SAUDI BUS ACCIDENT: HYDERABAD POLICE COMMISSIONER **SAYS 45 KILLED**

Diary Times Desk:

At least 45 people, most of them from Hyderabad, killed in а killed in accident in Saudi Arabia, the city police chief said on Monday, citing preliminary information.

Addressing reporters here, Hyderabad police commissioner VC Sajjanar said a total of 54 people travelled to Jeddah from here on November 9. They were scheduled to return on November

Of the 54, four people travelled separately by car to Madina on Sunday, while another four staved back in Mecca.

According to official, 46 p people official, 46 people were travelling in the ill-fated bus, which collided with an oil tanker about 25 km from Madina.

Only one person survived the accident is currently undergoing treatment at a hospital.

HECTIC LOBBYING AMONG NDA PARTNERS FOR BERTHS IN NEW **BIHAR CABINET AHEAD OF NOV 20 SWEARING-IN**



Diary Times Desk: Hectic lobbying has started among NDA partners to finalise the allocation of Cabinet berths ahead of the swearing-in ceremony of the new Bihar government, scheduled to take place here on November 20.

Sources said the new Cabinet is likely to include five to six fresh faces from the main constituents — the BJP and JD(U).

Umesh Singh Kushwaha, JD(U) chief of the state unit who won from Mahnar seat, is likely to be inducted in the new cabinet of Nitish Kumar, who prepares to take oath as the CM for a record 10th time.

Kumar will submit his resignation to Governor Arif Mohammad Khan as head of the outgoing government on November 19.

While the JD(U) is set to retain most of its ministers, the BJP may introduce a few new faces, sources said.

Of the 25 ministers in the outgoing Cabinet who contested the polls, all but one won.

The lone unsuccessful minister, Sumit Kumar Singh, elected as an Independent in 2020 and later inducted into the Cabinet, failed to

retain his seat after contesting on a JD(U) ticket.

Along with the JD(U) and the BJP, smaller partners — Union minister Chirag Paswan's LJP (RV), Jitan Ram Manjhi's HAM-S, and

Upendra Kushwaha's RLM — will also be part of the new Cabinet.

The LJP (RV) is likely to get three betths while HAM-S and RLM may get one berth each. A maximum of 16 ministers from the BJP and 14 from JD(U), along with Nitish Kumar, are likely to take oath on November 20," sources said.

"We are looking forward to greater representation in the new Cabinet compared to the last one in which we had only 12 ministers. Our tally has risen sharply since 2020, when we had fewer than 50 MLAs," JD(U) sources said.

Apart from the CM, JD (U) leaders who are expected to be part of the new Cabinet include: Bijendra Prasad Yadav, Vijay Kumar Choudhary, Shrawan Kumar, Sunil Kumar, Lesi Singh, Sheila Mandal, Madan Sahni, Ratnesh Sada, Mohammad Zama Khan, Jayant Raj, Umesh Singh Kushwaha and Ashok Chowdhary.

SUPREME COURT

SC ASKS CENTRE, DGCA TO RESPOND TO PETITION **SEEKING TO CHECK TO** CONTROL UNPREDICTABLE **FLUCTUATIONS IN** AIRFARES



Diary Times Desk :The Supreme Court on Monday asked the Centre, the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) and the Airports Economic Regulatory Authority of India (AERAI) to a petition seeking binding regulatory guidelines to control the "unpredictable fluctuations" in airfare and ancillary charges imposed by private airlines in

Issuing notices to the respondents, a Bench of Justice Vikram Nath and Justice Sandeep Mehta asked them to file their replies activist S Laxminarayanan's petition that sought to establish a robust, independent regulator that ensures transparency and passenger protection across the civil aviation sector and posted the matter for hearing after four weeks.

"Arbitrary fare hikes during emergencies deny vulnerable citizens this right, especially when they are compelled to choose air travel out of necessity rather than luxury," petitioner submitted.

In a Constitutional Republic governed by the rule of law, the State cannot remain a mute spectator to this ongoing a nature spectator to this ongoing violation of rights, it said, asserting that "The State has a positive obligation under Article 21 to ensure that essential services like air travel remain fair, arrordable, transparent, uninterrupted."

IRAN ENDS VISA-FREE ENTRY FOR INDIANS FROM NOVEMBER 22



Diary Times Desk: Iran has scrapped its visa-waiver facility for ordinary Indian passport holders following a series of alarming incidents in which Indians were trafficked, kidnapped and extorted after being lured to the country on false promises of jobs or onward translate thing extincts. travel to third nations.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), in a detailed advisory issued on Monday, said the government had been "drawn to several incidents" where Indian nationals were misled by agents offering lucrative employment or seamless transit routes via Iran.

Taking advantage of Iran's visa-free entry for Indian travellers, many unsuspecting citizens flew into the country -- only to find themselves

According to the advisory, several Indians were kidnapped for ransom shortly after landing in Iran, indicating a coordinated criminal network exploiting the visa-waiver loophole. These syndicates allegedly targeted vulnerable job-seekers, particularly those desperate for overseas opportunities

In response to the escalating misuse, the Iranian Government has formally suspended the visa-free facility for Indian nationals effective November 22, 2025.

40% OF NEW BIHAR MLAS HAVE NO COLLEGE DEGREE. WOMEN COMPRISE 12% OF TOTAL HOUSE STRENGTH



Diary Times Desk: Around 12 per cent of th newly elected MLAs in Bihar are women. a marginal increase from the last polls, while around 40 per cent members in the new Assembly do not have college degrees, according to a report by think-tank PRS Legislative Research.

The report also showed that the number of MLAs aged more than 55 years has increased following the Bihar Assembly elections.

DELHI BLAST: 'ACTIVE CO-CONSPIRATOR' ARRESTED BY NIA FROM JAMMU AND KASHMIR'S SRINAGAR



Diary Times Desk: The National Investigation Agency (NIA) has arrested another Jammu and Kashmir resident from Srinagar in connection with the blast near the Red Fort metro station in Delhi that claimed 15 lives and injured dozens, said officials on Monday. The accused, identified as Jasir Bilal Wani alias Danish, worked closely with suicide bomber Dr Umar Un Nabi and had allegedly provided him 'technical' assistance.

Wani, who is a resident of Qazigund in the Anantnag district, was an active coconspirator behind the attack, said officials, adding that he modified drones and attempted to make rockets ahead of the blast in the national capital. He has now been brought to Delhi, where he will be interrogated at the NIA headquarters.

In its statement, the probe agency said it continues to explore various angles to unravel the conspiracy behind the bombing.

NDA FIRMS UP FORMULA FOR BIHAR GOVERNMENT FORMATION

Diary Times Desk: The NDA is expected to apply the same formula for portfolio allocation that it used during ticket distribution, coalition insiders indicated. Under the emerging arrangement, Nitish Kumar's JD(U) will continue to hold the Chief Minister's post. Meanwhile, the BJP and Chirag Paswan's LJP (Ram Vilas) are each likely to secure one Deputy Chief Minister position, signalling a balanced power-sharing structure within the alliance.Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar on Sunday held a series of meetings with National Democratic Alliance (NDA) leaders at his official residence in Patna to discuss the formation of a new government after the ruling alliance secured a three-fourth majority, winning 202 out of 243 seats, in the Assembly elections.

Union minister of state for home Nityanand Rai and Rashtriya Lok Morcha (RLM) chief and Rajya Sabha MP Upendra Kushwaha were among those who met Nitish.

INDIA WILL TREAT TERRORISTS AND THEIR BACKERS ALIKE, SAYS ARMY CHIEF

Diary Times Desk: Chief of Army Staff General Upendra Dwivedi on Monday asserted that the country will continue to treat terrorists and their supporters without distinction and respond firmly to any act of terrorism.

Gen Dwivedi said India is committed to progress and development, but will not hesitate to act against those who attempt to derail its path.

"India focuses on progress and prosperity. If someone creates obstacles in our course, then we will have to take some action against them," he said, in a firm message to Pakistan

Reiterating New Delhi's long-standing stance, he added, "Talks and terror can't go together; blood and water cannot flow together. We support a peaceful process and will cooperate with it. Until then, we will treat terrorists and their sponsors alike." Hinting at Pakistan's nuclear posturing, Gen Dwivedi said India is no longer susceptible to strategic coercion. "Today, India is in a position where it is not scared of any blackmailing," he said, stressing that the country's "new normal" in counterterrorism operations will pose a significant challenge to Pakistan if it continues supporting anti-India groups.

AS CRACKS APPEAR IN LALU YADAV'S CLAN, A LOOK AT OTHER POLITICAL FAMILY FEUDS

Diary Times Desk: The Rashtriya Janata Dal's massive defeat in the 2025 Bihar Assembly election exposed what was perhaps already known – an unprecedented feud within veteran politician and party patriarch Lalu Prasad Yadav's family. The party, once dominant with 75 seats in 2020, collapsed to 25 seats in 2025, its worst performance in 15 years. As the Mahagathbandhan shrank to only 35 seats, cracks inside the Yadav household came out in the open.Lalu's second daughter Rohini Acharya, left the family home in Patna, accusing her brother Tejashwi Yadav and his close aides Sanjay Yadav and Ramiz Khan of harassment. She claimed she was abused, hit with slippers, and told to leave. Three sisters, Rajlakshmi, Ragini and Chanda, also left with their families.

Lalu's elder son Tej Pratap Yadav, expelled by Lalu earlier this year for six years, publicly backed Rohini and attacked Tejashwi's aides. Tej Pratap was ousted after Lalu Prasad accused him of "ignoring moral values" following a Facebook post about a long-term relationship that the family said damaged their image. Tej Pratap then launched a separate outfit, Janshakti Janata Dal, and lost the Mahua seat in the recent polls.



NEARLY 200 UNDER SCANNER IN 'WHITE-COLLAR' TERROR MODULE TIED TO DELHI RI AST

Diary Times Desk: Around 200 people are reportedly under the scanner of investigating agencies in the Faridabad-based "white-collar" terror module linked to the Red Fort blast.

This development comes after a review of call records and online transactions allegedly connected to the three key accused in the case.

Sources said those under the scanner include former students and colleagues from Al-Falah University, shopkeepers, diagnostic centre owners and imams of madrasas.

Three of the key accused, including Dr Umar Nabi, who died in the explosion, had reportedly made online payments to locals as part of the efforts to build their support and strengthen the network.

'WHERE DO YOU WANT TO CELEBRATE NEW YEAR?' COURT WARNS TELANGANA SPEAKER

Diary Times Desk: An irked Supreme Court has given Telangana Speaker Gaddam Prasad Kumar two weeks to rule on disqualification petitions pending against 10 lawmakers who jumped from the Bharat Rashtra Samithi to the ruling Congress between March and June last year.

This was after the 2023 Assembly election, in which the BRS - in power since the state was formed in 2014 - was thumped by the Congress.

A bench led by Chief Justice BR Gavai directed Gaddam Kumar - whom the BRS has accused of 'deliberate inaction' - to "finish it (the hearing) by next week or face contempt of court" after an earlier three-month ultimatum handed down on July 31 went unheeded. Senior advocate Abhishek Manu Singhvi, who represented the Speaker, assured the court a decision will be made in two weeks.

The Speaker has to decide, the Chief Justice said, where wants to celebrate New Year's Eve, as the court heard arguments for contempt of court action against Kumar for ignoring its orders.

And, on September 29 - two months into the first deadline - the petitions were picked up, starting with those dealing with Prakash Goud, Kale Yadaiah, Mahipal Reddy, and BK Reddy.

18 MEMBERS OF HYDERABAD FAMILY - 3 GENERATIONS - KILLED IN SAUDI BUS CRASH

Diary Times Desk: Eighteen members of one family, nine of them children, are among the 42 Indian pilgrims killed in a road accident near Medina in Saudi Arabia. The Hyderabad-based family was to return on Saturday, their relatives told NDTV.

"My sister-in-law, brother-in-law, their son, three daughters and their children went (for Umrah). They left eight days ago. The Umrah was done, and they were returning to Medina. Around 1.30 am, the accident occurred, and the bus was destroyed in the fire. They were supposed to return on Saturday," Mohammed Asif said.

Asif said they were in constant touch with their relatives before the tragedy struck. "Eighteen members of one family -- nine adults and nine children -- have died. It is a terrible tragedy for us," he said.

Asif identified some of his relatives as Naseeruddin (70), his wife Akhter Begum (62), son Salauddin (42), daughters Amina (44), Rizwana (38), and Shabana (40), and their children.

'UNELECTED, ILLEGAL REGIME'S SHAM OF A VERDICT': SHEIKH HASINA'S SON

Diary Times Desk: Former Bangladesh prime minister Sheikh Hasina's son has called her trial and sentencing a "sham" under an "unelected regime". Sajeeb Wazed, who is in Washington DC, told NDTV on phone the very short 140-day trial of the former prime minister was predecided at a time when the country did not have a parliament.

"This is an unelected regime. The government itself is completely unconstitutional, unelected and illegal," Wazed told NDTV.

Though he clarified India has not given any assurance on protecting his mother, he expressed confidence that considering what has happened in Bangladesh, it "would be illegal of India to comply with such an illegal [extradition] request".

"An important trial was conducted and finished within something like 140 days from start to finish, which is almost impossible. They have to amend laws to enable these trials to be fast-tracked, which only parliament can do. And right now there is no parliament," he said.

A special tribunal in Bangladesh for "crimes against humanity" on Monday sentenced Hasina to death over her Awami League government's crackdown on student-led protests last year. The tribunal described the 78-year-old Awami League leader.

DELHI SUICIDE BLAST DEATH COUNT RISES TO 15



Diary Times Desk: The death count in the November 10 blast near the Red Fort rose to 15 after two more injured persons succumbed to their injuries at the LNJP Hospital here, an official said on Monday.

The victims have been identified as Lukmaan (50) and Vinay Pathak (50), a senior police officer said.

Another victim, Bilal, had died during treatment last Thursday to bringing the toll to 13. With the latest fatalities, the number of those killed in the high-intensity explosion has now climbed to 15, with many others still undergoing treatment, the officer said.

The Delhi Police said they received information about the latest deaths from the hospital, adding that post-mortem examinations will be conducted soon.

"WE REMAIN IN EMOTIONAL MODE, NOT ELECTION MODE": PM MODI AFTER BIHAR WIN

Diary Times Desk: In a stirring address at the Sixth Ramnath Goenka Lecture, organised by the Express Group, Prime Minister Narendra Modi turned the spotlight on Bihar's turbulent past and promising future, lamenting what could have been under leaders like Lalu Prasad Yadav while championing a vision of compassionate, development-driven governance.

NO BAN ON CONSTRUCTION IN DELHI, SUPREME COURT SAYS "NO TEMPORARY SOLUTIONS"

Diary Times Desk: Refusing a blanket ban on construction in Delhi and the National Capital Region despite 'very poor' AQI, the Supreme Court on Monday said that environmental concerns need to be balanced with development.

The Bench, led by Chief Justice Of India BR Gavai, said it is not inclined to issue "bold directions" to curb the rapidly rising pollution levels in Delhi, while maintaining that it does not comprise of experts.

The Bench also sought a plan from the Centre by November 19 that aims at tackling the air pollution crisis. Stressing the futility of temprary solutions, the top court said the Centre has to formulate long-term solutions to tackle the menace.

Centre Must Take The Lead: Top Court The Bench noted that lakhs of families depend on construction and allied activity for livelihood, and a sweeping ban would have severe socioeconomic consequences.

OMCS CLINCH LARGE LNG IMPORT DEAL WITH US FOR 2026

Diary Times Desk: India's state-owned oil companies have concluded a one-year deal for imports of 2.2 million tonnes per annum of liquified petroleum gas (LPG) in 2026 from the US, Union Minister for Petroleum and Natural Gas Hardeep Singh Puri said on Monday. The imports, accounting for close to 10% of the country's annual imports, will be sourced from the US Gulf Coast, the first structured contract of US LPG for the Indian market. The deal follows the commitment expressed by India to scale up energy imports from the US, with which the country is negotiating a bilateral trade agreement (BTA), even as most Indian goods face an additional tariff of 50% in the US over the most favoured nation rates.

"This purchase is based on using Mount Belvieu as the benchmark for LPG purchases and a team of our officials from IndianOil , BPCL, and HPCL had visited the US and engaged in discussions with major US producers over the last few months, which have been concluded now," the minister said in a post on X.



DRAMATIC VIDEO SHOWS US STORE OWNER FIRING AT MASKED ROBBERS, CHASING THEM INTO STREETS

Five masked robbers barged into a jewellery store in Madera, California, only to fly out of the front door dramatically, thanks to the store owner's quick thinking and bravery.

At around 5:30 pm (local time) on Thursday, November 13, 2025, the robbers, wearing black masks and gloves, entered Olivia's Fine Jewelry store and began smashing glass cases to steal valuable jewellery, the New York Post reported.

A store clerk attempted to intervene, pushing one of the thieves back over a counter. Moments later, the robbers began running when the store owner emerged with a gun and opened fire, chasing the robbers out of the store and into the streets

They were still able to make off with \$170,000 in gems, the report mentioned, citing the authorities.

TURKEY SEEKS TO HOST NEXT COP AS CO-PRESIDENCY PLANS FALTER

Diary Times Desk: Turkey wants to host next year's UN climate change talks and is ready to organise the event alone if there is no agreement on sharing the event, a Turkish diplomatic source told AFP Sunday (November 16).

Australia and Turkey are locked in a stalemate over who should host the 31st United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP31) in 2026.

The host is selected by consensus, so unless Australia or Turkey withdraws or the countries agree to share the conference, both will miss out. A decision should be made at the current COP conference in Belem, Brazil.

If no consensus is reached, the summit would revert to Bonn, the German city that hosts the UN's climate secretariat.

The Turkish source said discussions with Australia at the UN General Assembly's annual meetings in September yielded initial proposals for joint management of the event and shared high-level meetings.

WHAT'S FUELLING ANTI-GRAFT PROTESTS IN THE PHILIPPINES

Diary Times Desk: More than 200,000 protesters turned out on Monday for the second day of an antigraft rally in the Philippines, part of a wave of demonstrations since August demanding accountability for suspected corruption in flood-control projects.

How Did It Start?

In August, President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. revealed an internal audit exposing serious irregularities in multi-billion-peso flood control projects.

These projects have been thrust into the spotlight in recent months after accusations of mismanagement emerged during a period of monsoon rains and storms that inundated towns and cities across the natural disaster-prone nation.

ISRAEL PUSHES US TO CLOSE DOOR ON PALESTINIAN STATEHOOD BEFORE UNSC

Diary Times Desk: Israel is engaged in a last-ditch bid to change the wording of a United Nations Security Council (UNSC) resolution on the next phase of United States President Donald Trump's Gaza peace plan that was recently amended to mention a "credible pathway" to Palestinian statehood.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu told his cabinet on Sunday that his opposition to a Palestinian state had "not changed one bit", one day before the UNSC votes on the US-drafted resolution, which would mandate a transitional administration and an international stabilisation force (ISF) in Gaza.

Israeli public broadcaster Kan reported on Sunday that Netanyahu's government was engaged in a last-minute diplomatic push to alter the draft resolution, which the US had changed to include more defined language about Palestinian self-determination under pressure from Arab and Muslim countries expected to contribute troops to the ISF.

The draft now says that "conditions may be in place for a credible pathway to Palestinian self-determination and statehood" after reforms to the Palestinian Authority are "faithfully carried out and Gaza redevelopment has advanced".



DONALD TRUMP'S NEXT MOVE: NO GREEN CARDS FOR BANNED COUNTRIES, EVEN IF YOU'RE ALREADY IN US

Diary Times Desk: The Donald Trump administration is plotting a new crackdown: green cards could soon be off-limits for immigrants from the same countries already hit by his sweeping travel ban.

The draft policy documents, according to The New York Times, show plans to block green card and visa approvals for nationals from 12 countries in Africa and the Middle East, even if they are already living in the U.S.

The targeted countries—Afghanistan, Chad, the Republic of Congo, Equatorial Guinea, Eritrea, Haiti, Iran, Libya, Myanmar, Somalia, Sudan, and Yemen—have been under a travel ban since June, when President Trump signed the order citing national security concerns.

Now, the administration aims to expand that policy by limiting permanent residency for people from those nations, based on claims that they don't provide sufficient identity verification or share reliable security data. "Some countries might not share enough vetting and screening information.



TREASURY SECRETARY SAYS 'WE WILL SEE' ABOUT \$2,000 REBATE CHECKS TO AMERICANS AS SUPREME COURT WEIGHS TRUMP'S TARIFFS

Diary Times Desk: Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent said Sunday that President Donald Trump's proposal to issue \$2,000 tariff rebate checks to most Americans would require Congress' approval.

"We will see. We need legislation for that," Bessent said on Fox News' "Sunday Morning Futures" when asked about rebate checks, adding that "Those could go out."

Trump has repeatedly suggested using tariffs to fund rebate checks in recent months, including in a Truth Social post last weekend. "People that are against Tariffs are FOOLS! ... A dividend of at least \$2000 a person (not including high income people!) will be paid to everyone," he wrote. Trump first floated the idea of Americans potentially receiving a portion of the tariff revenue in July.

The payments would be "for working families" and would have an income limit, Bessent said Sunday.

ISRAELI-RUN ENTITY ILLEGALLY FLYING PALESTINIANS OUT OF GAZA: REPORTS



Diary Times Desk: An Israeli-run organization is coordinating the secretive flights transporting Palestinians from the Gaza Strip abroad via Ramon Airport in southern Israel, the Israeli daily Haaretz reported Sunday.

On Thursday, South Africa granted a 90-day visa exemption for 153 Palestinians who arrived from Kenya to seek asylum in the country, although they were initially denied entry due to a lack of travel documents and customary departure stamps in their passports.

South African President Cyril Ramaphosa said that the intelligence services are investigating the entity behind the charter plane that landed in Johannesburg carrying dozens of Palestinians without official travel documents

According to Haaretz, an association run by Tomer Janar Lind, who holds dual Israeli-Estonian citizenship, sells Palestinians in Gaza seats on chartered flights heading to far-off countries such as Indonesia, Malaysia and South Africa for around \$2,000.

The association's website claims it was founded in Germany and maintains offices in East Jerusalem. However, the newspaper's investigation found that it is actually registered in Estonia and operates through a front consulting company.

'ISRAEL' STOLE OVER 17,000 ARTIFACTS FROM HISTORIC GAZA MUSEUM: REPORTS

Diary Times Desk: Palestinian officials said 'Israeli' forces stole over 17,000 archaeological artifacts from the Al-Basha Palace Museum (Qasr al-Basha) in Gaza City during the two-year-long assault.

Hamouda al-Dahdar, the supervisor of the archaeological restoration of Al-Basha Palace said that the museum contained more than 17,000 items, primarily from the Mamluk era, before their disappearance, according to Palestinian sources.

He attributed the theft primarily to 'Israeli' forces, noting that only 20 artifacts recovered from the site's rubble.

RUSSIA OFFERS SU-57 NOZZLE UPGRADE IN EXPORT DRIVE

Diary Times Desk: Russia is showing off a potential stealth upgrade for the Su-57's radar-exposed engine nozzles inside the country's pavilion on the static display here as part of a wider propulsion update on behalf of the Sukhoi fighter.

The Su-57 debuted in 2010 with non-stealthy, axisymmetric nozzles behind a pair of AL-41F turbofan engines. This comparatively outdated configuration remained unchanged even as the fighter, codenamed by NATO as Felon, entered service in 2020

But Russian industry has been working to update the propulsion system to modern standards. Pictures appeared on social media channels last year of a Su-57 prototype equipped with a pair of canted, 2D thrust-vectoring nozzles.

BANGLADESH ISSUES SHOOT-AT-SIGHT ORDER AHEAD OF SHEIKH HASINA VERDICT: WHAT ARE HER FIVE CHARGES?

Diary Times Desk: Bangladesh's ousted Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is facing charges of crimes against humanity linked to last year's student-led uprising that toppled her 15-year rule.

Security has been tightened across Bangladesh ahead of a special tribunal's verdict against ousted Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, who faces charges of crimes against humanity linked to last year's uprising.

Dhaka police chief Sheikh Mohammad Sazzat Ali issued a "shoot-on-sight" order against anyone attempting to torch vehicles or throw crude bombs. The directive comes after nearly 50 arson attacks, mostly targeting vehicles, and dozens of bomb explosions were reported nationwide in the past week. Two people were killed in the attacks, local media said.

Authorities also requested army deployment around the Supreme Court ahead of the tribunal proceedings. Prosecutors at the International Crimes Tribunal have sought the death penalty for Hasina, who is in exile in India, and for former home minister Asaduzzaman Khan.



VOTERS IN ECUADOR REJECT RETURN OF FOREIGN MILITARY BASES

Diary Times Desk: Voters in Ecuador have rejected a proposal to allow the return of foreign military bases, according to early referendum results, with a count of close to 90 percent of ballots showing nearly two-thirds voting "no" on the proposal.

The loss on Sunday was a blow to President Daniel Noboa, who has said foreign cooperation, including shared or foreign bases within the country, is central to fighting organised crime.

A separate measure to convene an assembly to rewrite the constitution also had more than 61 percent rejection, with nearly 88 percent of votes counted.

Noboa acknowledged the defeat in a post on X.

"We respect the will of the Ecuadorian people," he wrote.

"Our commitment does not change; it strengthens. We will continue to fight tirelessly for the country that you deserve, with the tools that we have."

MQM LEADER SLAMS COALITION GOVT OF PAKISTAN OVER THE PASSAGE OF 27TH CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Diary Times Desk: Muttahida Qaumi Movement's founding leader and Supremo Altaf Hussain, during his 346th public address via TikTok, sharply criticised the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) and the Pakistan People's Party (PPP) for endorsing and facilitating the approval of the 27th Constitutional Amendment.

He asserted that both parties have undermined the essence of the Constitution, harmed the judiciary and justice system, and betrayed their own commitments and manifestos.

PARIAH TO PEACE BROKER: SAUDI CROWN PRINCE RECLAIMS WORLD STAGE IN **US VISIT**

Digry Times Desk: On his first White House visit since the killing of Saudi critic Jamal Khashoggi sparked global outrage, Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman is on a mission to reclaim his place on the world stage and prove to President Donald Trump that backing his forceful leadership was worth the gamble.

Tuesday's meeting between Trump and Saudi Arabia's de facto ruler -- widely known as MbS -- underscores a relationship built on strategic interests that have endured even as the uproar around the 2018 killing of Khashoggi, an insider-turned-critic, recedes into history.

Seven years on, MbS now casts himself as a broker of peace, repairing ties with Iran, pushing for a Gaza ceasefire and welcoming Syria back into the Arab fold, a striking pivot from a prince once branded reckless for plunging into Yemen's war

At home, in less than a decade, the 40-year-old has unleashed a social revolution unseen since his grandfather, King Abdulaziz, forged the kingdom from desert tribes and sealed its fateful alliance with Washington.



WILL THE GOVERNMENT'S NEW ASYLUM **PLANS WORK?**

LANDSLIDES IN CENTRAL JAVA KILL 18, WITH RESCUERS STILL **DIGGING FOR SURVIVORS**

Diary Times Desk: Rain-triggered landslides in two regions of Indonesia's Central Java province last week have killed at least 18 people, authorities said on Monday, as emergency teams continued to dig through layers of earth and debris.

In the city of Cilacap, a landslide buried a dozen houses in Cibeunying village, the national disaster mitigation agency said, adding that the search was complicated because victims were trapped 3 to 8 metres (10 to 25 feet) underground.

The Cilacap slide alone has left at least 16 people dead and seven missing, said M Abdullah, chief of the search and rescue agency's local division.

Excavators were deployed to dig through dirt in Cilacap, footage from news channel KompasTV showed on Monday.

Separately, two people died and 27 were missing after a landslide on Saturday in the region of Banjarnegara in Central Java, the disaster mitigation agency said on Monday. As many as 30 houses as well as farms were damaged, it said.

The Southeast Asian country's wet season started in September and is likely to last until April, bringing a high risk of extreme rainfall and flooding, the weather agency said.

Air Marshal Tiwari said, "We sent the Tejas as well as the Surya Kiran Aerobatics Team on the request of the UAE authorities. We have a very good cooperation with them, both at the strategic level as well as the service level."

TRUMP CALLS ON HOUSE REPUBLICANS TO VOTE TO RELEASE EPSTEIN FILES

Diary Times Desk: US President Donald Trump has urged lawmakers in his own party to vote to release files relating to the late convicted sex offender Jeffrey Epstein.

Trump wrote on Sunday night that Republicans in the House of Representatives should do so "because we have nothing to hide".

RUSSIAN STRIKES KILL 4 AMID CLAIMS OF FRESH GAINS ACROSS E. UKRAINE



Diary Times Desk: At least four people were killed and 15 others injured in Russian strikes on Ukraine's northeastern Kharkiv and southwestern Odesa regions, local authorities said Monday, as Moscow claimed to have fresh gains.

"According to preliminary data, three people were killed, 13 more were injured, including four children," said a statement by Ukraine's State Emergency Service (DSNS) on Telegram.

It noted that missile strikes targeted a residential area in the city of Balakliia, situated about 70 kilometers (43.4 miles) southeast of the country's second-largest city of Kharkiv.

The statement said that residential buildings, as well as cars, high-rise apartments, and a kindergarten, were damaged in the attack, adding that all fires that broke out as a result of the attack were promptly extinguished.

Kharkiv Gov. Oleh Synyehubov said that units from the State Emergency Service continue to work at the site of the attack.

Meanwhile, Vitalii Karabanov, the head of Balakliia's city military administration, claimed two missiles hit the city.

DOZENS DIE IN DR CONGO MINE AFTER MAKESHIFT BRIDGE COLLAPSES

Diary Times Desk: Rescuers are searching for survivors after a bridge collapsed at a cobalt mine in the Democratic Republic of Congo, killing at least 32 people.

Unauthorised miners forced their way into the southern Kalando mine on Saturday despite being banned from the site, said local official Roy Kaumba Mayonde.

Military personnel guarding the site then reportedly fired guns, causing the bridge to collapse after panicked miners rushed across it, government mining agency SAEMAPE said.

The military has not responded to this allegation.

Such accidents are not uncommon in DR Congo, where around 1.5 to 2 million people work in the unregulated artisanal mining industry, which feeds the global demand for copper, cobalt and other minerals.

Two of the miners injured at Kalando mine, located in the village of Mulondo, sustained bullet wounds, Olivier Kayumba, a journalist who visited the scene on Sunday, said.

Mr Kayumba told the BBC that one miner had been shot in the thigh and the other in the hand.

UKRAINE TO BUY 'UP TO 100' FRENCH FIGHTER JETS, ELYSEE PALACE ANNOUNCES

Diary Times Desk: Ukraine will purchase "up to 100" French-made Rafale fighter jets as well as anti-air defenses and drones from France, the Elysee Palace confirmed, as Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky visited Paris on Monday.

"We will have the greatest air defense system, one of the greatest in the world," the Ukrainian president told reporters after signing the letter of intent with French President Emmanuel Macron at the Villacoublay Air Force Base southwest of Paris on Monday morning.

At a news conference, Zelensky told reporters that the deal would include eight air defense systems and six launchers in what he described as an "historic agreement."

Macron said that some of the deliveries of drones, interceptor drones and guided bombs, would come in the "very short term" with manufacturing commitments made for the coming three years. The Elysee Palace said that the purchases covered by the letter of intent would span the next 10 years. Macron said that Ukraine will receive

But what was once the home of a Christian Scientist church, is now the holy grail of Internet history — the Internet Archive, a non-profit library run by a group of software engineers and librarians, who for nearly 30 years have been saving the web one page at a time.

Inside the stained-glassadorned sanctuary, the sounds of church sermons have been replaced by the hum of servers, where the Internet Archive's Wayback Machine preserves web pages.

The Wayback Machine, a tool used by millions every day, has proven critical for academics and journalists searching for historical information on what corporations, people and governments have published online in the past, long after their websites have been updated or changed.

For many, the Wayback Machine is like a living history of the internet, and it just logged its trillionth page last month.

UNCLE SAM IS OUTPERFORMING THE S&P 500

Diary Times Desk: The Trump administration is investing in publicly traded companies — and it's sending stocks soaring higher.

Under President Donald Trump, the US government has taken equity stakes in companies including Intel (INTC), MP Materials (MP), Lithium Americas (LAC) and Trilogy Metals (TMQ).

Investing in public companies is an unusual move that has sparked debate on Wall Street and Capitol Hill about whether the government should be interfering in markets.

Proponents say the equity stakes are a strategic move to support companies in industries that are critical to national security, such as rare earths mining and the production of semiconductor chips. Critics, meanwhile, say it's a heavyhanded use of government influence that is un-American and exposes taxpayers to unnecessary risk.

So far, the government's portfolio is outperforming the S&P 500. Intel shares are up 77% this year.

MP Materials shares have soared 276%. Lithium Americas and Trilogy Metals shares are up 50% and 204%, respectively. The benchmark S&P 500 is up 14.5% this year.

The Fed's latest decision to lower interest rates by a quarter point in late October was opposed by two policymakers: one official who preferred to hold rates steady, and another who wanted a larger rate cut instead. A pair of opposing dissents had not been seen since 2019. Earlier this year, more than one Fed governor cast a dissenting vote for the first time in more than three decades.

The growing divide among Fed officials has spilled out into public speeches in recent days, presenting a challenge for Powell as he works to retain consensus among colleagues.

That division is a direct result of the uncertainty in the US economy and questions around the impacts of President Donald Trump's aggressive trade policy.

Beginning Monday, a Frozen Peppermint Hot Chocolate drink will be available exclusively at Starbucks cafés inside Target stores. The vast majority of Target's 2,000 locations include a Starbucks, but this marks the firstever holiday drink collaboration between the two companies.

Retailers have been under immense pressure this year as inflation and tariffs drive consumer sentiment near record lows. A number of consumer brands said on their quarterly earnings calls with Wall Street analysts that low-income consumers in particular are growing increasingly cost-sensitive, and they're cutting back on non-essentials.

That trend has hit Target and Starbucks particularly hard: Target, because it specializes in discretionary items, including impulse buys and home decor; and Starbucks.

SKY SPORTS DITCHES NEW WOMEN'S TIKTOK ACCOUNT AFTER **VIEWERS BRAND IT 'SEXIST' AND 'PATRONIZING'**

Subscription TV company Sky Sports has scrapped its new TikTok account targeting female sports fans after just three days, after the style and tone of its videos faced backlash.

Social media users labeled the account "condescending," "patronizing" and "sexist," accusing it of perpetuating the problems it purported to address.

"Our intention for Halo was to create a space alongside our existing social channels for new, young, female fans," Sky said in a statement Sunday. "We've listened. We didn't get it right. As a result we're stopping all activity on this account.

"We're learning and remain as committed as ever to creating spaces where fans feel included and inspired."

Complete with a logo drenched in bright sunset colors, the account was initially marketed as "Sky Sports' lil sis," accompanied by a sparkle emoji.

From the start, the intention was to create "not a women's sports account" but "sports content through a female lens," Andy Gill, Sky's audience development and social media head, said in a LinkedIn post announcing the new account, which was launched Thursday.

It was this distinction that ultimately seemed to create the problem. Sky Sports deleted all the content it had posted but clips that resurfaced elsewhere on TikTok show a succession of videos with pastel, sparkly writing overlaid on them. In one widely circulated video, Sky posted a sped-up clip of Manchester City striker Erling Haaland scoring against Bournemouth with the caption "How the matcha + hot girl walk combo hits." In another, it posted a clip of F1 driver Charles Leclerc talking about his recent engagement and fiancée. CNN was unable to independently verify the videos.

NOVEMBER HEADING **TOWARDS BECOMING DRIEST MONTH OF THE** YEAR, RECORDS 88 PER **CENT RAIN DEFICIT SO** FΔR

Diary Times Desk: With the state witnessing a record 88 per cent rainfall deficit over the last 17 days, November is set to become the driest month of the year. This year, November witnessed very few spells of snowfall and rainfall, due to which all 12 districts of the state reported higher rainfall deficit. While two districts reported 100 per cent rainfall deficit, six districts reported a rainfall deficit of over 90 per cent.

As per the State Meteorological Department, in November, Himachal Pradesh received 1.2 mm rain as compared to 9.9 mm, which was considered normal for the month.

The department's data also revealed that Sirmaur and Mandi witnessed a total rainfall deficit of 100 per cent as the two districts did not receive any rainfall or snowfall in November. Sirmaur, on an average, witnesses around 3.5 mm rain during November, while Mandi receives 7.3 mm. However, both the districts witnessed zero rainfall over the last 17 days.

TOURIST FOOTFALL SOARS IN HIMACHAL PRADESH, POPULAR SPOTS GRAPPLE WITH **GROWING GARBAGE CRISIS**

Diary Times Desk : As tourist footfall soars across Himachal Pradesh, its towns are buckling under a growing garbage crisis. The problem is glaring in Dharamsala, Bir Billing, Kullu and Manali. Even rural areas and relatively untouched regions of Lahaul-Spiti — Sissu and Keylong - are feeling the strain following the opening of the Atal Tunnel, which has dramatically boosted tourist numbers.

Several trekking routes across the state are found littered with garbage. Similar scenes are witnessed along the rivulets, especially between Dharamsala and Palampur, where visitors leave behind heaps of plastic and food waste after having a gala time in the hills.

POST CABINET APPROVAL TO LOW-IMPACT HOUSING POLICY, FORESTERS REMIND GOVT OF ECO-DISASTERS IN HP, UTTARAKHAND

Diary Times Desk: A day after the Punjab Cabinet approved lowimpact residential units of minimum 1-acre (4,000 sq yards) in the eco-fragile Kandi areas in the lower Shivalik Hills, foresters have expressed serious concern over the state not waiting for the Centre's approval to the impending declaration of the Eco Sensitive Zone around the Sukhna Wild Life Sanctuary and adhering to the provisions of the Forest Conservation Act (FCA),

Referring to the March 2015 communication of the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change to the state government, it was pointed out that while taking out the land in Mohali, Ropar, Nawanshahr, Hoshiarpur and Gurdaspur districts from the purview of the Punjab Land Preservation Act 1900, the ministry had pointed out that such areas would be treated as forest for the purpose of the FCA, 1980. "Owners of such land may utilise such delisted PLPA areas for the bona fide use of agriculture and for sustaining livelihood", the ministry had pointed out.

HSPCB TOLD TO TRACK COMPLIANCE OF ALL READY MIX CONCRETE UNITS IN HARYANA

Diary Times Desk: The National Green Tribunal (NGT) has directed the Haryana State Pollution Control Board (HSPCB) to compile district-wise details of all ready mix concrete (RMC) plants operating across the state and verify whether they are complying with environmental norms.

The Tribunal has further instructed the board to take action under the law against any non-compliant units.

The directions came in response to a complaint filed last year by Deepak, a resident of Dadlana village, alleging that several RMC plants in the area were operating illegally and emitting excessive dust, causing air pollution and health hazards for local residents.

KORIAWAS NAMING CONTROVERSY SETTLED; HOSPITAL TO BEAR RAO TULARAM'S NAME

Diary Times Desk: The 191-day-long dispute over the naming of Maharishi Chyawan Medical College, Koriawas, came to an end on Sunday after Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini announced that the general hospital to be built on the college premises would be named

"Shaheed Rao Tularam."

The CM made the announcement while addressing the state-level Maharaja Shoor Saini Jayanti celebrations in Narnaul, where he was the chief guest. Residents of Koriawas and nearby villages had been sitting on a dharna outside the medical college for nearly six-and-a-half months, demanding that the institution be named after freedom fighter Rao Tularam. Following the CM's declaration, the protesters called off their agitation.

Earlier in the day, the Chief Minister inaugurated and laid foundation stones for 19 development projects worth Rs 84 crore, asserting that no effort would be spared in the development of Narnaul. He also announced that unapproved colonies in the region would be regularised as per norms.

NIA WIDENS NET: 200 PEOPLE FLAGGED IN FARIDABAD WHITE-COLLAR TERROR MODULE PROBE

Diary Times Desk: A review of call records and online transactions linked to the three key accused in the Faridabad-based white-collar terror module has placed nearly 200 people under the scanner, rattling investigating agencies. The list includes imams of madrasas, local shopkeepers, diagnostics centre owners and current and former students and colleagues from AI-Falah University.

The three accused — deceased bomber Dr Umar and arrested doctors Muzammil and Shaheen — had reportedly made online payments to locals as part of efforts to strengthen their network and build support.

SUPREME COURT RULES OUT YEAR-ROUND RESTRICTIONS ON POLLUTING ACTIVITIES, FAVOURS LONG-TERM SOLUTION

Diary Times Desk: The Supreme Court on Monday ruled out extreme measures such as year-round restrictions on activities prohibited under the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) — a set of emergency measures to control pollution — to improve the Air Quality Index (AQI), saying it would affect people's livelihood

"A large chunk of the population depends on various activities for their livelihood in the capital... We agree with the amicus and the ASG that a long-term solution is needed to tackle the menace of pollution in a graded manner. For that a combined action by the MoEFCC (Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change) along with Punjab, Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan and Haryana officials, is needed," a Bench led by CJI BR Gavai CJI said. The court's comments came after senior advocate Gopal Sankarnarayanan, representing one of the parties, said Delhi has become a gas chamber and that all activities prohibited from GRAP I onwards should be prohibited for the entire year.



5-YEAR-OLD BOY DIES AFTER FALLING FROM 22ND FLOOR BALCONY IN GURUGRAM

Diary Times Desk: A five-year-old boydied after falling from the 22nd floor balcony of a high-rise society in Sector 62 here on Saturday, police said.

France is rightly celebrated for its cheeses, from Comté to Camembert, but it was an aged Swiss Gruvère that was anointed the finest on the planet at the World Cheese Awards Switzerland on Thursday.

"Three cheeses on, we could still taste it," was the conclusion of English judge Perry Wakeman, describing its "fruit-funk notes, some slight burn on there like charcoal."

More than 5,200 cheeses from 46 countries were gathered for the judging at Bern's Festhalle venue, the pageant queens growing ever more pungent as the day wore on. CNN was there for all the sights and smells.

Moving from cheese to bread, the iconic French baguette has been hailed by President Emmanuel Macron as "250 grams of magic and perfection," but all is not well in this world of flour and yeast. Even though UNESCO has deemed the baguette an essential cultural icon, France's bread consumption is plummeting, with the daily trip to the boulangerie a disappearing way of life. Here's how the humble bread baton is facing its

France isn't the only European country whose loaves have received UNESCO heritage status. German bread culture made the Intangible Cultural Heritage list in 2015 and the country has more than 3.200 officially recognized types of bread. A nutty little number named Nussbrot was named Germany's bread of the year for 2025.

Debra and Eric Stillwell, both in their 60s, relocated from Burbank, California, to France's Dordogne Valley five years ago. The medieval towns, castles and landscapes were what lured them. Eric tells CNN

THIS HIDDEN CANYON IN THE MEDITERRANEAN TEEMS WITH WHALES AND DOLPHINS

ne thousand meters (3.281 Mediterranean Sea, a crab tangled in plastic is fighting to crawl across the rocky sea bottom. At 240 meters (787 feet) down, an entire population of bamboo coral is being choked by fishing gear.

These are some of the siahts Italian marine biologist Ginevra Boldrocchi witnessed during deep-sea exploration the to subaquatic world known as Caprera Canyon.

Found in the rough, blue waters spanning some 20 to 40 kilometers (12 to 25 miles) off the coast of Sardinia, Italy, Caprera Canyon valley that underwater supports a variety of marine life and helps keep our oceans in balance.

Ιt is of one the Mediterranean Sea's last great frontiers, and one of largest biodiverse underwater

ecosystems — but it's under threat from commercial fishing, high maritime traffic and pollution.In June, CNN joined One Ocean Foundation, an international nonprofit, on its first mission to deploy a remotely operated vehicle (ROV) more than 1,000 meters (3.281 feet) below the surface to explore the dense sea forest at the bottom of Caprera Canyon, as part of the Rolex Perpetual Planet Initiative.

As scientific project coordinator for Ocean Foundation One the University researcher Insubria, Boldrocchi led this mission to observe an environment no human had seen before - a crucial step in advancing the foundation's study of the canyon's ecological importance.

Caprera Canvon is classified as a submarine canyon, which cycles nutrients, stores carbon provides a habitat for countless marine species, from corals and turtles to sharks and dolphins.

"At the moment, the canyon has no kind of protection at all, so we are going to lose refuge for so many endangered species and we will lose a lot of biodiversity," Boldrocchi told CNN.

After conducting research at the surface level for years, One Ocean Foundation realized it was time to look deeper, to uncover what lies hidden on the seafloor of the canvon. ROV mission

Since humans cannot physically dive to the deepest parts of the canyon, Boldrocchi enlisted the sailor-turned-engineer help Guido Gay, who built a specialized underwater ROV capable exploring its extreme depths.

"The role of the technology in conservation is very important, because we need to see, to to understand environment in all details in order to protect it," said Gav.

Piloted by the Gay, batterypowered ROV surveyed a range of depths from around 130 to 1,050 meters (427 to 3.445 feet) exploring rocky habitats, taking samples, and observing deep-sea organisms.

dark geometric sprawl breaks up an expanse of ocher-hued sand in Saudi Arabia. Close up, the structure is made up of row after row of solar panels, glimmering in the intense sun as it beats down on this scrubby, arid land about 60 miles south of the city of

Al Shuaibah 2 is Saudi Arabia's largest solar farm, with a capacity of more than 2 gigawatts, enough to power around 350,000 homes. But it won't keep its crown for long. Even larger installations are already in development as mega solar farms proliferate across the country's desert lands.

"There is a solar boom, no one can deny that," said Nishant Kumar, renewable and power analyst at the research firm Rystad Energy. Saudi Arabia has pledged to generate 50% of its electricity from renewable sources by 2030 and the race is on to meet it.

At first glance, it may seem an unlikely reinvention; this is oil country after all. Saudi Arabia the world's secondboasts largest oil reserves, is the largest oil exporter and has consistently pushed back against global efforts to move away from fossil fuels. But what's happening here shows even the planet's ultimate petrostate is making a bet on

clean energy - just as the Trump administration seeks to strangle it.

The pace of Saudi Arabia's solar

boom has been breathtaking. "No country is going faster," said Dave Jones, co-founder of the climate think tank Ember. In 2020, the country had next to no renewables. By the end of this vear, it's predicted to have 12 gigawatts of solar, Kumar told CNN. Saudi Arabia has added so much in 2025 that it's broken into the top 10 global markets for annual new solar for the first time. according to BloombergNEF

The boom shows no signs of slowing. ACWA Power, the country's utilities giant, which iointly owns the Al Shuaibah complex, announced in July along with companies including state-owned oil and gas firm Saudi Aramco - an investment of \$8.3 billion into 15 gigawatts of renewables, dominated by solar,

data.

By 2030 solar will be growing "at a very fast pace," Kumar said Rystad projects more than 70 gigawatts will be installed by the end of the decade. "On top of that, they're installing onshore wind as well," he added.

There are plans to power huge infrastructure developments with clean energy, including the \$500 billion futuristic city of NEOM and a luxury Red Sea tourism project

It's a striking move for a country built on oil. "Black gold" funded Saudi Arabia's transition from nomadic desert country to a significant global power in just decades.

But experts say its solar surge makes sense for several reasons, one of the biggest being economics. Simply put: it's cheap

"Solar is so cost competitive, it makes financial sense," said Karen Young, a senior research scholar at the Center on Global Energy Policy at Columbia University. This is especially true given the accelerating electricity demand in the kingdom, driven by cooling needs and water desalination.

Costs of solar have plummeted thanks to a flood of cheap Chinese-made solar panels into the market. The last two years have seen "just unprecedentedly low prices," Ember's Jones said. Battery costs have fallen, too, with average prices dropping by 40% in 2024 alone, according to Ember. Batteries make solar, which is otherwise only available when the sun shines, more flexible and even more attractive

And solar suits Saudi Arabia: The sun reliably shines throughout most of the year, it has cheap and plentiful land, and grid connection is inexpensive, as there is space for huge solar farms near big cities, Jones said.

The country also benefits from economies of scale. "All of their installations are vast" allowing them to negotiate down equipment and construction costs, said Abdullah Alkattan, Middle East and North Africa energy transition analyst at BloombergNEF.

PAUL SIGNAC: A LEADING LIGHT OF NEO-IMPRESSIONISM

Diary Times Desk: Early in 1890, Paul Signac came close to having a duel with the Symbolist painter Henry de Groux. The latter had made disparaging remarks about Vincent van Gogh, calling his work 'abominable' and refusing to show in a group exhibition with him. Signac was a friend of the Dutchman's, and ready to draw a sword on his behalf — only for those with cooler heads to intervene and ultimately keep the peace.

This anecdote reveals a number of things about Signac: not only that he was loyal to his friends, and had a shortish temper, but that he was part of a network of painters who transformed Western art in the late 19th and early 20th century.

Alongside Georges Seurat, he was the pioneer of a movement known as Neo-Impressionism (more on which below). His friend and fellow Neo-Impressionist Henri-Edmond Cross saw in Signac's pictures 'a play of hues as ravishing as happy combinations of gems'.

Early works indebted to the Impressionists

Signac was born in Paris in 1863. His family ran a successful chain of saddler's shops and included Emperor Napoleon III among their clients. Young Paul's brief studies in architecture were abandoned after he saw a solo exhibition by Claude Monet. His heart was now set upon becoming a painter.

He was largely self-taught, with a fondness for working en plein air on the banks of the River Seine. His early art was indebted to the Impressionists, and Signac was ejected from the fourth Impressionist exhibition for sketching from a work by Degas. (It was Paul Gauguin, one of the exhibiting artists, who did the ejecting — with some physical force — making clear that 'one does not copy here, monsieur'.)

In 1884, Signac helped form the Société des Artistes Indépendants, an association that launched an annual exhibition named the Salon des Indépendants. This was intended for artists dissatisfied with the conservative submission policy of the official Salon (which was government-sponsored).

Seurat was also part of the association, and in the years ahead he and Signac set about exploring fresh ways of painting. They came to conclude that a rational order should be imposed on the Impressionists' interpretations of colour and light.



STEFAN EDLIS AND GAEL NEESON BUILT AN UNFORGETTABLE COLLECTION DEFINED BY HUMANITY AND HUMOUR

Diary Times Desk: 'In the art world there are a lot of followers — a few leaders and a lot of followers,' the late collector Stefan Edlis quipped in the 2018 art world documentary The Price of Everything. Before passing in 2019 at age 94, Edlis, along with his wife, Gael Neeson, built one of America's most important collections of post-war and contemporary art. Embracing works that were both joyful and defiant, the discerning couple established themselves as steadfast cultural leaders championing work that uprooted conventions and broadened the definition of what art could be. This November, Christie's is honoured to present more than 40 groundbreaking works of art and design from the couple's collection during the November marquee week in New York, first on 19 November in the 21st Century Evening Sale and followed by the Post-War & Contemporary Art Day Sale on 20 November. Additional offerings from the collection will appear in December and through 2026.

Iconic, playful and strikingly forthright examples by America's leading contemporary artists lead the selection. 'Humour and meaning were the touchstones of their collection. They wanted to live with works that helped them understand the underbelly of society but were also joyful, whether Ed Ruscha's How Do You Do? (2003), an iconoclastic Urs Fischer sculpture or a Diego Giacometti console,' says Sara Friedlander, Christie's Deputy Chairman of Post-War and Contemporary Art.

In addition to artworks by Ruscha and Fischer are pieces by George Condo, John Currin, Marlene Dumas, Jeff Koons, Claes Oldenburg and Cindy Sherman. Also featured are works of avant-garde and Art Deco design by Giacometti, Emile-Jacques Ruhlmann and Jean Dunand, amongst others.

Resilience reflected through collecting

Born in Vienna in 1925 and raised Jewish, Edlis fled Nazi-occupied Austria for the United States in 1941 with his mother and two siblings. He then served in the US Navy during World War II, after which he made moulds for a toolmaker.

By 1954 Edlis was running the company, and 11 years later he set up on his own, establishing what became the Apollo Plastics Corporation. During a ski trip to Wisconsin in 1974, Edlis met Neeson, a medical technician living in Europe. The couple soon returned to America and, under the guidance of notable Chicago collector Gerald Elliot, set about on a lifelong journey devoted to the arts. An early recommendation by Elliot, Larry Rivers's Four Mollys (1957), will be offered at Christie's in 2026.
