Diary Times Desk: On Wednesday, the Supreme Court of India announced that it had modified its earlier recommendation regarding the transfer of Justice Atul Sreedharan, following a request from the Union government.

Earlier in August, the Supreme Court collegium had proposed transferring Justice Sreedharan, one of the senior-most judges of the Madhya Pradesh High Court, to the Chhattisgarh High Court. However, within a month, the Modi government sought a reconsideration of that decision. Complying with the request, the collegium revised its recommendation, transferring Justice Sreedharan to the Allahabad High Court instead. While no explanation has been provided by either the collegium

or the government for this abrupt change, this now means that Sreedharan will be a junior judge and will not be part of the

collegium that selects new judges.
This incident underscores the opacity and possible executive interference that continue to cloud the system of judicial

Justice Sreedharan has earned a reputation as a judge who sticks to the rules. Appointed as a permanent judge of the Madhya Pradesh High Court in 2018, in 2023 he requested a transfer to the Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh High Court, citing a conflict of

However, in March, just a month before he was set to take charge as Chief Justice of the J&K High Court, he was transferred back to Madhya Pradesh. Upon his return, Justice Sreedharan became one of the senior-most judges and a member of the High Court's collegium, known for his pro-civil rights outlook and penchant for issuing suo motu orders, even in politically sensitive cases.

Lawyers Scroll spoke to said his frequent transfers were likely a result of his judicial record that often rubbed the government the

In July 2024, while at the J&K High Court, Justice Sreedharan quashed a preventive detention order issued under the Jammu & Kashmir Public Safety Act, 1978, calling it "twisted reasoning" by the District Magistrate, Jammu. He imposed a ₹10,000 personal fine on the officer, describing the detention as "unjustifiable."

'NAMAK HARAM', 'WON'T ALLOW NAMAZ': BJP MPS' COMMUNAL REMARKS DRAW FIRE

Diary Times Desk: A Union minister has declared he does not want the votes of the "namak haram," or the ungrateful, in a remark that appears to be aimed at Muslims weeks before the Bihar assembly elections, triggering widespread political condemnation.

Giriraj Singh, the BJP's MP from Begusarai, told a poll rally in Arwal district on Saturday that citizens who accept government welfare have a moral obligation to vote for the ruling party. He appeared to use the term for Muslims who benefit from Prime Minister Narendra Modi's schemes but do not support the BJP

In a video of the speech, Singh recounted an alleged conversation with a cleric. "So I told him that one who doesn't acknowledge help is called a namak haram," the minister is heard

"I told him, 'Maulvi Saheb, I don't want the votes of the namak haram'," he said.

Despite facing criticism on Sunday (October 19), Singh stood by his remarks, telling reporters he meant only to highlight that government welfare schemes were non-discriminator After a video showed Muslim women offering prayers at the site, Kulkarni and activists "purified" the spot with cow urine and performed a Hindu ritual.

"We will not allow 'namaz' in Shaniwarwada, Hindu community has now become awakened," she tweeted before the protest. She later defended the action, stating, "It is a symbol of Hindavi Swaraj... We cannot allow anyone to offer namaz here. It is not a mosque."

Samrala DSP Tarlochan Singh confirmed that an FIR had been registered at the Samrala police station on a statement of CBI Inspector Romipal.

The case was registered under Sections 61 (pertaining to unlawful activities such as possession or transport of intoxicants, 1 and 14 (which grants officers the power to summon individuals for evidence) of the Excise Act. BURSTING OF FIRECRACKERS ALLOWED FROM 8 PM TO 10 PM ON DIWALI

Diary Times Desk: The Ludhiana police have allowed bursting of crackers on Diwali for two hours. Residents can burst crackers from 8 pm to 10 pm on the festival. Besides, the police have also allowed to burst crackers on the occasion of Gurpurb between 4 am and 5 am and from 9 pm to 10 pm, on November 5.

Besides, the authorities have issued guidelines for residents and cracker dealers, which are to be followed while celebrating the festivals. The authorities have specifically stated that only "green crackers", which do not contain barium salts or compounds antimony, lithium, mercury, arsenic, lead or strintium chromate, will be allowed for sales and bursting. People having no licence would not be allowed to sell firecrackers and no other than green crackers will be purchased or stocked. The crackers cannot be purchased through any online platform. Bursting of the same will not be allowed near sensitive areas such as hospitals or educational institutes. And it has also been advised to burn firecrackers in the open so that patients or elderly persons should not suffer from respiratory issues.

Talking to The Tribune, Commissioner of Police Swapan Sharma said the crackers would be allowed for two hours on both festivals. Sharma said in case of blatant violation of the guidelines, an FIR would be registered against offenders.

Diary Times Desk: The National Medical Commission (NMC) has approved the addition of 10,650 new MBBS seats and 41 new medical colleges in India for the academic year 2025-26. This initiative aligns with Prime Minister Narendra Modi's commitment made on Independence Day 2024 to establish 75,000 new medical seats over a span of five years. Consequently, this raises the total from 1,17,750 in the academic year 2024-25 to 1,37,600 in 2025-26.

The NMC has also received proposals for 3,500 new and renewed seats for postgraduate courses, bringing the total number of seats this year to 67,000, as reported by PTI. The overall increase in both undergraduate and postgraduate seats this year will amount to around 15,000.

The process of seat allotment for round 3 of NEET UG counselling is currently in progress, and the results were declared on October 18 according to the official schedule, after which the reporting for college admissions began.

Registration for round 1 of NEET PG counselling started on October 18, 2025, and the counselling schedule is expected to be released soon.

"AKHILESH YADAV ENEMY OF SANATANIS": BJP ON REMARKS OVER DIWALI EXPENSES

WHY JMM DROPPED OUT OF BIHAR CONTEST DAYS AFTER DECLARING IT WOULD GO SOLO

Diary Times Desk: Hemant Soren's Jharkhand Mukti Morcha or JMM has announced that it would not contest the assembly elections in Bihar shortly after declaring that it would go solo and contest six seats in the neighbouring state. The party, which is an ally in the Opposition INDIA bloc, has attributed its earlier decision to a "political conspiracy" by its allies -Lalu Yadav's Rashtriya Janata Dal and the Congress. It also said it would re-evaluate the alliance with them in Jharkhand, making it clear that the rift within the Grand Alliance will have wider ramifications.

The JMM, though, said they had deprived it of seats in Bihar. Both parties are part of Chief Minster Soren's government in Jharkhand.

"The RJD and the Congress are responsible for keeping JMM from contesting the election as part of a political conspiracy. JMM will give a befitting reply to this, and review its alliance with RJD and Congress," said Kumar, who is also the state tourism minister

"Political games were played with JMM... We will not support any political party there. Mahagathbandhan will suffer the consequences of JMM not being a part of it in these elections," he added.

CYCLONE ALERT ISSUED FOR ANDAMAN AND NICOBAR ISLANDS

Diary Times Desk: The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has issued a 'cyclone alert' in Andaman and Nicobar Islands due to a cyclonic circulation over the Bay of Bengal, which is likely to intensify from October 21, officials said on Monday.

Local port warnings have been issued in the wake of the weather system, which is likely to cause heavy rainfall till October 23, they said.

"Heavy rain (7-11 cm) is very likely to occur at one or two places over Nicobar Islands. Thunderstorms with gusty wind (40-50 kmph) and lightning are very likely to occur at one or two places over Andaman and Nicobar Islands on October 21, 22 and 23," an official said.

Thunderstorms with gusty wind (40-50 kmph) and lightning are very likely to occur at one or two places over Andaman and Nicobar Islands on October 24 and 25, he said.

"Squally weather with surface wind speed reaching 35-45 kmph gusting to 55 kmph is very likely over the Andaman Sea from October 22 to 23. In the coming five days, sea conditions are likely to be rough and fishermen have been advised not to venture into the sea.

DELHI'S AIR QUALITY WORSENS ON DIWALI; 34 OUT OF 38 STATIONS IN 'RED ZONE'



Diary Times Desk: Delhi's air quality deteriorated on Diwali, with 34 out of 38 monitoring stations recording pollution levels in the 'red zone' on Monday, indicating 'very poor' to 'severe' air across the national capital.

Delhi's 24-hour average air quality index (AQI), which is reported at 4 pm every day, remained in the 'very poor' category at 345, higher than the 326 recorded on Sunday, according to official data.

According to the SAMEER app developed by the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB), four monitoring stations were already in the 'severe' category with AQI levels above 400 -- Dwarka (417), Ashok Vihar (404), Wazirpur (423) and Anand Vihar (404).

Around 30 monitoring stations reported 'very poor' air, with AQI levels above 300.

RSS LEADER'S "SPEWING VENOM" BARB AT CONGRESS LEADER PRIYANK KHARGE

INDIA WILL CONTINUE PAYING MASSIVE TARIFFS OVER "RUSSIAN OIL", SAYS TRUMP

Diary Times Desk: US President Donald Trump has doubled down on his claim that India has agreed to restrict its Russian oil purchases. Speaking to reporters aboard Air Force One, the US leader threatened to impose "massive tariffs" on Indian goods unless New Delhi agreed to his terms and halted its purchases.

"I spoke with Prime Minister Modi of India, and he said he's not going to be doing the Russian oil thing," he said, reiterating what he said in the past week. India last week rejected Trump's claim that he had a telephonic conversation with Prime Minister Narendra Modi over New Delhi's Russian oil imports. When asked about India's assertion, he replied, "But if they want to say that, then they'll just continue to pay massive tariffs, and they don't want to do that."

The remarks came amid growing US pressure on Russia's trade partners, particularly in the energy sector, which Washington argues indirectly funds Moscow's war effort in Ukraine.

23 INDIANS RESCUED AFTER FIRE ON LPG TANKER OFF YEMEN COAST



Diary Times Desk: Twenty-three Indian crew members have been rescued after a fire broke out on board the Cameroon-flagged LPG tanker MV Falcon, following an explosion, off the coast of Aden, Yemen. The incident took place on Saturday, October 18, at 07.00 UTC (local time), when the ship was sailing about 113 nautical miles southeast of Aden on its way to Djibouti. The vessel went adrift after the blast, and about 15 per cent of the ship was on fire. Early reports suggest the explosion was accidental, but the exact cause is still being investigated.

According to British security firm Ambrey, the MV Falcon was travelling from Oman's Sohar Port to Djibouti when the explosion occurred. Radio communication suggested that the crew was preparing to abandon the vessel as a search-and-rescue operation was launched.

TRUMP VOWS TO KEEP 'MASSIVE' TARIFFS ON INDIA UNTIL RUSSIAN OIL IMPORTS CEASE

Diary Times Desk : US President Donald Trump reiterated on Sunday that Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi told him India will stop buying Russian oil, while warning that New Delhi would continue paying "massive" tariffs if it did not do so.

"I spoke with Prime Minister Modi of India, and he said he's not going to be doing the Russian oil thing," Trump told reporters aboard Air Force One.

Asked about India's assertion that it was not aware of any conversation between Modi and Trump, Trump replied: "But if they want to say that, then they'll just continue to pay massive tariffs, and they don't want to do that."

Russian oil has been one of the main irritants for Trump in prolonged trade talks with India - half of his 50% tariffs on Indian goods are in retaliation for those purchases. The US government has said petroleum revenue funds Russia's war in Ukraine.

FBI DIRECTOR KASH PATEL EXTENDS DIWALI GREETINGS

LOUVRE MUSEUM THEFT! THIEVES STEAL CROWN JEWELS IN JUST 4 MINUTES

Diary Times Desk: In a minutes-long strike Sunday inside the world's most-visited museum, thieves rode a basket lift to the Louvre, forced a window into the Galerie d'Apollon — while tourists pressed shoulder-to-shoulder in the corridors — smashed display cases and fled with priceless Napoleonic jewels, officials said.

It was among the highest-profile museum thefts in recent memory and comes as Louvre employees have complained of worker and security understaffing.

One object was later found outside the museum, according to Culture Minister Rachida Dati. French daily Le Parisien reported it was the emerald-studded crown of Napoleon III's wife Empress Eugénie — gold, diamonds and sculpted eagles — recovered just beyond the walls, broken.

Dati called the strike the work of "professionals," describing it on TF1 TV network as "a four-minute operation carried out without violence."

TRUMP SAYS UKRAINE'S DONBAS REGION WILL HAVE TO BE 'CUT UP' TO END RUSSIAN INVASION

Diary Times Desk: US President Donald Trump said on Sunday that the Donbas region of Ukraine should be "cut up", leaving most of it in Russian hands, to end a war that has dragged on for nearly four years.

"Let it be cut the way it is," he told reporters aboard Air Force One. "It's cut up right now," adding that you can "leave it the way it is right now."

"They can negotiate something later on down the line," he said. But for now, both sides of the conflict should "stop at the battle line -- go home, stop fighting, stop killing people."

Trump's latest comments came after Ukrainian drones struck a major gas processing plant in southern Russia, sparking a fire and forcing it to suspend its intake of gas from Kazakhstan, Russian and Kazakh authorities said on Sunday.

The Orenburg plant, run by stateowned gas giant Gazprom and located in a region of the same name near the Kazakh border, is part of a production and processing complex that is one of the world's largest facilities of its kind, with an annual capacity of 45 billion cubic metres.

It handles gas condensate from Kazakhstan's Karachaganak field, alongside Orenburg's own oil and gas fields.



AIRPORT INFERNO COULD COST BANGLADESH \$1BN IN DAMAGES - EXPERTS

Diary Times Desk: Business leaders in Bangladesh fear losses of more than \$1bn (£750m) after a devastating fire broke out in the logistics section of the country's main airport on Saturday.

Clothes and raw materials were among the goods destroyed, which could put some businesses at risk, according to the country's export associations.

The cause of the fire - which took 27 hours to extinguish - is still being investigated. The blaze had forced the temporary suspension of flights and airport operations.

Bangladesh is the word's secondlargest exporter of clothes after China, supplying global retailers like H&M and Walmart.

Bangladesh's garment sector generates around \$40bn a year, accounting for over a tenth of its gross domestic product.

Local media reports say around 35 people were injured while working to contain the blaze.

The damaged airport cargo village is among the country's busiest logistics hubs, especially during the pre-Christmas rush. The centre stored fabrics, pharmaceuticals, chemicals and other goods.

'SEVEN PLANES WERE SHOT DOWN,' TRUMP REPEATS CLAIMS OF AVERTING INDIA-PAKISTAN WAR

USING TARIFFS THREATS

Diary Times Desk: US President Donald Trump on Sunday (local time) has once again claimed that he averted a potential war between India and Pakistan by leveraging the threat of heavy tariffs while asserting that "seven planes were shot down" during the heightened tensions in May between the two nuclear-armed neighbours.

Speaking in an interview with Fox News, Trump said his administration used trade pressure to de-escalate the situation, which he described as being on the brink of a nuclear conflict.

"I've ended, you know, eight wars that we just mentioned. Five of them have been ended because of tariffs. The threat of tariffs, as an example, kept India and Pakistan-two nuclear nations-from going at it," Trump said.

"They were going at it-seven planes were shot down. That's a lot. And they were going at it. That could have been a nuclear war," he added.

Trump's comments on the India-Pakistan conflict refer to the escalation in May following India's Operation Sindoor, a series of precision strikes on nine terrorist camps in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Jammu Kashmir (PoJK) in retaliation for the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack that killed 26 civilians.

AUSTRALIA ACCUSES CHINA OF 'UNSAFE' MILITARY JET MANOEUVRES

Diary Times Desk: Australia has accused a Chinese military aircraft of releasing flares "in close proximity" to its patrol jet over the South China Sea.

The Australian government has raised its concern with Beijing over the "unsafe and unprofessional" manoeuvre, the defence department said in a statement on Monday.

There was no damage to Australia's P-8A aircraft and its personnel were unharmed after Sunday's encounter.

A Chinese military spokesperson said the Australian jet "illegally intruded" into China's airspace and had to be expelled.

The Australian aircraft's actions "seriously infringed upon China's sovereignty", Senior Colonel Li Jianjian, spokesperson for China's Southern Theater Command Air Force said, urging Canberra to "immediately cease its infringing and provocative actions".



FBI PROBES HUNTING STAND WITH DIRECT VIEW OF TRUMP'S AIR FORCE ONE EXIT

Diary Times Desk: The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) on Sunday (local time) stated that it has launched an investigation after the US Secret Service (USSS) discovered a suspicious hunting stand with a direct line of sight to the area where US President Donald Trump exits Air Force One at Palm Beach International Airport, Fox News reported, citing officials.

According to Fox News, the elevated stand was found on Thursday during routine security checks ahead of the US President's planned return to West Palm Beach. FBI Director Kash Patel confirmed that while the structure has not yet been linked to any individual, federal agents are actively investigating. "No individuals were located at the scene. The FBI has since taken the investigatory lead, flying in resources to collect all evidence from the scene and deploying our cell phone analytics capabilities," he added.

ISRAEL SAYS KEY BORDER CROSSING INTO GAZA REOPENED FOR AID

Diary Times Desk: Israel's Kerem Shalom border crossing into Gaza reopened for aid on Monday, an Israeli military official said, a day after Israel closed it, accusing Hamas of violating an ongoing ceasefire.

Following a decision at the political level, aid flowed through Kerem Shalom "in full compliance with the signed agreement", the official said, adding that Gaza's Rafah crossing to Egypt "will remain closed until further notice".

Hamas has denied breaching the truce agreement and in turn accused Israel of violating the deal.

Diary Times Desk: US President Donald Trump on Sunday said that the United States will "be fine" with China as both countries prepare to restart trade talks. His comments come at a sensitive time, with the current trade truce between Washington and Beijing set to expire soon.

'We have to have a fair deal with China,' says Trump

In an interview with Fox News on Sunday, Trump was asked about his earlier threat to raise tariffs on Chinese goods by 100%. He replied that such a high tariff was "not sustainable" though "it could stand."



Trump also said he shared a good personal relationship with Xi Jinping and expected the two sides to meet in South Korea later this month during the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) summit. "I think we're going to be fine with China, but we have to have a fair deal. It's got to be fair," Trump said.

Talks in Malaysia amid tense trade relations

US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent confirmed that American and Chinese officials will meet in Malaysia later this week to continue discussions. This follows a virtual meeting between Bessent and Chinese Vice Premier He Lifeng on Friday, which Chinese state media described as a "constructive exchange of views." The talks come after a series of tense exchanges between the two nations. A little over a week ago, Trump suggested he might cancel his first face-to-face meeting with Chinese President Jinping since returning to the White House. His anger stemmed from Beijing's decision to tighten control over rare-earth elements, which are materials essential for making fighter jets, smartphones, and electric cars. Following that, Trump announced a 100% import surtax on Chinese goods, which is scheduled to take effect on November 1.

This decision puts at risk the fragile trade truce that expires on November 10 unless both sides agree to extend it.

TWO DEAD AFTER CARGO PLANE SKIDS OFF HONG KONG RUNWAY INTO SEA

Diary Times Desk: Two Hong Kong airport security staff were killed when a cargo plane skidded off a runway, hit their patrol vehicle and ploughed into the sea.

Emirates flight EK9788 was arriving from Dubai at about 03:50 local time on Monday (19:50 GMT on Sunday) when it veered off the runway, crashed through perimeter fencing and collided with the vehicle, pushing it into the water.

The two people inside died. The Boeing 747 ended up partly submerged, but its four crew survived.

Officials are investigating the cause of the crash on the north runway. Two other runways remain operational. It is one of the deadliest aviation incidents in years at Hong Kong International Airport, which has a good safety record.

The investigation will focus on the unanswered questions over the path taken by the plane upon landing.

Airport officials have said they gave the correct instructions to the plane and that there were signs on the runway to guide aircraft.

TRUMP'S RESPONSE TO 'NO KINGS' MARCHES ONLY PROVED THE PROTESTERS' POINT

Diary Times Desk: A president steeped in constitutional lore might have been offended by claims he's acting as a king.

But Donald Trump and his entourage responded with mockery to weekend "No Kings" protests by millions of Americans — embracing the narrative in a way that explains his growing hubris and belief that he has unchecked power.

The president and Vice President JD Vance this weekend both posted AI memes to social media depicting Trump in a crown. The one Trump shared was a mocked-up vision of the president flying a fighter jet emblazoned with "KING TRUMP" appearing to dump raw sewage on protesters. In Vance's troll on Bluesky, a site popular with liberals, prominent Democrats knelt as supplicants in a royal court before Trump, the divine and absolute ruler.

It was a clever political trick. MAGA supporters can blast anyone who takes offense to the posts as lacking a sense of humor and being prim. The posts also trivialize protesters' gravely serious claims that America is witnessing a wannabe autocrat. But they also subtly advance the thesis that Trump is all-powerful and immune from dissent, an attractive proposition to voters who like a strongman.

DEADLY GAZA FLARE-UP TESTS ISRAEL-HAMAS CEASEFIRE



Diary Times Desk: One week ago, US President Donald Trump was given a hero's welcome in Israel after securing the Gaza ceasefire and exchange of Israeli hostages for Palestinian prisoners.

But the days since have shown just how precarious the ceasefire is, and Sunday brought its biggest test so far.

The Israel Defense Forces (IDF) launched a series of deadly strikes across Gaza, after two soldiers were killed in the southern city of Rafah in an attack it blamed on Hamas. Hamas said it was not responsible because it had not had contact with fighters in the area since communications were cut off in March.

An Israeli security official announced the suspension of aid deliveries as a result of the attack.

It appears US pressure ensured the truce was not derailed and that Israel's crossings with Gaza reopened on Monday. Now it is clear mediators must stay closely involved to shore up the deal and settle key issues on the future of Gaza and Hamas.

PAKISTAN'S CEASEFIRE WITH TALIBAN DEPENDS ON HALTING ATTACKS FROM AFGHAN SOIL, SAYS DEFENCE MINISTER

Diary Times Desk: The ceasefire agreement between Islamabad and Kabul is linked to the ruling Taliban's ability to rein in militants attacking Pakistan from Afghanistan, Pakistan's Defence Minister Khawaja Muhammad Asif told Reuters on Monday.

The South Asian neighbours agreed to a ceasefire in Doha at the weekend after days of border clashes that killed dozens, the worst such violence since the Taliban seized power in Kabul in 2021.

Ground fighting between the one-time allies and Pakistani airstrikes across their contested 2,600-km (1,600-mile) frontier were triggered after Islamabad demanded that Kabul control militants, saying they operated from havens in Afghanistan.

"Anything coming from Afghanistan will be (a) violation of this agreement," Asif said in his office at Pakistan's parliament in Islamabad. "Everything hinges on this one clause."

ZELENSKY READY TO JOIN TRUMP-PUTIN TALKS AFTER 'FRANK' WHITE HOUSE MEETING

Diary Times Desk: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky has said he would be ready to join Donald Trump and Vladimir Putin at a proposed summit in Hungary if he were invited.

The US and Russian presidents announced after their phone call on Thursday that they planned to hold talks on the war in Ukraine in Budapest, possibly in the coming weeks. On Monday, Zelensky told reporters: "If it is an invitation in a format where we meet as three or, as it's called, shuttle diplomacy... then in one format or another, we will agree". Meanwhile, media reports suggest his White House meeting with Trump on Friday descended into a "shouting match" – with the US side urging Ukraine to accept Russia's terms to end the war. Zelensky was guarded during his first press briefing since the talks, but still his comments made clear that there were large areas of disagreement between the two sides.

AFTER 'NO KINGS' PROTESTS, WHERE DOES DEMOCRATIC OPPOSITION GO NEXT?

Diary Times Desk: This weekend's "No Kings" demonstrations drew an estimated crowd of millions across the US to protest President Donald Trump's policies and his willingness to push the boundaries of presidential authority.

It was a moment for likeminded Democrats, liberals and some anti-Trump Republicans to rally together at a time when the American left has little formal power in national politics.

By most accounts, the turnout at Saturday's events - in major US cities like Chicago, New York, Washington and Los Angeles, as well as hundreds of smaller towns - was higher than expected and surpassed the first "No Kings" rally in June.

Congressional Republicans had warned that the demonstrations would be "anti-American", and some conservative governors had put their law enforcement and National Guard on alert in case of violence.

The massive rallies turned out to be peaceful – a carnival, not carnage. In New York City, there were no protest-related arrests, and the gathering in Washington DC featured families and young children



US AND AUSTRALIA SIGN RARE EARTHS DEAL TO COUNTER CHINA'S DOMINANCE

Diary Times Desk: The US and Australia have signed a deal intended to boost supplies of rare earths and other critical minerals, as the Trump administration looks for ways to counter China's dominance of the market.

Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said the deal would support a pipeline of \$8.5bn (£6.3bn) "ready-to-go" projects that would expand his country's mining and processing abilities.

It includes \$1bn to be invested by the two countries in projects in the US and Australia over the next six months, a framework text says.

The US and Australia have been working on these issues since Trump's first term, but Albanese said the latest agreement would take the partnership to the "next level".

China currently controls about 70% of rare earths mining and 90% of the processing of the materials, which are found in everything from defence equipment to computer chips and cars.

US companies rely heavily on the materials, making them vulnerable this year as China has taken steps to restrict access to supplies in response to new US tariffs and other tensions.

XI JINPING OUTLINES CHINA'S 5-YEAR PLAN AT CLOSED-DOOR COMMUNIST PARTY MEET

Diary Times Desk: Chinese leader Xi Jinping delivered a speech Monday on the opening day of a major meeting of the ruling Communist Party to approve a draft plan laying out its goals for the country over the next five years. A short dispatch from the official Xinhua News Agency said Xi "expounded on the Party leadership's draft proposals" for the next five-year plan for national economic and social development, which will cover 2026-2030. It did not provide any details.

The latest plan comes at a time of growing challenges and uncertainty for China, including a persistently sluggish economy, foreign restrictions on its access to the latest technologies and high tariffs imposed on its exports to the United States.

A Xinhua editorial said that the plan should focus on "high-quality" development and technological innovation, while also ensuring national security is protected and the benefits of economic growth are spread fairly and more widely.

US-CHINA TRADE DISPUTE OVER A LITTLEKNOWN DUTCH CHIPMAKER COULD HALT CAR PRODUCTION AND SEND PRICES HIGHER

Few car buyers have heard of Nexperia. But this Dutch company makes chips that are essential for making cars — and now, it's at the center of a trade dispute that could shutter global auto plants and send alreadyrecord-level car prices even higher.

The dispute is just one part of wider trade tensions between the United States and China. The Nexperia saga began in earnest this past December when the US Commerce Department put Nexperia's parent company, China-based Wingtech Technologies, on a list of companies facing trade restrictions.

Then, this October, China's Ministry of Commerce banned Nexperia China and its subcontractors from exporting specific finished components and sub-assemblies manufactured in China. The Dutch government took control of Nexperia following this move.

THE INTERNET JUST HAD ANOTHER GLOBAL OUTAGE. WHY DOES THIS KEEP HAPPENING?

Diary Times Desk: Amazon Web Services (AWS), the cloud computing platform that powers much of the internet, went down for several hours Monday, making several major websites and apps inoperable.

From banking services to social networks to airline booking sites to online shopping, thousands of services were disrupted as millions of people worldwide – many of whom were on their way to work on the US East Coast – were unable to mobile-order coffee or access key apps.

The latest outage serves as a reminder of how fragile the internet's backbone can be, even if the disruption is brief, and how reliant the world has become on these online services.

Although AWS and its competitors are generally robust, the internet is a complex web of overlapping services that are only as reliable as their weakest code. The root cause of Monday's outage remains unknown, but a service that converts friendly web names into IP addresses was unable to communicate with thousands of companies' massive databases hosted by Amazon.



MARKETS ARE VOLATILE. HERE'S WHAT TO DO WITH YOUR MONEY

Diary Times Desk: It's been a whirlwind year for investors.

Stocks are hovering near record highs, but volatility is creeping back into markets as USChina trade tensions flare up. Gold and silver—safe havens during uncertain times—are soaring higher.

Investors are worried about trade wars, signs of an AI bubble and now credit market turmoil.

With all the uncertainty, it can feel overwhelming. However, long-term investors are best off keeping calm, tuning out the noise and sticking to a consistent plan that aligns with their financial goals, experts say.

"Rather than trying to time the next downturn, the smarter move is to stick to fundamentals," said Jared Gagne, a wealth manager at Claro Advisors.

"Good investing is boring," he said.



TRUMP'S TARIFFS ARE BREWING TROUBLE FOR COFFEE ROASTERS

Diary Times Desk: The rising costs of coffee beans are keeping roasters and their customers on edge.

Retail coffee prices jumped nearly 21% in August compared to the same time last year, and the Trump administration's tariffs are partially to blame: In July, Brazil was slapped with one of the highest duties, at 50%, while Vietnam has 20% tariffs and Colombia has 10% tariffs

America imports more than 99% of its coffee, according to the National Coffee Association. Most of it comes from Brazil -30.7% of US coffee imports based on net weight, according to the UN Comtrade Database - Colombia (18.3%) and Vietnam (6.6%).

The average price of regular coffee at restaurants in August was 10 cents more than the same time last year, according to data from Toast, a restaurant management software provider. The increase brought the average price to \$3.52. Some relief may be on the way. In September, Rep. Don Bacon, a Republican from Nebraska, and Democratic Rep. Ro Khanna of California, introduced the bipartisan "No Coffee Tax Act" to exempt coffee products from tariffs.

HOW AMERICAN CONSUMERS ARE FEELING THE SQUEEZE, IN 4 CHARTS

The lingering effects of high inflation coupled with high interest rates have made it harder in recent years for many get ahead Americans to financially.

The hits just keep coming.

A raft of policy moves from the Trump administration, including particularly steep tariffs that could cause prices to rise, and the whipsaw approach being taken, have stoked uncertainty and driven down sentiment to some of the lowest levels on record.

That combination of higher prices, uncertainty and pessimism can be outright noxious as pullbacks in business consumer and spending can have cascading negative effects on the labor market and the broader economy.

The consumers who power the US economy with their spending have been resilient to date but they're being increasingly spread thin.

Debt loads are climbing, as are defaults, and indicators of consumer strain are flashing red: For example, an increasing number of people are paying for their groceries in installments.

Free to download and available globally, the aiScout app allows aspiring soccer stars to enter virtual trials for professional clubs by uploading selfrecorded footage of themselves completing a series of drills. It offers 75 exercises, designed to test a range of skills, with videos showing users how to complete

Performances are automatically scored by artificial intelligence (AI) technology. The data can then be accessed by clubs, allowing their scouts to peruse scores for viable talent, honing their search with a variety.

You can chat with AI personas on Instagram in your direct messages. And TikTok's AI Alive tool turns images into videos with just a simple command.

The moves are part of a high-stakes race that could shape the next era of the internet. Winning that race is critical for tech giants as they figure out how to make money from AI amid fears of a bubble.

'TRON: ARES' STEERS TO \$33 MILLION OPENING AT DOMESTIC BOX **OFFICE**



Diary Times Desk: Disney's "Tron: Ares" revved up to gross about \$33.5 million at the domestic box office, notching the top spot for the weekend.

The third installment of the decades-old "Tron" franchise fell short of analysts' expectations of a more than \$40 million opening. The sci-fi adventure film reportedly had a budget of about \$180 million.

"Let's give 'Tron' credit for being one of very few long-running franchises that can grab a No. 1 debut over 40 years after the first film," said Paul Dergarabedian, head of marketplace trends at Comscore.

While it outperformed the tepid debut of the first "Tron," which in 1982 earned \$16.7 million, adjusted for inflation, "Tron: Ares" fell well short of the opening weekend success of "Tron: Legacy" (\$65 million, adjusted for inflation) in 2010.

Paramount Pictures' "Roofman," the dramatic re-telling of Jeffrey Manchester's 2004 prison escape and subsequent hiding in a Toys "R" Us store, finished No. 2 at the box office, grossing an estimated \$8 million.

"This is a solid opening for a character-driven comedy about a fugitive living a double life who falls for a divorced mom," said David A. Gross, who writes industry newsletter FranchiseRe, noting that character comedies open to around \$6.4 million domestically on average.

Third overall at the domestic box office was Warner Bros. Pictures' "One Battle After Another" (\$6.67 million), which has continued to hold on with a \$54 million gross during its three-week run. Warner Bros. Discovery is the parent company of CNN.

The No. 4 movie this weekend was Universal Pictures' "Gabby's Dollhouse: The Movie" (\$3.35 million), followed by Sony Pictures' "Soul on Fire" (\$3 million).

Dergarabedian called "Gabby's Dollhouse: The Movie" an "unsung hero of the month" because, while it hasn't generated huge earnings, it's been a mainstay for audiences since it opened.

"It's a very rare movie, in as much as it's a G-rated film. Usually it's PG movies that attract the family audience," he said.

NO FESTIVITY FOR PUNJAB FARMERS AMID KHARIF CROP SHOCKER

Diary Times Desk: This year's Diwali may not spell cheer for thousands of farmers across Punjab, which is already grappling with an agrarian crisis.

With crops on around 4 lakh acres already lost during the recent floods, the state witnessed incessant post-monsoon rain, significantly impacting non-basmati paddy yield. Global economic uncertainty has also pushed the prices of the premium basmati rice down, hitting the growers hard. Cotton is also selling below the minimum support price (MSP). Moreover, there is little hope of generating income from the next crop in the wake of a severe DAP shortage.

"The chances of economic recovery in the near future are weak. We have had to take loans to make both ends meet after the standing paddy crop on 27 acres (25 of those taken on lease) was destroyed. There is no celebration for us this year as most families are unable to recover from the trauma of economic losses. Seeing our plight, the Jamal Wala Baba from Sirsa sent sweets and some goodies for every household. It is a kind gesture, but it reinforces our economic plight," lamented Sikandar Singh, a farmer from Bhaini Ram Singh village in Fazilka.



FARM FIRE COUNT LOW IN PUNJAB. **COMING WEEKS A CHALLENGE TO KEEP IT THAT WAY**

Diary Times Desk: The Supreme Court intervention at the start of the paddy harvesting season ensured that the state government was on its toes throughout the period, thereby ensuring a stringent check on farm fires.

Result—the farm fires are on an all time low compared to previous years when the blame game was in full throttle when the fire count spiked. In the past 24 hours, Punjab witnessed 67 new farm fires, taking the total to 308, far less than the count of 1,444 and 1,393 in 2023 and 2024 respectively, on the same date.

The apex court pulled up the state government, asking why some errant farmers shouldn't be arrested for the practice, considered as a key contributor to the winter pollution in northern India, especially Delhi and areas around it.

Even the Commission for Air Quality Management (CAQM) held meetings well in advance with state government officials and directed them to ensure that surplus paddy residue was fully managed.

OVER 2,800 PVT SCHOOLS IN HARYANA TO FACE PENALTY OVER EWS ADMISSIONS

Diary Times Desk: Over 2,800 private schools in the state are likely to face penalty ranging from Rs 5,000 to Rs 1 lakh for not complying with the directions of the Directorate of Elementary Education regarding admissions of students belonging to economically weaker section under the Right to Education (RTE) during the academic session 2025-26.

The directorate has directed the district elementary education officers (DEEOs) to send information regarding the 1,680 recognised private schools that had not declared their seats in the state, with recommendation and proposal. Directions have also been issued regarding another 1,128 recognised private schools that were rejected by DEEOs on recognition and other grounds for allotment of seats.

DEVELOPMENT WORKS OF ROHTAK MUNICIPAL CORPORATION TO BE MONITORED THROUGH ONLINE PORTAL

Diary Times Desk: In a step towards transparency and digital governance, the Rohtak Municipal Corporation has launched a new online portal titled "Suvidha Manch", designed to offer real-time data and updates on development projects across the municipal area.

"The portal will allow officials to view key details of any ongoing development project with just a single click. DELHI'S FIRST FIR: A STOLEN KULFI, HOOKAH

Diary Times Desk: Delhi Police's earliest First Information Reports (FIRs) offer a rare window into life and crime in 19th-century Delhi. The very first FIR, lodged on October 18, 1861, at the Sabzi Mandi Police Station, recorded the theft of three large and three small cooking vessels, a bowl, a hookah, a kulfi and some women's clothes from the home of a resident named Maeeuddin.

The total value of the stolen goods was 45 annas – roughly Rs 2.81 at the time.

Written in the Shikasta Urdu script, the original document now hangs framed in the Delhi Police Museum, preserved as an artefact of the city's past.

Other early FIRs reveal equally curious cases — the theft of a pair of pyjamas worth five annas in 1897, or 11 oranges stolen in 1891. One report recorded the uprooting of a keekar tree valued at Rs 1 from a public thoroughfare; another documented the theft of goats in Mehrauli.


LIGHT, SOUND SHOW AT KURUKSHETRA'S BRAHMA SAROVAR PUT ON HOLD AGAIN

Diary Times Desk: The ambitious project to get a light and sound show at Brahma Sarovar seems to have been put on the back burner.

In 2023, to enhance the evening attraction, the then Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar had announced a light and sound show for the Brahma Sarovar and directed the Kurukshetra Development Board to get the show introduced before the next Mahotsav (IGM-24). However, the project is yet to see the light of the day, and the government and the KDB are set to celebrate the IGM-25 in November, with no plans to introduce the show anytime soon.

This year, a 21-day IGM-25 will be celebrated from November 15 to December 5, on the banks of the Brahma Sarovar in Kurukshetra. The Saras and Crafts Fairs will be organised for 21 days, while the main events will be organised for eight days from November 24 to December 1

The Brahma Sarovar is one of the major tourist locations, but it lacks evening attractions, due to which a majority of the tourists leave Kurukshetra by the evening.



US-made Tomahawk is a tried and tested missile – but it's out of

Ukraine's reach for now

he Tomahawk is the workhorse of the United States' missile arsenal. It's been deployed in strikes in Syria and Libya and was used extensively against former dictator Saddam Hussein's regime in Iraq, in both the 1990s and in 2003.

About 30 of the cruise missiles were used as part of the US strikes on Iranian nuclear facilities in June.

While not new, the Tomahawk remains effective and relatively cheap, at \$2 million per missile. Depending on the variant, it can strike targets at a range of between 1,600 and 2,500 kilometers (1,000 to 1,600 miles).

fhile Tomahawks would hel Kyiv's long-range attacks nside Russia, Ukraine need above all else more – and more capable – air defenses as Russia ratchets up mast tracks with a combination in missiles and drones.

That is not much greater than some of Ukraine's longer-range drones, but the Tomahawk would pack a far higher explosive punch.

It has sophisticated guidance technologies and travels at high subsonic (about 550 mph) speeds.

It also flies low, literally hugging the contours of land, making it harder to detect and intercept.

For all these reasons, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky has lobbied the Trump administration for the delivery of Tomahawks that could enable Ukraine to strike targets deep inside Russia. For now, at least, he's not going to get them. Trump made clear last week that the US has few to spare, saying: "We need Tomahawks for the United States of America too. We have a lot of them but we need them."

As we have seen in this war of attrition – with the F-16 fighter jets, Abrams tanks and even Patriot missile batteries supplied to Ukraine – no single system is a game-changer. Hundreds of Tomahawks would be needed to cripple Russia's refineries and airbases.

Even so, a few dozen could enable the Ukrainian military to inflict substantial damage on key Russian infrastructure far from its borders – including the Shahed drone factory in Tatarstan and the Engels-2 Air Base in Saratov oblast, according to Washington-based think tank the Institute for the Study of War.



"It's very difficult just to operate with only with Ukrainian drones. We need long-range Tomahawks," Zelensky said in an interview with US network NBC on Sunday.

He has also said that Tomahawks would "strengthen Ukraine and force the Russians to sober up a little (and) sit down at the negotiating table."

The Kremlin was so perturbed by the prospect of Kyiv procuring Tomahawks that it issued dire warnings about an escalation of the war, given that the missiles can carry nuclear warheads. Russia would perceive their supply to Ukraine as a "hostile move" that would threaten global security, according to the head of the Foreign Intelligence Service (SVR), Sergey Naryshkin.

'Don't Try To Escape'

INSIDE THE SHADOWY WORLD OF CRYPTO

he email looked like a surprise charge of nearly \$500 from Best Buy, along with a customer service line to help with any questions.

The man who answered the line quickly acknowledged the charge was a mistake and promised a refund.

But as he worked to resolve the problem, he announced in a shocked voice, his company accidentally refunded thousands of extra dollars. The only fix, he said, was for the caller to urgently return the money through a crypto ATM – a machine that converts cash into cryptocurrency.

It all sounded extremely confusing and vaguely convincing.

But the man on the phone was no Best Buy customer service operator – he was a scammer.

And the caller was no unsuspecting victim – she was a CNN reporter who had deliberately called the line to see how these schemes operate.

When the reporter confronted the man, he dropped his cover story and openly talked about how much he and his colleagues have been swindling from victims: "Like a couple million dollars a



Police records vividly illustrate the range of cover-stories scammers use to trick victims, who on average lost about \$16,000 in cases CNN reviewed – though some have been conned out of much more.

Welcome to the shadowy world of crypto ATM scams.

These hoaxes, in which unwitting nely victims are tricked into sending con leily artists their savings through crypto ATMs, have risen exponentially in recent years. The FBI received nearly 11,000 crypto ATM scam complaints last year, totaling about a quarter billion dollars in losses – an amount on s a track to potentially double this year.

How are so many Americans falling for these hoaxes and handing over hardearned money?

To answer that question, CNN reviewed more than 700 police reports and consumer complaints compiled since last year, interviewed dozens of

victims and detectives who have investigated the cases – and even called scammers directly.

The reporting revealed how scammers pose as trusted experts, authorities or romantic partners, and then pummel victims with layers of lies that overwhelm their emotions, impede their judgement and push them to act in ways that appear irrational in hindsight.

The scammers use crypto ATMs tens of thousands of which are in gas stations, smoke shops and other stores across the country as a convenient tool. After the ATMs turn cash into cryptocurrency, scammers can rapidly transfer the loot anonymous digital wallets all over the world - often in places where it's nearly impossible for police in the US to recover.

"These things are almost designed to be just perfect instruments for... scams," Tim Schwering of the Spokane, Washington, police department said of crypto ATMs. "You can have someone's life savings wiped out very quickly."

A CNN investigation revealed how the companies profit by often marking up the price of cryptocurrency on transactions, including the illicit ones, and often fail to refund money to scam victims.

Russia has gained about 120 square miles of territory in the past four weeks, about half of what it seized in the previous four weeks. according to the Belfer **Center for** Science and International **Affairs at** Harvard

University.

ussian forces are still edging forward along several parts of the long front line in Ukraine – despite yet another call from US President Donald Trump for a combat freeze along existing lines.

Both sides "should stop where they are," Trump said on social media Friday, after meeting with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky in Washington DC.

But the Russians seem intent on locking in gains before the onset of winter. On Friday, they used a record 268 guided aerial bombs, according to the Ukrainian military, compared to an average of 170 to 180 per day in recent weeks. These bombs, which carry a payload of up to 1,500 kilograms (3,307 pounds), largely target Ukrainian forces and infrastructure close to the front lines.

The Russians have also continued nightly barrages of drones and missiles against targets across Ukraine. especially against eneray infrastructure. In September, an average of more than 180 drones were launched every night, more than twice the number at the beginning of the year.

In recent days, the Ukrainians have acknowledged that about 20% to 30% of those drones are not being intercepted.

In the last week, Russia has used more than 3,270 attack drones, 1,370 guided aerial bombs, and nearly 50 missiles of various types against Ukraine, Zelensky said Sundav.

To some analysts, the Kremlin has no incentive to compromise as its forces improve their battlefield performance.

"Moscow has developed fresh ways of using drones to find and kill Ukrainian soldiers and to destroy Ukrainian assets, turning what was once an area of weakness into an area of strength," writes long-time Russia analyst Dara Massicot in Foreign Affairs.

"It has built better missiles and created more rugged and capable armored systems. It is giving junior commanders more freedom to plan," Massicot adds.

One town where Ukrainians are under growing pressure is Kupiansk, in the northern region of Kharkiv. Russian troops have advanced to the north and east of the town, which has been under siege for more than a year.

A well-known Russian blogger, War Gonzo, said Saturday on Telegram that there was also fighting in the center of Kupiansk About 80 Russian troops had infiltrated the town, the Ukrainian

military acknowledged on Thursday, and its defenders were "doing everything possible to clear Kupiansk of Russian invaders and prevent the accumulation of enemy infantry in the city."

One Ukrainian military blogger – Bohdan Miroshnikov – said this week that the Russian tactic "may lead to control (if reinforcements can arrive and consolidate their positions)."

He added that while the situation was very complicated, "full occupation of the city is still a long way off."

Also in Kharkiv region, closer to the international border, the Russians have claimed advances near the town of Vovchansk, including the capture of a nearby village.





A GUIDE TO TIFFANY & CO. — AN AMERICAN INSTITUTION

Diary Times Desk : Tiffany & Co. — the early history
The story of Tiffany & Co., the world's oldest major jewellery brand, begins in 1837 at 259 Broadway, New York. Founded by school friends Charles Lewis Tiffany and John Barnett Young, Tiffany and Young, as the company was then known, set out selling small fancy goods. Charles Tiffany would marry Young's sister, Harriet, and in 1853 he bought out his partners and renamed the company Tiffany & Co.

Beyond jewellery, Charles Tiffany responded to the growing desire for luxury goods by selling bouquet holders, purses, Guerlain soaps and fine stationery, some imported from Paris. By 1845 he was advertising 'French Jewellery', including items in gold, as well as a wide selection of imitation jewellery aimed at reaching a wider

A Paris branch opened in 1850, and a year later the firm started a long relationship with Patek Philippe of Geneva. When Antoni Patek visited Tiffany's in 1855, he left with an order for 129 watches.

In 1878 one of the most famous sales of royal jewellery took place, when the jewels of Isabella II, Queen of Spain, came to market. Tiffany & Co. was one of the main buyers. It may well be that some or all of the emeralds in the magnificent necklace shown above originated from that historic sale.

In the same year, the company acquired the 128.54 carat Tiffany Yellow Diamond for \$18,000. Also in 1878, at the Exposition Universelle in Paris, Tiffany & Co. became the first American jeweller to be awarded the Grand Prix for its display of Japanese-influenced silver.

The firm continued to be a major buyer of royal jewels and spent \$487,459 in May 1887 when the French Crown Jewels were sold in Paris. These spectacular historic treasures were eagerly acquired by the new American tycoons who had made fortunes building empires of industry and finance in the last quarter of the 19th century.

America's coming of age

As America prospered during the mid-19th century, Tiffany & Co. expanded, opening a larger shop on Union Square in 1870. As national pride grew in the quality of American workmanship, so did demand for US-sourced gems and pearls.





LONDON 20TH/21ST CENTURY FRIEZE WEEK SALES ACHIEVE A RUNNING TOTAL OF £141.8M / \$189.7M / €162.75M

Diary Times Desk: As the art world turned its gaze to London for Frieze Week 2025, Christie's 20th/21st Century: London Evening Sale realised £106,925,400 / \$142,852,334 / €122,750,359. This result is up 30 per cent on the total achieved last year. With a sell-through rate of 90 per cent by value and 92 per cent by lot, the result proves the auction house's enduring role in the capital's art market.

Presided over by auctioneers Adrien Meyer and Yü-Ge Wang, bids came in from the floor, telephones and on Christie's LIVE for the curated selection of 60 lots - 67 per cent of whichwere fresh to auction. More than 56 per cent of bidders were from Europe, the Middle East and Africa, while 28 per cent came from the Americas, and 16 per cent from Asia and the Pacific.

The night's result is Christie's highest London Frieze Week evening sale total in seven years, signalling an increased demand for exceptional quality, impressive provenance and works fresh to the market.



The top price of the night went to Peter Doig's Ski Jacket (1994), which made £14,270,000, against a low estimate of £6,000,000. Its sale, after nearly 13 minutes of intense bidding, was greeted with a round of applause.

Showing a mountain landscape dotted with conifers and chalets, the work was acquired by Danish collector Ole Faarup from Gavin Brown's Enterprise gallery in New York in the year it was made — the same as Doig's Turner Prize nomination. Its sister painting, also titled Ski Jacket, was included in the prize exhibition and purchased by Tate the following year.

Eight more lots were offered from Faarup's collection. The Danish furniture retailer, who passed away in February this year, spent five decades acquiring art, at one point in the 1990s focusing his attention on London's emerging artists - following advice he had once received from Andy Warhol to 'buy things that are cutting-edge'. In total, the collection raised £27,318,500, benefitting the Ole Faarup Art Foundation.

Another of his works by Doig, Country Rock (1998-99), made £9,210,000, the second-highest price of the night. A panorama three metres wide, it depicts the entrance to a Toronto tunnel framed by a rainbow. It was purchased by Faarup from Contemporary Fine Arts in Berlin in 1999, and has been exhibited extensively.
