RESTORATION OF STATEHOOD

OMAR ABDULLAH CONSIDERS BECOMING PARTY TO J&K STATEHOOD PLEA IN TOP COURT



Diary Times Desk: Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Omar Abdullah is considering becoming a party to the statehood plea in the Supreme Court. The Chief Minister has also contradicted the central government's claim before the top court that it's in consultation with the J&K government over the restoration of

"It's actively being discussed with the legal team, and there is a possibility that as Chief Minister, I will make myself party to this case," said Abdullah.

Abdullah, who completed one year in office without any headway on restoration of statehood, blamed the centre for no keeping the promise it made to the people of Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh.

He denied having any consultation with the central government on statehood, a claim made by the centre during a Supreme Court hearing on the restoration of statehood to J&K

On October 10, the Solicitor General of India (SG), Tushar Mehta, informed the top court that the central government is in consultation

"No. The first I heard about this was when the Supreme Court was informed," said Abdullah when he was asked about the Solicitor

The Supreme Court is hearing a petition seeking early restoration of statehood to Jammu and Kashmir. It has granted four weeks to the central government to respond to the statehood plea

Now, the J&K Chief Minister said that he too is considering becoming a party to the case

"I have discussed with senior lawyers about the possibility of becoming a party to this case as Chief Minister of Jammu and Kashmir because I think nobody understands the disadvantages we are put to by being a Union Territory than I do. I'm the only person in the entire country with the experience of being both Chief Minister of the state and the union territory".

Last week, an interim order was passed by a bench led by Chief Justice of India BR Gavai following a statement made by the SG. The top law officer of the government also told the court that incidents like the Pahalgam terrorist attack must also be considered before restoring the statehood to J&K.

DELHI WAKES UP TO 'POOR' AIR QUALITY, PULMONOLOGIST WARNS OF HEALTH RISKS

Diary Times Desk: The Air Quality Index (AQI) around Akshardham was recorded at 230, in the 'Poor' category, in Delhi this morning as per the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB). The Air Quality Index (AQI) at the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium area recorded an AQI of 252, as seen from visuals taken near Barapullah Bridge.

Raising concern regarding higher levels of AQI, Pulmonologist Dr Sharad Joshi from Ghaziabad said to ANI, "Air Quality Index (AQI) has risen significantly, leading to higher levels of particulate pollutants from sources like crop burning, vehicular exhaust, and fireworks. This exacerbates respiratory issues for those with conditions such as COPD, asthma, or a history of tuberculosis, causing symptoms like cough, fever, breathlessness, and chest pain." He added that even those without prior respiratory problems, especially children and the elderly, are at risk due to weakened immunity.

Dr Joshi further said that while the use of 'green crackers' during Diwali emits fewer pollutants, they are "not entirely harmless." He emphasised that vehicular exhaust remains a year-round contributor to Delhi's pollution, with the situation worsening in October and November due to stagnant weather conditions.

To mitigate the effects of poor air quality, Dr Joshi suggested, "to reduce vehicle use through

carpooling, maintain vehicle pollution levels, use air purifiers indoors, ensure proper kitchen ventilation, avoid indoor pollution sources like incense, and for those with respiratory issues, continuing regular medication and considering preventive vaccines.

"Additionally, wearing N95 or double surgical masks during outdoor activities is advised for everyone to protect against poor air quality," he added.



TELANGANA BANDH TODAY **OVER BACKWARD CLASSES** RESERVATION ISSUE



Diary Times Desk : The Telangana government announced that it would join the Saturday statewide bandh that protests the judicial intervention on backward classes reservation.

The statewide bandh is also being backed by the opposition parties- the Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) and the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). The shutdown could impact public transport and the

functioning of markets.
The bandh comes as the state election commission (SEC) faces a two-week deadline by the Telangana High Court to report on proceeding with the local body elections under the old reservation

The high court gave the SEC a deadline to provide a compliance report on the court's earlier directive. This order requires the SEC to conduct the local body elections including polls for Zilla Parishad Territorial Constituencies and Mandal Parishad Territorial Constituencies, under the existing reservation pattern and not the enhanced quota proposed by the state government.
On October 9, the high court had put an

interim stay on Government Order No. 9 that sought to increase the reservation for Backward Classes in local bodies from 25%

The court stayed the order because the proposed 42% backward classes quota when combined with existing reservations for SCs and STs, would raise the total reservation to 67%, a figure that violates the Supreme Court's mandated 50%

constitutional ceiling in general areas.

The court also noted the government's failure to fully comply with the Supreme Court-mandated 'triple test' for determining the quantum of Other Backward Classes (OBC) reservations.

RISHI SUNAK'S POST ON PM MODI, INDIA AFTER ATTENDING NDTV WORLD **SUMMIT 2025**



Diary Times Desk : Former British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak has praised India's "energy and ambition" and described the India-UK partnership as "hugely promising for the future," after attending the NDTV World Summit 2025 in New Delhi.

In a social media post following the event, Sunak wrote: "It was a pleasure to join the NDTV World Summit in New reconnect with my good friend di. We spoke about the challenges and @narendramodi. opportunities shaping the decade ahead, from AI and infrastructure to global growth and economic resilience India's energy and ambition are unmistakable. As new ideas and industries emerge, there's huge potential for deeper partnerships between countries like the UK and India in business, technology and education."

The post followed his appearance at the two-day summit, where Sunak discussed globalisation, the recently concluded India-UK trade agreement, and the growing importance of cooperation in an era of geopolitical uncertainty.

Speaking at a session moderated by NDTV's CEO and Editor-in-Chief Rahul Kanwal, Senior Managing Editor Vishnu Som, and Managing Editor Padmaja Joshi, the former British PM said the world he grew up in "no longer

"The old global order, or globalisation, that I grew up with, which came into place after the fall of the Berlin Wall, that is gone, and I don't think it is coming back," Sunak said.

LEH SEES RESTRICTIONS, KARGIL HOLDS SILENT MARCH OVER LADAKH STATEHOOD



Diary Times Desk: A planned silent march, jointly called by Leh Apex Body (LAB) and Kargil Democratic Alliance (KDA) as part of their agitation for statehood and safeguards under sixth schedule of the constitution, was thwarted here on Saturday as authorities imposed strict security measures and suspended mobile internet.

However, Kargil witnessed a peaceful silent march with KDA leaders condemning the restrictions in Leh but welcomed the announcement of a judicial probe into the September 24 firing incident that left several people dead and scores of others injured.

Officials said police and paramilitary forces were deployed in strength

in Leh and adjoining areas amid a call by the two agitating groups for a two-hour silent march from 10 am and three-hour black out from 6 pm across Ladakh to express solidarity with those who lost their lives in widespread violence on September 24, were injured or unlawfully

'We have called for a silent march to peacefully highlight our demands but the administration, by using its might, have demonstrated its failure. They have deployed forces in strength and did not allow the people to assemble for the march," Anjuman Imamia

president and a member of LAB Ashraf Ali Barcha told reporters. He said the government should hold talks with the people rather than employing such curbs to browbeat them.

Anjuman Moin ul Islam chief Abdul Qayoom claimed that the co-chairman of the LAB, Chering Dorjay, was also put under house arrest, appealing people not to make any attempt to reach the venue of the march in view of the stringent security measures.

KERALA EDUCATION MINISTER OFFERS SUPPORT TO GIRL REFUSED ENTRY **OVER HIJAB**



Diary Times Desk : Kerala General Education Minister V Sivankutty on Saturday said the government is ready to help the Muslim girl student, who was barred from wearing a hijab in a Church-run private school in Kochi, to get admission in any other institution where she wishes to join. A special order will be issued if the student

approaches the government with a request for the same, the minister told reporters

The announcement by the minister came a day after the student's father had said that he would like to seek admission in some

other institution for his daughter.
"So, if the student is interested and she approaches the government, we will take steps to get her admission in any school she wishes to join through a special order," the

minister said. Sivankutty said as per the culture of the state, no student should miss an opportunity for studies due to lack of admission.

He also said the issues have pained the girl and St Rita school management is responsible for any mental stress she undergoes.

The father of the Class VIII student had on Friday said that she would not be sent back to the school.

WHAT HAL CHIEF TEST PILOT TOLD NDTV AFTER FLYING NEW LCA TEJAS MARK 1A



Diary Times Desk: Defence Minister Rajnath Singh flagged off the first Light Combat Aircraft (LCA) Tejas Mk1A on Friday at Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd's (HAL) facility in Maharashtra's Nashik. He also inaugurated the third production line of the LCA Tejas Mk1A, and the second production line of Hindustan Turbo Trainer-40 (HTT-40) at the same facility.

"We hope that this aircraft will be a game-changer. After the MiG-21 was phased out recently, the Indian Air Force will have close to 220 Tejas, so this will become the mainstay of the IAF," Group Captain Venugopal told NDTV.

HAL Chairman and Managing Director DK Sunil, who watched the new LCA Tejas take to the sky, told NDTV that the third production line of the Tejas inaugurated by the Defence Minister is a moment of pride for HAL and the nation.

"We will be able to speed up new aircraft deliveries to the Indian Air Force. We can give them 24 Tejas every year using the three production lines. We also have private partners who supply components," Sunil said.

KHAWAJA ASIF'S BIG WARNING TO AFGHANS IN PAK, THEN AN UNPROVOKED INDIA LINK

Diary Times Desk: Pakistan's Defence Minister Khawaja Asif has escalated tensions by again linking India with Islamabad's ongoing conflict with Kabul. The Pakistani Defence Minister also declared an end to Afghanistan ties and asked all Afghans living in Pakistan to return to their "homeland."

His comments came as the deadline for the 48-hour ceasefire ended at 6 pm local time. However, media reports said that the truce was extended as representatives of the two sides were set to meet in Doha, Qatar, to find a solution to the current tension.

"There will no longer be protest notes or appeals for peace; no delegations will go to Kabul. Wherever the source of terrorism lies, it will have to pay a heavy price," Asif said in a post on X.

He alleged that Kabul has become a "proxy of India" and is conspiring against Pakistan along with New Delhi and the banned Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP).

DEFENCE MINISTER INAUGURATES CRITICAL DEFENCE AND AEROSPACE MATERIALS PLANT IN LUCKNOW

Diary Times Desk: Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Saturday inaugurated one of the first Titanium and Superalloy Materials Plants at PTC Industries' Strategic Materials Technology Complex in Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh.

Rajnath Singh reiterated that India would acquire true strength only when it can manufacture its own materials, components, chips, and alloys.

"India must produce rare materials used in defence and aerospace to become a technology creator and safeguard its technological sovereignty," said Defence Minister Rajnath Singh.

Emphasizing the importance of Rare Earth Materials used in defence, space, electronics, and other sectors, the Defence Minister noted that only certain countries have the capacity to refine these materials and make high-end products.

He stated that this new plant puts India amongst a select group of nations which can make their own critical defence and aerospace materials. "With this, we will be able to manufacture the parts used in our fighter jets, missiles, naval systems, and satellites," he said.

In this context, he said the inaugurated plant, which is one of the first private sector manufacturing units to make aero-engine components and superalloy components, will go a long way in helping India produce rare materials.

FIRE BREAKS OUT IN AMRITSAR-SAHARSA GARIB RATH EXPRESS IN PUNJAB

Diary Times Desk: A fire broke out in a coach of the Amritsar-Saharsa Garib Rath Express near Sirhind railway station here on Saturday morning, officials said.

According to the Railway Board, one person sustained minor injuries in the incident, the reason behind which is yet to be ascertained.

The fire broke out around 7:30 AM when the train (number 12204) was coming from Amritsar.

A Government Railway Police (GRP) official said smoke was noticed in one of the AC coaches of the train.

A passenger pulled a chain (alarm chain pulling system) to stop the train. Thereafter, the passengers were safely evacuated from the coach, the official said.

The fire soon engulfed the coach (G-19). Two other coaches also faced minor impact. The three coaches were separated from the rest of the train and fire tenders were immediately called in, the GRP official said.

INTERESTS OF FARMERS, SMALL INDUSTRIES TO BE PROTECTED IN INDIA-US TRADE TALKS: PIYUSH GOYAL



Diary Times Desk: Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal on Saturday said talks between India and the US on the proposed bilateral trade agreement are progressing in a cordial atmosphere and New Delhi will protect the interests of farmers, fishermen and MSME sectors.

"Bharat ke kisano ka, machhuvaaron ka, Bharat ke MSME sector ka, jub tak desh hiton ko puri tarah se hum sambhalen nai, tab tak koi agreement kiya nai jata (No agreement can be made until we take care of the interests of India's farmers, fishermen and MSME sector)," he told reporters here.

He was replying to a question about the progress of talks between the two countries on the proposed pact and by when it will be concluded.

SENIOR PUNJAB COP SUSPENDED AFTER BEING ARRESTED IN RS 8-LAKH BRIBERY CASE

Diary Times Desk: Punjab Deputy Inspector General of Police (Ropar Range) Harcharan Singh Bhullar, who was arrested by the CBI in a bribery case, has been suspended, according to a state government order.

Bhullar, along with another person, was arrested on Thursday in connection with a corruption case involving bribery of Rs 8 lakh.

Bhullar was held from his Mohali office following a complaint lodged by a Fatehgarh Sahib-based scrap dealer, who accused the senior IPS officer of demanding recurring monthly payment for "settling" a 2023 FIR against him.

Bhullar was sent to judicial custody by a CBI court here on Friday.

An order of the Punjab Home Affairs department issued on Saturday said, as per Rule 3(2) of the All India Services (Discipline & Appeal) Rules, "a member of the service who is detained in official custody whether on a criminal charge or otherwise for a period longer than forty-eight hours, shall be deemed to have been suspended by the Government concerned under this rule." "In pursuance of the said Rule, Harcharan Singh Bhullar, IPS is hereby deemed to be suspended with effect from 16.10.2025, as 48 hours have lapsed since his arrest," stated the order.

CBI ARRESTS JKLFC SECTION OFFICER ON **BRIBERY CHARGES**

Diary Times Desk: The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has arrested a Section Officer (Legal) of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh Finance Corporation (JKLFC) Jammu for demanding a bribe of Rs 80,000 and accepting the first instalment of Rs 20,000, the probe agency said in a release on Saturday.

According to the CBI release, a complaint was received to the effect that the accused Section Officer was demanding a bribe of Rs 80,000 from the complainant for processing the file pertaining to the settlement of the MSME loan of Rs 51 lacs of the complainant. During the negotiation by the complainant, the first instalment was settled at Rs 20,000. CBI laid a trap on Friday and caught the accused while accepting a bribe of Rs 20,000 as the first instalment from the complainant through online UPI transaction at a Mobile Number

As per negotiations, the remaining amount was to be paid after a favourable decision is taken in this regard, it said, adding that further investigation is underway.

NOIDA DOCTOR ACCUSES IPS OFFICER HUSBAND, 6 OTHERS OF 'DOWRY HARASSMENT'

Diary Times Desk: An FIR has been registered against a Karnatakacadre IPS officer and six others on charges of dowry harassment, domestic violence and offences. The complaint was lodged by his wife, who is doctor based in Noida, police said on Saturday.

According to officials, the complaint was filed by Kriti Singh, a resident of Sector 128 in Noida, against her husband Shivanshu Rajput, a 2019batch IPS officer posted in Bengaluru, along with his father, mother, brother, sister-in-law and two friends.

"The FIR has been registered under sections 85, 115(2), 352, 351(2), 3(5), and 316(2) of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023, as well as sections 3 and 4 of the Dowry Prohibition Act, 1961," Bhupendra Kumar, Station Incharge of Sector 126 Police Station. told PTI.

In her 41-page complaint filed on October 16, Singh alleged that she was subjected to dowry demands and physical as well as mental harassment since her marriage in December 2021, which took place at a five-star hotel in Agra. The couple has a one-and-a-half-year-old son.

AMID AFGHAN CONFLICT, PAK ARMY CHIEF **ASIM MUNIR'S ANTI-INDIA NUCLEAR** RHETORIC



Diary Times Desk: Pakistani Army Chief, Field Marshal Asim Munir, has issued fresh threats against India. While Pakistan itself was raining bombs on Afghan civilians, Munir doubled down on anti-India nuclear rhetoric, claiming Islamabad's misconceived immunity of India's geographical warspace."

Delivering a highly provocative address at the Pakistan Military Academy (PMA) in Kakul, Munir claimed that there was "no space for war in a nuclearised environment."

But in the very next sentence, he warned that even a "minor provocation" would invite a "decisive, beyond proportions" response from Pakistan.

CHINA'S PL-15E MISSILE **MISFIRE BY PAKISTAN COULD GIVE INDIA'S ASTRA MISSILE AN UNEXPECTED EDGE: REPORT**

Diary Times Desk: While Operation Sindoor has demonstrated to the world the capabilities of India's indigenous defence systems, it has also been helping India to improve its weapon systems—in a rather unexpected way. The discovery of an unexploded export variant of China's PL-15E long-range beyond-visual-range air-to-air missile (BVRAAM), developed by the China Airborne Missile Academy (CAMA), in a field near Hoshiarpur of Punjab has helped Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) to make India's Astra Mark-2 programme better by incorporating the advanced features of the China-made missile, according to a Hindustan Times report. The missile was found exploded as it reportedly did not have a self-destruct mechanism. Pakistan Air Force (PAF) is the first and only confirmed operator of the PL-15E in the operational context.

The missile that was found by the Indian side could have been fired.

NC SET TO CONCEDE NAGROTA SEAT IN **J&K BYPOLLS TO CONGRESS TO MEND** STRAINED TIES AFTER RS SEAT SNUB

Diary Times Desk: In a bid to iron out differences in the alliance, the ruling National Conference (NC) is all set to concede the Nagrota Assembly seat in the upcoming J&K bypolls to its ally Congress.

The conciliatory move comes after the NC snubbed the grand old party in the Rajya Sabha polls from Jammu and Kashmir by denying a safe seat.

Sources said the talks are on between NC and Congress at the highest level on the seat sharing on the bypolls to two J&K Assembly seats --Nagrota (in Jammu) and Budgam (in Kashmir). Congress has been desirous of contesting the Nagrota seat and leaving the Valley seat to NC during the negotiations, they said.

The sources revealed that Congress has been upset and hurt by NC's snub in the Rajya Sabha polls despite making commitments for a safe seat to the party. Congress wants NC to spare the Nagrota seat for the party, or it would contest from both the bypoll seats.

YUSUF PATHAN VISITS BENGAL'S ADINA MOSQUE, BJP CALLS IT **ADINATH TEMPLE**

Diary Times Desk: A social media post by Trinamool Congress (TMC) MP and former cricketer Yusuf Pathan has triggered a storm in West Bengal over an ancient mosque in Malda.

"The Adina Mosque in Malda, West Bengal, is a historic mosque built in the 14th century by Sultan Sikandar Shah, the second ruler of the Ilyas Shahi dynasty. Constructed in 1373-1375 CE, it was the largest mosque in the Indian subcontinent during its time, showcasing the region's architectural grandeur," Pathan wrote on X on Thursday with photos at the archaeological monument.

Last year, a group of priests held Hindu rituals inside the mosque. One of the priests, Hiranmoy Goswami, President of Vishwavidya Trust in Vrindavan, had spotted Hindu deities and claimed the mosque was built over a Hindu temple. Goswami, along with the other priests, held a prayer service. They, however, were stopped when the locals informed the police.

1.5 HOURS, 7 KM, AND AN 8-MONTH PREGNANT WIFE': BENGALURU MAN QUESTIONS IF CITY IS LIVEABLE

Diary Times Desk: The festive season has taken a toll on | Bengaluru residents who have had to endure massive traffic jams, forcing them to spend hours sitting idle in their vehicles. A social media user has now vented their frustration, questioning if Bengaluru was liveable anymore after they were forced to spend 1.5 hours in traffic, whilst covering a mere distance of seven kilometres with a heavily pregnant wife beside them.

GitaGPT is an artificial intelligence (AI) chatbot trained on the Bhagavad Gita, the holy book of 700 verses of dialogue with the Hindu god Krishna. GitaGPT looks like any text conversation you'd have with a friend – except the AI tells you you're texting with a god.

'When I couldn't clear my banking exams, I was dejected," Meel says. But after stumbling on GitaGPT, he typed in details about his inner crisis and asked for the Al's advice. "Focus on your actions and let go of the worry for its fruit," GitaGPT said. This, along with other guidance, left Meel feeling inspired.

OVER 250 PASSENGERS STRANDED IN ITALY'S MILAN AS AIR INDIA **CANCELS DELHI FLIGHT OVER 'TECHNICAL SNAG'**

Diary Times Desk : An Air India Dreamliner aircraft faced a technical issue at the Milan airport on Friday, forcing the airline to cancel its flight to Delhi and leaving over 250 passengers stranded in the Italian city.

Most of the passengers have been rebooked in flight on October 20, which is also Diwali.

Air India on Saturday said flight A1138 from Milan to Delhi on October 17 was cancelled due to an extended technical requirement on the aircraft scheduled to operate the flight.

There were posts on social media complaining about lack of adequate facilities for the passengers.

"All affected passengers have been provided hotel accommodations; however, due to limited availability, accommodations were arranged outside the immediate vicinity of the airport," the airline said in a statement on Saturday.

From tightening visa regulations to steep living expenses, these countries are starting to feel like gated communities reserved for the ultraprepared or the ultra-wealthy.

But relocation isn't limited to the most popular routes. Across Europe, several lesser known nations are quietly opening their doors to international residents offering affordable education, flexible visa options.

EUROPE MUST BE TOUGHER ON CHINA TRADE, BUNDESBANK CHIEF SAYS

Diary Times Desk: Europe, in its trade dealings with China, needs to act "in a more offensive way" to protect its own interests and those of its companies, Bundesbank President Joachim Nagel said on Saturday.

The United States' tariffs this year have caused global turmoil as China has retaliated and rerouted some of the products it can no longer export to the U.S. to other markets

"When it comes to China, let me only say one thing: China needs Europe more than Europe needs China." Nagel, who sits on the ECB's Governing Council, said in Washington.

"We are a strong economy. We are four hundred fifty million people... So we should play the European card in a more offensive way."

Nagel said Europe needed to avoid a trade war with China and should maintain a dialogue but also needed to protect its own markets.

"The point that I would like to say here is that Europe should play the cards in a way that we are more convinced about ourselves.

Diary Times Desk: The Afghanistan Cricket Board (ACB) on Saturday expressed profound grief over the killing of three Afghan cricketers in a Pakistani airstrike in Paktika province and announced its withdrawal from the upcoming Tri-Nation T20I series involving Pakistan.

In a statement posted on X, the ACB said, "The Afghanistan Cricket Board expresses its deepest sorrow and grief over the tragic martyrdom of the brave cricketers from Urgun District in Paktika Province, who were targeted this evening in a cowardly attack carried out by the Pakistani regime."

The board confirmed that the players, identified as Kabeer, Sibghatullah, and Haroon, were among eight people killed in the airstrike in the Urgun district. Seven others were reportedly injured.The players had earlier travelled to Sharana, the provincial capital of Paktika, to participate in a friendly cricket match. They were targeted after returning home to Urgun during a local gathering, according to the ΔCR

In response to the incident, the ACB announced that it would not take part in the Tri-Nation T201 series scheduled for late November, which was to feature Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka.

EXPOSITION OF HOLY RELICS OF BUDDHA IN RUSSIA'S KALMYKIA DRAWS OVER 90.000 DEVOTEES

Diary Times Desk: The exposition of a portion of the sacred relics of Lord Buddha, currently enshrined at a monastery in Russia's Kalmykia, has drawn more than 90,000 devotees since it was brought to that country a week ago, officials said.

CHINESE NOBEL LAUREATE AND PHYSICIST CHEN NING **YANG DIES AGED 103**

Diary Times Desk: Chen Ning Yang, Nobel laureate and one of the world's most influential physicists, has died at the age of 103, according to Chinese state media. An obituary released by CCTV cited illness as the cause of death.

Yang and fellow theoretical physicist, Lee Tsung-Dao, were jointly awarded the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1957 for their work in parity laws, which led to important discoveries regarding elementary particles - the building blocks of matter.

Yang was also a professor at prestigious Beijing's Tsinghua University and an honorary dean of the Institute for Advanced Study at the institution.

Born in 1922 in China's eastern Anhui province, he was the oldest of five children and raised on the campus of Tsinghua University where his father was a professor of mathematics.

As a teenager, Yang told his parents: "One day, I want to win the Nobel Prize." He achieved that dream at the age of 35, when his work with Lee studying the law of parity earned them the honour in 1957. The Nobel committee praised "their penetrating investigation... which has led to important discoveries regarding elementary particles".

WE LOVE AMERICA, NOT TRUMP': MILLIONS RALLY IN US 'NO KINGS' PROTESTS

Diary Times Desk: Huge crowds are expected to hit the streets Saturday from New York to San Francisco to vent their anger over President Donald Trump's hardline policies at nationwide "No Kings" protests slammed by Republicans as "Hate America" rallies.

More than 2,700 demonstrations are planned coast to coast, from big cities to small towns, and even near Trump's Mar-a-Lago residence in Florida, where he is spending the weekend. Organisers say they are expecting millions to attend.

Those numbers would match the massive turnout at similar events on June 14, Trump's birthday and the day of a giant military parade in the US capital, in outrage over the Trump administration's crackdown on undocumented migrants and its deployment of National Guard troops to Los Angeles.

Since then, Trump, who returned to the White House in January, has ordered National Guard troops into Washington and Memphis. Planned deployments to Chicago and Portland, Oregon have so far been blocked in the courts.

ELEVEN KILLED AFTER ISRAEL HITS BUS IN GAZA, HAMAS-RUN CIVIL DEFENCE SAYS

Diary Times Desk: Gaza's Hamas-run civil defence says 11 people were killed, all from the same family, after the bus they were in was hit by an Israeli tank shell in northern Gaza.

The Abu Shaaban family, it said, were trying to reach their home to inspect it when the incident happened in the Zeitoun neighbourhood of Gaza City on Friday night.

This is the deadliest single incident involving Israeli soldiers in Gaza since the start of the ceasefire eight days ago.

The Israeli military said soldiers had fired at a "suspicious vehicle" that had crossed the so-called yellow line demarcating the area still occupied by Israeli forces in Gaza.

Israeli soldiers continue to operate in more than half of the Gaza Strip, under the terms of the first phase of the ceasefire agreement.

CAN PUTIN'S 'FLYING KREMLIN' TRAVEL THROUGH EU AIRSPACE TO BUDAPEST?

Diary Times Desk: The summit has not been set in stone, but if Russia's Vladimir Putin does go to Budapest to meet US President Trump in the next two weeks, he would need to clear a few hurdles first.

When Putin travelled to Alaska for his Anchorage summit in August, the US granted special permission for the presidential plane – a modified llyushin II–96 airliner dubbed the "Flying Kremlin" that has four engines and is bristling with defence systems.

Russian planes are banned from US airspace, and from EU airspace too. So if Putin does fly to Budapest he would need special dispensation if he decided to fly over an EU member state.



It is perfectly possible, but landlocked Hungary is not the easiest destination to get to for a Russian president who rarely sets foot abroad and has not travelled to the EU for years.

"For now, of course, it's not clear," says Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov. "What we do have is the willingness of the presidents to hold such a meeting."

Days after Putin ordered Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, the EU froze the assets of both its leader and Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov.

A blanket ban was also imposed on all Russian aircraft flying through the airspace of all 27 EU countries. Hungary and many of its neighbours are Nato member states too.

Putin has also been accused by the International Criminal Court (ICC) of war crimes of unlawfully deporting and transferring of Ukrainian children to Russia.

So there are complications, although Hungary believes they can all be sorted out. Hungary is in the process of pulling out of the ICC anyway.

AFGHAN, PAKISTANI DELEGATIONS HEAD TO DOHA TO RESOLVE DEADLY BORDER CLASHES

Diary Times Desk: Afghan and Pakistani delegations are heading to the Qatari capital Doha to defuse the deadliest crisis between them in several years, after more than a week of fighting that killed dozens of people and injured hundreds on both sides.

The Taliban government said Saturday that the Afghan delegation included the defence minister and the head of the national intelligence agency. A Pakistani delegation was due to depart Saturday, the national broadcaster PTV had said a day earlier. It did not give further details. Each country says it is responding to aggression from the other. Pakistan accuses Afghanistan of harboring militants who carry out attacks in border areas, a charge rejected by the Taliban.

DISAPPOINTMENT IN KYIV AS ZELENSKY LEAVES WHITE HOUSE EMPTY-HANDED



Diary Times Desk: One word sticks out in the Ukrainian leader's description of his latest high-stakes foray into the nerve-centre of American power.

His White House conversation with President Donald Trump, Volodymyr Zelensky wrote on X, was "pointed". But we don't need to parse his semantic description of the exchange to know that this was not the meeting that the Ukrainian side had been expecting.

If the old British adage holds true that a week is a long time in politics, then Zelensky appears to have set a new record.

A short transatlantic flight, it seems, is now an age.

As they set off for Washington on Thursday, the Ukrainian side was in high spirits.

Listen to the words of Ruslan Stefanchuk, the speaker of Ukraine's parliament – effectively the country's second in command – and a politician fiercely loyal to Zelensky.

In an interview with the BBC shortly before the president's plane took off, Stefanchuk described the trip as a "very important historical moment".

The meeting, he said, would leave the world in no doubt that Trump "finally understands that Putin is a liar, he can't be trusted, and actions are needed to stop the war".

MARC BENIOFF APOLOGIZES FOR SUGGESTING NATIONAL **GUARD BE SENT TO SAN FRANCISCO**

Salesforce billionaire Marc Benioff backtracked on Friday from comments suggesting President Donald Trump should send the National Guard to San Francisco. The tech CEO's remarks initially drew a wave of criticism.



Diary Times Desk: Oversized crowbars bend wood for a piano's rim. Circular sanders smooth rough edges on costly Sitka spruce soundboards. Hammers and chisels notch a bridge to allow piano strings to vibrate freely.

For 30 years, Bernard Craddock has been one of the roughly 200 workers handcrafting pianos at the 150year-old Steinway & Sons factory in Astoria, a neighborhood in the New York borough of Queens.

"Everybody has a specific job here," Craddock said, working on a piano frame. "My job is to set this straight for the hammers to hit the strings."

Investors have taken notice. In the last year alone, Build-A-Bear's stock is up 76%. In the last five years, the toy company's share price (BBW) has risen nearly 2,000% - besting even tech companies riding the Al boom like Palantir, Nvidia and Microsoft.

SMART MOVES TO MAKE WHEN THE FED STARTS **CUTTING RATES**

Diary Times Desk: Over the past couple of years, the Federal Reserve aggressively raised its kev interest rate to a 23-vear high to beat down inflation. Now that inflation has slowed substantially and is expected to cool further, the central bank is expected to embark on a ratecutting campaign over the next two years, starting as early as September.

If it does, rates should decline on a wide swath of financial products for Americans, from credit cards and home loans to bank accounts and certificates of deposit, among others.

Given how many ways lower rates can affect your finances, here are some things to consider when deciding what steps to take in response.

Timing and magnitude matter The prospect of lower borrowing costs will be welcome news to those seeking loans or anyone trying to reduce their existing debt loads. But, realistically, how much you'll save when the Fed lowers rates will depend on how quickly it cuts and by how much each time. The answer for the near term is most likely to be "not that much." "Interest rates took the elevator going up, but they will take the stairs coming down," said Greg McBride, chief financial analyst at Bankrate.

SMARTMATIC INDICTED IN FOREIGN BRIBERY CASE, POSSIBLY ENDANGERING ITS LAWSUITS AGAINST FOX NEWS AND GIULIANI



Diary Times Desk: The Justice Department on Thursday filed foreign bribery charges against Smartmatic, the voting technology company that is suing Fox News and other prominent pro-Trump figures for defamation over their promotion of 2020 election lies.

The bribery and money laundering charges against Smartmatic grose from an existing case filed last year against some of its current and former executives, including its founder. The indictment relates to an alleged \$1 million bribe paid to the top election official in the Philippines to secure lucrative contracts for that country's 2016 elections. The indictment doesn't include any allegations of voter fraud or election-rigging against Smartmatic. The news could be catastrophic for Smartmatic, potentially weakening its hand in pending 2020 electionrelated defamation lawsuits against Fox News, the Fox News host turned US attorney Jeanine Pirro, ex-Trump lawyer Rudy Giuliani and MyPillow CEO Mike Lindell.

Adventure No. 1: Trouble with banks

You could choose door No. 1 and subscribe to the dominant concern of the week: A number of high-profile bankruptcies in consumer-facing industries may have exposed an underlying economic weakness that threatens parts of the banking sector.

A small number of regional banks have reported some bad loans this past week. The bankruptcies of a major auto parts company and a subprime auto lender have exposed bigger lenders, including JPMorgan and Wall Street finance company Jefferies, to potentially significant losses.

A number of the lenders are alleging they were victims of fraud. But if you believe these are canaries in the coal mine – and not a series of isolated incidents – it might mean a growing number of consumers won't be able to pay back their loans or may rein in their spending with companies that owe banks a bunch of money. That could drag down lenders that are most susceptible if the economy really starts to take a turn for the worse.

To paraphrase JPMorgan CEO Jamie Dimon this week, these bank problems may be cockroaches that could signal the presence of other hidden cockroaches.

Trump and his administration quickly walked back those threats, confirming a Xi meeting was still on. And today Trump said he understood significantly higher tariffs on China wouldn't be sustainable.

Investors have largely ignored the economic impact of President Donald Trump's tariffs over the past six months, as prognosticators' worst predictions about high inflation and a slowing economy have failed to come to fruition.

OLD-AGE PENSION HIKED TO RS 3,200; HARYANA CM SAINI SHOWCASES 'MODI MODEL' AT ANNIVERSARY EVENT

A Bench led by Justice Surya Kant took suo motu cognisance of a shocking case of digital arrest of an elderly couple in Ambala on the basis of forged orders of the top court and probe agencies by fraudsters to extort more than Rs 1.05 crore. It also asked Haryana Government and Superintendent of Police, Cybercrime, Ambala, to file their response.

"The forgery of documents and the brazen criminal misuse of the name, seal and judicial authority of this court or a high court is a matter of grave concern. The fabrication of judicial orders bearing forged signatures of judges strikes at the very foundation of public trust in the judicial system, besides the rule of law, the Bench said.

'WHAT'S SO SPECIAL ABOUT THIS CASE', HC ASKS PETITIONER SEEKING CBI

Diary Times Desk: About 10 days after senior IPS officer Y Puran Kumar "allegedly died by suicide", the matter today reached the Punjab and Haryana High Court with the filing of a petition in public interest seeking a CBI probe. Taking up the matter, the Bench of Chief Justice Sheel Nagu and Justice Sanjiv Berry adjourned the hearing after questioning the PIL-petitioner's counsel on the guidelines laid down by the apex court for transferring matters to an independent body.

At the onset, the counsel for petitioner Navneet Kumar argued that one of the officials conducting investigation had also committed suicide, and the incident had shaken the conscience of society. "Senior officials are committing suicide and alleging victimisation and naming more than dozen of senior IPS and IAS officers. As such, it is a matter of concern. Humble submission is that some Central agency can conduct a fair investigation," the counsel stated.

Chief Justice Nagu questioned the counsel on circumstances warranting the transfer of investigation to the CBI. "What is so special about this case? When do we hand over investigation to CBI? Which are those decisions of the Supreme Court? There has to be some extraordinary circumstances".



Israel Identifies Body Of Tenth Hostage As A 75-Year-Old Man

he body of a tenth deceased hostage returned to Israel from Gaza under the recent ceasefire deal has been identified as the truce entered a second week despite facing a number of tests and with the next steps unresolved.

"Kibbutz Nir Oz announces the return for burial of our beloved Eliyahu (Churchill) Margalit, of blessed memory," a spokesperson for the kibbutz, or village, said in a statement.

The Israeli Prime Minister's Office (PMO) and the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) confirmed the identity of Margalit, who was 75 at the time he was killed in the Hamas-led attack on Israel on October 7 two years ago. His body was later taken to Gaza, the Israeli military said.

"We will always remember him as a kind-hearted man whose world was filled with family, kibbutz, nature, and animals," the kibbutz said

Hamas' armed wing, al-Qassam Brigades, has previously called for help, saying on Wednesday that "significant efforts and special equipment" are needed to recover the bodies of the remaining hostages.

In that statement, al-Qassam Brigades said it has "abided by what was agreed upon and has handed over all the living captives in its possession and the corpses it could access."

Ceasefire holds despite killings

For the moment, both sides appear to believe the ceasefire in Gaza is holding though not without coming under strain from the failure of Hamas to return all the bodies, the initially slow entry of aid into the enclave, and continued, if isolated, incidents of killings of Palestinians in Israeli

A Palestinian family travelling back to their home in the north of the Gaza were killed by the Israeli military on Friday after their vehicle crossed a line that marks Israel's control under the ceasefire agreement, the spokesperson for Gaza's Civil Defense, Mahmoud Basal, told CNN.

The vehicle was carrying 11 civilians, including several women and children, Basal said. After coordinating with the United Nations, Gaza's civil defense recovered on Saturday nine bodies including four children and three women. The bodies of two other children are missing, the civil defense said.

The Israeli military told CNN its troops "fired warning shots" after a "suspicious vehicle was identified crossing the yellow line" - a reference to the initial Israeli withdrawal line. The military said the "vehicle continued to approach the troops in a way that caused an imminent threat to them. Hamas has accused Israel of violating the ceasefire with such killings, but no retaliatory action was taken as of Saturday.

Israel has also allowed more aid to enter in recent days but aid groups are calling for the opening of more crossings to improve deliveries.

DHS STATEMENTS ON ARRESTS FACE A PROBLEM OF CREDIBILITY

Last week, a federal judge temporarily halted the Trump administration's deployment of National Guard troops in Illinois, saying its statements about protests were "not reliable." The administration had highlighted several arrests for carrying weapons and assaulting federal agents - but the judge responded that federal grand juries had refused to indict at least three of those arrested, indicating a lack of probable cause.

"In addition to demonstrating a potential lack of candor by these affiants, it also calls into question their ability to accurately assess the facts," US District Court Judge April Perry wrote in her order of those incidents. A judge openly questioning the credibility of law enforcement reflects a larger problem and raises questions as to what recourse ordinary citizens or immigrants have when accused. "A lawyer's credibility isn't just about personal integrity; it's a factor judges are required to consider when ruling," said Elliot Williams, CNN legal analyst and former federal prosecutor "Simply put, parties lose when courts find their lawyers untrustworthy. DHS's problem is how alarmingly consistent judges have been with their questions about the department's work and its attorneys' trustworthiness." The Trump administration has appealed the ruling. DHS has said it is targeting arrests of the "worst of the worst," and its agents are facing a surge in attacks against them. IN THE FRAME: ARTIST STÉPHANE THIDET

What inspired your transformation of Christie's for Paris Art Week?

There are several important ideas that led me to this installation: the notion of transmission, a common thread, what creates a link, what is recurrent. These thoughts apply to objects that pass through Christie's, going from one hand to another. The history of the building also inspired me.

Many of your installations are in quiet spaces, while this is in a busy city. Has that changed your approach?

It seems important to me that a work of art, though obviously aimed at an audience, should also address the context in which it is located. I have been lucky enough to be invited to work in many places conducive to contemplation — and in such places, whether an abbey or a museum, visitors expect to see, to look, to immerse themselves.

When I work in public spaces, on the other hand, passers-by find themselves becoming viewers quite unexpectedly. As with Rideau in Nantes (where the façade of a theatre was transformed into a waterfall), or Impact in Le Havre (where jets of water strike each other in mid-air), I often introduce a slight distortion or a simple addition to what is already there, so that things we forget to look at out of habit resonate again.

Is Le Fil Rouge influenced by other installation artists, such as Christo and Jeanne-Claude?

Obviously, those two artists are part of my cultural landscape, and many of their projects have had an impact on me. More broadly, artists like Gordon Matta-Clark and Michael Heizer have always fascinated me with their ability to produce work on just the right scale for a given building, place or landscape. But while working on Le Fil Rouge, it was the idea of lines, rhythms, windings and weaving that preoccupied me, and it was artists such as Vera Molnár and Pierrette Bloch that I had in mind.

Does it reference the building's history as the former home of the fashion house Callot Soeurs?

Yes, absolutely. Wherever it's possible and meaningful, I like the idea of awakening the spirit of a place. And this building already had a beautiful story: these four sisters were adventurers in their industry. And their journey touched me all the more because my own grandmother worked in a fashion house when she first arrived in Paris from the countryside, and tales of her adventures were part of my childhood.



KNOWLEDGE, PASSION, DETERMINATION AND PATIENCE: THE LEGENDARY LIFE OF THE ESTEEMED CHINESE CERAMICS COLLECTOR AU BAK LING

Diary Times Desk: Humble beginnings with great ambitions

Au Bak Ling was born in Hong Kong in 1928 into a poor family. When he was only ten years old, he was forced to leave school, in order to help his father run a small, second-hand bookstall. In December 1941, war broke out in Asia-Pacific, and on 25th December Hong Kong was occupied by Japanese troops. Mr. Au was only thirteen years of age at the time, but found himself burdened by the responsibility of supporting his family. Nevertheless, in 1943 he formally started a business under his own name 'Ling Kee'.

Mr. Au quickly realised that self-cultivation was the only way forward, and his first step towards that end was to acquire a good dictionary and to study English assiduously. With his efforts, Mr. Au was able to attain an excellent command of both spoken and written English. His mastery of the Chinese language also enabled him to undertake complex translations and compose elegant Chinese couplets.

The well-known Chinese poet, translator and essayist Dai Wangshu lived in Hong Kong for several years. He wrote a number of essays, including some relating to the literary life of Hong Kong. The young Au Bak Ling featured in one of his articles titled 'Hong Kong's Second-hand Book Market'. 'At the lower end of one of the ladder streets, beside the theatre in Queen's Road Central, there were five stalls going up the steps from the main road. The first one on the left was called Ling Kee, and was run by a ten year-old child, whose father managed a scrap paper stall a little further down. This child was the youngest stall-holder, but he was very well-informed – he knew about Einstein's Theory of Relativity, as well as the works of the great German writer Goethe – and was already the most perspicacious', he wrote.

Talent plus persistent self-improvement, transformed the young Au Bak Ling and changed his destiny. Mr. Au later expanded the Ling Kee business, ordering new books from England. The competition in the book trade was extremely fierce and he found it necessary to move into the retail market, where he managed to become the largest supplier of school textbooks in Hong Kong. It brought Mr. Au considerable satisfaction when, despite the fact that British publishing houses had dominated the market in Hong Kong for more than 120 years, Ling Kee became the major publisher of textbooks for Hong Kong students, many of whom have become leaders in Hong Kong today.

In November 1974, Mr. Au joined a fellow Rotarian in attending an auction preview. Until that time, his interest had only been in Chinese paintings of the Lingnan School. He became enthralled by the great variety of shapes, colours, and decorative styles of the porcelains on display.

Barcelona's potential league fixture being moved to the United States has divided Spanish football.

While La Liga president Javier Tebas continues to push the idea as a way to globalise the league, several clubs, including Real Madrid, have voiced strong opposition, calling it a move that goes against sporting integrity. On Sunday at the Coliseum Alfonso Perez, Real Madrid are expected to take part in a symbolic protest initiated by the Spanish Footballers' Association (AFE). Players will pause for the opening seconds of the ninth round of La Liga matches in response to what they describe as an attempt to "distort the competition."

FINANCIAL FIGURES OF BARCELONA'S NEW SPOTIFY DEAL - REPORT

Diary Times Desk: While Barcelona's collaboration with Spotify as primary sponsor was initially seen with much scepticism, the move turned out to be beneficial for both the club and the music streaming giants far beyond what was expected.

The deal saw Spotify take over as the club's primary sponsor until 2026 and also earn the naming rights for the home stadium, making it the Spotify Camp Nou.

After a successful collaboration to this point, both parties were unsurprisingly keen to take the collaboration forward and agreed on an extension until 2030 with better terms on Friday.

The new terms

As relayed by SPORT in a recent report, Barcelona have earned better economic terms on the renewed deal until 2030 and could earn as much as €460 million through the same period as per its new validity.

The contract that has been extended by four seasons, after all, includes the rights to be the first sponsor not only for the men's and women's teams but also for the training kits, which comprehensively cover all of Barcelona's apparel. As per the new agreement, Spotify will pay Barcelona €75 million per season – €65 million for the sponsorship of jerseys and €10 million for the sponsorship of training jerseys.

Diary Times Desk: Barcelona's centre-back department took a massive blow when Inigo Martinez left the club in the summer to move to Al-Nassr, leaving Hansi Flick in a dire situation where he had no option but to adjust to the new normal.

Young Pau Cubarsi has continued as a regular starter for the club in defence, but no partner has complemented him as well as Martinez did.

In fact, the manager has spent much of his valuable time working out the various permutations and combinations, albeit to not much avail.

The club's priority, thus, continues to be to sign a new centre-back in the summer – one who can serve as a regular starter alongside Cubarsi in the long run – and Crystal Palace's defender Marc Guehi has emerged as a potential target.

De Jong reflected on his commitment to the club despite past financial pressures and potential offers to sell him. He explained his mindset during those times:

"I've always been clear that I wanted to stay at Barcelona. I've always been happy with the team and playing here.

"There was a time when there was more pressure, just as there was another time when there were people at the club who wanted to sell me to make money." Acknowledging the club's difficult financial situation at the time, De Jong highlighted that he never wavered in his desire to stay:

Meanwhile, Wojciech Szczesny will continue in goal, taking over for Joan Garcia, who remains sidelined for several more weeks due to injury.
