a point where it no longer controls you, but instead you see above the clouds.'

Which artist or designer from history do you wish you knew more about?

WP: 'I was just in Sao Paulo and someone recommended the book Francis Bacon in Your Blood by Michael Peppiatt. I just started reading it, and I'm obsessed with him and his work.'

What artists or designers are you excited about right now?

WP: 'In the basement of the MASP in Sao Paulo, there is this one Salman Toor painting, and seeing it reminded me of how much I love his work. There is something very kind and vulnerable that comes through his paintings. On the same trip, I came across the sculptor Laura Vinci. It was my first time seeing her work and I found some really interesting ideas – like her use of smoke and perishable materials. There was an element of impermanence that really struck me – something that parallels the nature of working on shows and temporary spaces.'
