PULWAMA ATTACK MASTERMIND HAMZA BURHAN SHOT DEAD BY UNIDENTIFIED GUNMEN IN POK

Diary Times Desk : One of the alleged masterminds of the 2019 Pulwama terror attack, Hamza Burhan, has reportedly been killed by unidentified gunmen in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK), according to media reports emerging on Thursday. Hamza Burhan, also known as Arjumand Gulzar Dar, was said to be an Al-Badr terrorist commander originally from Pulwama in Jammu and Kashmir. Reports claimed he was shot dead in Muzaffarabad by unknown assailants under mysterious circumstances. The 2019 Pulwama terror attack had left 40 CRPF personnel dead after a suicide bomber rammed an explosive.

BENGAL'S MANDATORY 'VANDE MATARAM' ORDER FOR MADRASAS SPARKS POLITICAL ROW



Diary Times Desk : The West Bengal Government's decision to make the singing of 'Vande Mataram' mandatory in all madrasas triggered both administrative action and fierce political backlash on Thursday, sharpening the debate over nationalism and identity in the state's educational landscape within a fortnight of the new BJP dispensation assuming power.

The state administration pitched the move as an effort to ensure uniformity in assembly practices in education institutions, while opposition parties have accused the ruling dispensation of pushing an "arbitrary" agenda that risks unsettling the state's pluralistic fabric.

The Svendhu Adhikari-led government has made the singing of 'Vande Mataram' during assembly prayers compulsory in all madrasahs with immediate effect, according to an official notification issued by Directorate of Madrasa Education.

The directive will apply, the notification stated, to government model madrasahs, government-aided madrasahs, approved Shishu Shiksha Kendras and Madhyamik Shiksha Kendras, as well as recognised unaided madrasahs functioning under the Minority Affairs and Madrasah Education Department.

"Singing of 'Vande Mataram' during assembly prayers, prior to the commencement of classes, is hereby made mandatory," it said. A senior official of the department said the decision was aimed at bringing "uniformity in assembly practices" across institutions functioning under the department.

NEET UG PAPER LEAK: NTA APPRISES PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE ON STEPS TAKEN

Diary Times Desk : Following the allegations of NEET-UG paper leak, the National Testing Agency (NTA), which was summoned by the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Education, Women, Children, Youth and Sports about the reforms they have brought in since the constitution of High-Level Committee (HLC) chaired by former ISRO chief K Radhakrishnan, said the leak was not from their system and CBI report is awaited which will reveal the gaps.

The committee, headed by Congress leader Digvijaya Singh, reviewed the implementation of a high-level committee report on reforms to the NTA and the status of investigation into the NEET-UG paper leak this year. Questions were also asked about the vacancies in the NTA. NTA DG Abhishek Singh and Higher Education Secretary Vineet Joshi appeared before the committee. While the opposition MPs in the committee demanded that the probe report be presented before the panel, the members from the BJP objected to this, saying the CBI is an independent body and it should be allowed to do its work. In its presentation, NTA also said they would transition to computer based testing from pen and paper mode for the NEET UG examination. It would also impose number of attempts and age limits after consulting the health ministry.



US TRADE DELEGATION MAY VISIT INDIA NEXT MONTH FOR BILATERAL TRADE TALKS: COMMERCE MINISTER



Diary Times Desk : Union Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal on Thursday said the US team is expected to travel to India for trade negotiations with their counterparts in New Delhi next month.

Addressing the Annual Leadership Summit of the American Chamber of Commerce in New Delhi, Goyal said the US trade delegation is likely to visit India next month for bilateral trade agreement (BTA) discussions. However, the US chief negotiator is not accompanying the team.

"I think he is not coming with them, but there is some plan for them to come next month," the minister said. In April, the Indian side traveled to Washington, DC, for a series of in-person meetings with their US counterparts in order to finalise the details of the interim agreement and advance the negotiations under the larger BTA. The US Secretary of State Marco Rubio will travel to India for four days beginning from May 23, to expand economic, defense and energy relations. This will be his first visit to India.

BANGLADESHI INFILTRATORS, DETAINED IN BENGAL, TO BE HANDED OVER TO BSF UNDER NEW RULE: CM ADHIKARI



Diary Times Desk : West Bengal Chief Minister Svendhu Adhikari on Thursday said Bangladeshi infiltrators detained in the state would be handed over to the BSF, instead of being produced before courts, in line with a new rule that came into effect a day ago.

Speaking to reporters after an administrative review meeting at the Howrah district magistrate's office, Adhikari said instructions had already been issued to the police commissioner and the Railway Protection Force (RPF) in this regard.

"Since yesterday, the new rule has come into effect under which infiltrators will not be sent to courts but handed over to the BSF at the Bangladesh border," he said.

Adhikari on Wednesday announced the implementation of a mechanism under which infiltrators detained by state police would be handed over directly to the BSF for deportation, unveiling what he described as part of a broader "detect, delete and deport" framework.

The chief minister did not name the Act, under whose purview the newly elected BJP government in Bengal made the policy shift for prosecution of infiltrators.

BENGAL: FALTA RE POLL SEES OVER 74 PC POLLING TILL 3 PM; VOTING PEACEFUL



Diary Times Desk : The repolling in West Bengal's Falta Assembly constituency on Thursday saw more than 74 per cent of the 2.36 lakh electors exercising their franchise till 3 pm, with no untoward incident reported from anywhere, a poll panel official said.

The total electorate in the constituency comprises 1,21,300 men, 1,15,135 women and nine third-gender individuals. Voting started at 7 am and will continue till 6 pm.

The Election Commission doubled the security arrangements for the repoll after the April 29 polling in the seat was countermanded over allegations of large-scale EVM tampering.

Around 35 companies of the central forces are manning the 285 polling booths to ensure smooth voting. Additionally, 50 Quick Response Teams are on standby to respond swiftly to any disturbance.

"Polling has remained peaceful in Falta. We have not received a single report of any problem from anywhere in the constituency. Till 3 pm, 74.10 per cent of polling has been registered," the poll panel official told PTI.

DELHI RIOTS 2020: HIGH COURT GRANTS BAIL TO SALIM MALIK IN UAPA CASE



Diary Times Desk : The Delhi High Court on Thursday granted bail to Salim Malik in a case under anti-terror law UAPA concerning the "larger conspiracy" behind the February 2020 riots in the city's northeastern parts.

The relief was granted by a Bench of Justices Prathiba M Singh and Madhu Jain on Malik's appeal challenging a trial court order of January 29 that denied him bail in the case.

His counsel argued that he was entitled to bail in view of the Supreme Court granting the relief to identically-placed co-accused Saleem Khan and Shadab Ahmed. Malik was booked under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA) for being one of the "masterminds" of the February 2020 riots that had left 53 people dead and more than 700 injured. The violence erupted during protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act (CAA), 2019, and the National Register of Citizens (NRC).

INDIA ISSUES EBOLA ADVISORY FOR PASSENGERS ARRIVING FROM HIGH-RISK AFRICAN NATIONS



Diary Times Desk : India has issued a health advisory for passengers arriving from or transiting through Ebola-affected countries, asking those with symptoms or exposure history to immediately report to airport health authorities before immigration clearance. The advisory, issued by the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), specifically mentions travellers coming from the Democratic Republic of Congo, Uganda and South Sudan, all of which have been categorised as "high-risk countries" by the World Health Organisation (WHO). The advisory has been displayed at the Delhi airport by the Airport Health Organisation (APHO). It advises passengers to watch out for symptoms such as fever, weakness, headache, muscle pain, vomiting, diarrhoea, sore throat and unexplained bleeding. It also asks travellers who had direct contact with blood or body fluids of a suspected or confirmed Ebola patient to immediately report to the airport health officer or the health desk.

COPS DRAG GOA MLA OUT OF GOVT OFFICE AFTER OVERNIGHT STIR; MINISTER CALLS PROTESTERS 'BLACKMAILERS'

Diary Times Desk : Police allegedly dragged RGP MLA Viresh Borkar out of the Town and Country Planning office here along with several others on Saturday morning after they protested there overnight against the conversion of a tribal area into a 'settlement zone', where construction activity is allowed. The Revolutionary Goans Party (RGP) legislator accused the police of manhandling him and submitted an application of breach of privilege against the concerned officials. After the police action, the legislator and other protesters continued their protest against the government from a different site, while Town and Country Planning (TCP) Minister Vishwajit Rane refused to revoke the government order, calling the protesters as "blackmailers". The protesters claimed that 84,000 square metres of the land in Palem-Siridao village in St Andre Assembly constituency in North Goa was converted into a settlement zone.

86 NATIONS, TWO GLOBAL BODIES SIGN AI IMPACT SUMMIT DECLARATION: ASHWINI VAISHNAW

RAHUL APPEARS BEFORE COURT IN RSS DEFAMATION CASE; SAPKAL REPLACES SHIVRAJ PATIL AS HIS SURETY

Diary Times Desk : Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Saturday appeared before a court at Bhiwandi in the district in a defamation case filed by an RSS activist, and presented his party's Maharashtra unit chief Harshwardhan Sapkal as his new 'surety' or guarantor for bail. As he travelled to Bhiwandi by road after landing in Mumbai, BJP workers showed him black flags at Mulund toll plaza and shouted slogans, accusing the Congress of maligning India's image through the Youth Congress's protest at the AI summit in Delhi. Gandhi, accompanied by Sapkal, party MP Varsha Gaikwad and his lawyers Narayan Iyer and Kushal Mor, reached the magistrate's court around 10:30 am. The court had asked the Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha to appear in person and provide a new surety following the death of previous guarantor, former Union Minister Shivraj Patil Chakurkar, in December last year. Chakurkar had stood surety when the court granted bail to the Congress leader in 2016 upon his appearance. Sapkal on Saturday filed an application before the magistrate requesting permission to stand as surety for the accused. After the verification of his affidavits and other documents, the court granted the plea.

RIGHT TO CLEAN ENVIRONMENT: SC ISSUES PAN-INDIA DIRECTIONS FOR COMPLIANCE WITH SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT RULES

Diary Times Desk : As massive dump sites active in metropolitan areas adversely impacted the right to a clean and healthy environment of citizens, the Supreme Court has issued pan-India directions for implementation of the Solid Waste Management (SWM) Rules, 2026, which will come into effect from April 1. Taking note of uneven compliance with the SWM Rules, a Bench led by Justice Pankaj Mithal said that the present generation cannot afford to wait for further legislative refinement while existing implementation gaps persist. "The neglect of municipal solid waste will affect health as much as the economy," said the Bench - which also included Justice SVN Bhatti. "It is now or never. Expecting high results without fundamental spadework of source segregation and infrastructure would be unreasonable. Every stakeholder is duty-bound to ensure the realisation of a waste-free India," it said. "A challenge of this magnitude requires a synchronized effort between the appointed officers of the local bodies and elected representatives, including the respective mayors."

ALL LANGUAGES MUST BE PROTECTED FROM ANY ATTACK: MAMATA ON INTERNATIONAL MOTHER LANGUAGE DAY

Diary Times Desk : Language is not merely a tool for communication; it is central to identity, learning, emotional wellbeing and meaningful participation in society. On the International Mother Language Day, many popular names underlined the importance of preserving and protecting one's languages from any form of attack. BANGLADESH RESTORES FULL VISA SERVICES FOR INDIANS, SIGNALLING DIPLOMATIC THAW UNDER RAHMAN

Diary Times Desk : In a significant sign of improving relations, Bangladesh has restored full visa and consular services for Indian citizens across its missions in India nearly two months after suspending them amid political unrest and diplomatic tension, official sources confirmed here on Saturday. Officials said the Bangladesh High Commission in New Delhi and its assistant missions have begun issuing all categories of visas – including tourist and medical – ending a freeze imposed in December following protests and security concerns around diplomatic premises. The move comes days after the swearing-in of Bangladesh's new Prime Minister Tarique Rahman, widely seen as signalling a reset in ties between New Delhi and Dhaka. Diplomatic sources said both sides have begun quiet engagement to restore normal people-to-people travel, business visits and medical movement – sectors that had been severely affected by the suspension. The services had been halted on December 22 last year after violence, threats to diplomatic facilities and attacks on missions during political turmoil in Bangladesh. With the political transition in Dhaka now complete, officials expect a thaw in ties. Prime Minister Narendra Modi had earlier.

RAILWAY MINISTER VAISHNAW REVIEWS SECURITY AFTER PROBE INTO RECENT TRAIN FIRES HINTS FOUL PLAY



Diary Times Desk : Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw held a high-level security review meeting in New Delhi on Thursday after an initial probe into several recent train fire incidents suggested the involvement of anti-social elements. "It was noted during the meeting that in the last few days, the involvement of anti-social elements has emerged during the initial probe into multiple incidents, including some recent fire incidents," a press note from the Railway Ministry said. It added that Vaishnav carried out extensive consultations with field officers from across the country in the presence of senior officials in the national capital. The RPF is actively probing the fires, officials said, adding that in several cases, prompt and proactive action by the railways helped avert major eventualities.

TN POLLS: DMK FORMS SEAT-SHARING PANEL UNDER T R BAALU FOR TALKS WITH ALLIES

Stalin-led Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) has formed a seven-member seat-sharing committee under party's senior leader T R Baalu to hold parleys with its allies, days after it sealed a poll pact with the DMDK. The swift move to rope in the DMDK rendered a blow to its rival AIADMK, which has been attempting to woo the Vijayakanth-founded party to the NDA to collectively take on the DMK in the upcoming Assembly election. DMK said the party was likely to commence seat-sharing negotiations with its allies from February 22. In addition to accommodating the DMDK, the party is likely to allocate more seats to the Congress for this poll. Ruling out any scope for a coalition government in Tamil Nadu, MDMK chief Vaiko, an ally of the DMK, said, the Dravidian major would return to power with an absolute majority of its own. "I am fully confident that DMK president and Chief Minister M K Stalin will form the government again by winning.

CENTRAL FORCES TO BE DEPLOYED IN POLL-BOUND WEST BENGAL FROM MARCH 1

Diary Times Desk : As many as 480 companies of Central Armed Police Forces will be initially deployed in poll-bound West Bengal for area domination, confidence-building measures and other election-related duties from March 1, an EC official said on Saturday. They will also guard EVMS at strong rooms and counting centres during the election process. The Assembly elections in the state are due in a few months.

The official said that the first batch of around 240 companies will be inducted by March 1, while an equal number of companies will join them by March 10. The contingents will include personnel from the Central Reserve Police Force, Border Security Force, Central Industrial Security Force, Indo-Tibetan Border Police and the Sashastra Seema Bal. The final electoral roll after the ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) is scheduled to be published on February 28, while the election schedule is expected to be announced in March.

SINGAPORE REPORTS NEARLY 60 PER CENT SURGE IN WEEKLY NEW COVID CASES



Diary Times Desk : Around 12,700 new Covid cases were recorded in Singapore between May 10 and 16, compared to 8,000 in the previous week – a surge of 58.8 per cent, according to data shared on Thursday by Communicable Diseases Agency (CDA). The average number of daily Covid hospitalisations increased from 56 to 73 during the same period, with one case referred to Intensive Care Unit (ICU) every day on an average, said CDA.

However, there were no deaths reported in this period, according to the CDA press release. "As with other endemic respiratory diseases, periodic Covid waves are expected throughout the year," the agency said. "There is no indication that the variants circulating locally are more transmissible or cause more severe disease compared with previously circulating variants."

The NB.1.8.1 variant – which is a descendant of the JN.1 variant – is the main Covid variant circulating in Singapore, accounting for more than half of locally sequenced cases, said the agency, adding that the recent surge in infections could be due to several factors, including waning collective immunity. The vaccine is still effective against the current variant, said CDA.

Those at increased risk of severe infection include people aged 60 and above and children. They should all be vaccinated, the agency said. It advised the public to take precautions and practise personal and social responsibility by maintaining good personal.

"BASELESS ALLEGATIONS, APPALLING LIE": IRAN REFUTES US CLAIMS OVER MINAB SCHOOL STRIKES

Diary Times Desk : Iran's Foreign Ministry on Thursday rejected US Central Command's assertion that the school hit in February missile strikes in Minab was part of a missile launch facility, calling the claim a "baseless fabrication" aimed at concealing what it described as the killing of more than 170 school children and teachers. In a post on X, the Iranian Foreign Ministry Spokesman Esmail Baghaei slammed the US claims as baseless fabrication and called it an "appalling lie". "This shameless distortion is a clear attempt to obscure the severe reality of the 28 February missile attacks, which resulted in the tragic slaughtering of over 170 school children and their teachers", he said. He added, "Targeting an active educational institution during school hours constitutes a grave violation of international humanitarian law and is a clear war crime. The civilian nature of the site cannot be obscured by technical misrepresentations."

TRUMP, NETANYAHU HAD TENSE PHONE CALL ON FUTURE OF IRAN WAR: REPORTS



Diary Times Desk : US President Donald Trump and Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu had a tense phone call over the future course of the war on Iran as Washington appeared to be in favour of a deal instead of the resumption of strikes, US media reported. After the Tuesday phone call with Trump, Netanyahu's "hair was on fire", US media outlet Axios reported on Wednesday, adding that the Israeli Prime Minister was keen on the resumption of strikes to further degrade Iran's military capabilities and weaken the regime by destroying its critical infrastructure. Trump on Sunday said he had put off strikes on Iran, planned for Tuesday, following a request from Arab nations including Qatar and the UAE. A revised peace memo was drafted by Qatar and Pakistan with input from the other regional mediators to try to bridge the gaps between the US and Iran, Axios reported, quoting sources.

'BETTER THAN DAVOS': ABBOTT PRAISES RAISINA DIALOGUE'S RISING GLOBAL PROFILE

Diary Times Desk : Former Australian Prime Minister Tony Abbott has praised India's flagship strategic forum, the Raisina Dialogue, describing it as "better than Davos" and highlighting its growing stature in global geopolitical discussions. In a post on X, Abbott said the New Delhi conference has emerged as a major international platform and favourably compared it with the annual gathering of global leaders and business elites at World Economic Forum Annual Meeting in Switzerland. He suggested that the Raisina Dialogue offers a more substantive and less pretentious space for discussions on global challenges. Held annually in New Delhi since 2016, the Raisina Dialogue is jointly organised by India's Ministry of External Affairs and the Observer Research Foundation. Over the years, it has grown into India's premier forum on geopolitics and geo-economics, drawing participation from ministers, former heads of state, diplomats, military leaders, industry executives and scholars from across the world. Abbott also drew comparisons with the Boao Forum for Asia, the China-backed conference often seen as Beijing's platform.

FLOYD MAYWEATHER TO END 9-YEAR RETIREMENT, RETURN TO PRO BOXING THIS SUMMER

Diary Times Desk : Floyd Mayweather says he is ending his nine-year retirement and returning to competitive boxing this summer. Mayweather, who turns 49 on Tuesday, hasn't fought in a real boxing match since 2017, when he beat Conor McGregor. Following that big-money bout against a mixed martial artist, Mayweather (50-0, 27 KOs) declared himself retired for the third time in his career. The former five-division world champion has still been in the ring regularly throughout his 40s with a series of lucrative exhibition bouts against the likes of online influencer Logan Paul, YouTuber Mikuri Asakura and John Gotti III, the grandson of the infamous mafia boss. Mayweather already has announced yet another exhibition coming up this spring against 59-year-old Mike Tyson, although no location or television partner has been confirmed. But Mayweather says he is also returning to real ring competition this year under a promotional deal with CSI Sports/Fight Sports.

Prime Minister Modi hosted a lunch in honour of the visiting dignitary. The state visit gave the leaders an opportunity to review the entire gamut of our partnership, including trade and investments, oil and gas, renewable energy, mining and critical minerals, defense and security, agriculture and livestock.

EARTHQUAKE OF MAGNITUDE 3.8 STRIKES MYANMAR

Diary Times Desk : An earthquake of magnitude 3.8 struck Myanmar on Saturday, a statement by the National Center for Seismology (NCS) said. The earthquake occurred at a depth of 70km. In a post on X, the NCS said, "EQ of M: 3.8, On: 21/02/2026 17:01:33 IST, Lat: 20.42 N, Long: 94.77 E, Depth: 70 Km, Location: Myanmar." Shallow earthquakes are generally more dangerous than deep earthquakes. This is because the seismic waves from shallow earthquakes have a shorter distance to travel to the surface, resulting in stronger ground shaking and potentially more damage to structures and greater casualties. Myanmar is vulnerable to hazards from moderate and large magnitude earthquakes and tsunamis along its long coastline. Myanmar is wedged between four tectonic plates (the Indian, Eurasian, Sunda, and Burma plates) that interact in active geological processes.

"DELUSIONAL TWEETS NO LONGER HOLD ANY SWAY": IRAN HITS OUT AT TRUMP

Diary Times Desk : Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Esmail Baghaei sharply criticised "whimsical adventurism and roguish behaviour" of the US, saying recent developments had exposed the consequences of "lawless irresponsibility". In a post on X on Friday, Baghaei said that "vermin-like nocturnal scheming" and dismissive descriptions such as "a light slap" could not erase a "profound disgrace born of narcissism, greed, reckless miscalculation, and lawless irresponsibility." "The consequences of this whimsical adventurism and roguish behaviour have now become clear to the entire world," he said.

Baghaei added that "disjointed, delusional tweets no longer hold any sway over reality," while quoting a line that "the deeper they sink into folly, the more inventive they become in justifying it." The remarks appeared to build on an earlier X post published on May 6, in which the Iranian spokesman cited the concept of "wooden-headness" as a source of self-deception in governments.

**"CAPTIVATED," CHINESE ENVOY TO INDIA SAYS ON HIS JAIPUR VISIT**

Diary Times Desk : Chinese Ambassador to India, Xu Feihong, visited the pink city Jaipur and said he was captivated by its beauty. The visit hints at a broader approach to boost tourism between both the nations. In a post on X, he said, "There are always moments when I am captivated by India's radiant culture and beautiful architecture, and Jaipur is undoubtedly one of them." Earlier on February 1, the Consulate General of India in Shanghai, under the leadership of Consul General Pratik Mathur, warmly welcomed the resumption of Air India's direct flight services between Shanghai and New Delhi, marking a major step forward in restoring people-to-people, business and institutional connectivity between India and China. According to an official release, the inaugural Shanghai-New Delhi flight departed today from Shanghai Pudong International Airport, carrying over 230 passengers on board the Boeing 787 aircraft. The relaunch comes after a gap of nearly six years and represents a significant milestone in normalising bilateral air connectivity following the suspension of services in early 2020.

CHINA ACCUSED OF EXPORTING UYGHUR SURVEILLANCE AND INTIMIDATION WORLDWIDE

Diary Times Desk : The World Uyghur Congress (WUC) has released its weekly brief, highlighting a series of international developments that it says reflect both the intensifying repression of Uyghurs and growing global scrutiny of China's policies. On 15 February, WUC leaders joined approximately 70 members of the Swiss Uyghur diaspora for a community gathering in Switzerland. President Turgunjan Alawdun and Vice President Zumretay Arkin addressed the event, describing it as a show of unity amid mounting concerns over what rights groups term transnational repression. Alarm has also spread in Germany following reports that surveillance systems manufactured by Hikvision and Dahua Technology are widely deployed in airports, railway stations and public institutions. The WUC warned that the presence of such technology, linked by activists to monitoring practices in East Turkistan, could expose vulnerabilities and erode public trust. The group has sought clarification from German authorities and initiated legal proceedings in Spain and France against the manufacturers. Meanwhile, the International Labour Organization (ILO) Committee of Experts reviewed China's adherence to conventions prohibiting forced labour. Citing trade union submissions, the committee noted allegations that millions of Uyghurs and Tibetans were transferred under labour programmes in 2024.

US BREACH OF CEASEFIRE COULD HAVE "CATASTROPHIC CONSEQUENCES": IRAN AT UN

Diary Times Desk : Iran's Permanent Representative to the United Nations, Amir-Saeid Irvani, has accused the United States of violating the ceasefire through military actions near the Strait of Hormuz, according to Iran's state broadcaster IRIB.

In a letter addressed to UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres and the President of the UN Security Council, Irvani said alleged US military action against two Iranian oil tankers near Jask Port and the Strait of Hormuz, along with attacks on Iranian coastal areas, constituted "a clear violation of the ceasefire" and "a gross violation of Article 2, Paragraph 4 of the UN Charter".

He warned that continued US military activity in the Persian Gulf and the Strait of Hormuz could have "catastrophic consequences" extending beyond the region and threatening international peace and security.



BANCO DO BRASIL AIMS TO BOOST BRAZIL-INDIA TRADE TO USD 100 BILLION: TARCIANA MEDEIROS

Diary Times Desk : Banco do Brasil President Tarciana Medeiros on Saturday said the bank is prepared to serve as a strategic bridge to expand Brazil-India bilateral trade to USD 100 billion, underscoring the need to deepen what she termed a structuring partnership between the two economies, according to Brasil 247. Addressing the Brazil-India Business Forum in the national capital, Medeiros began by highlighting the symbolic significance of New Delhi. She described the city as representing both the heritage of one of the world's oldest civilisations and the dynamism of a fast-growing economy projecting strongly into the future. As reported by Brasil 247, she acknowledged the presence of Jorge Viana, President of ApexBrasil, and extended greetings to women leaders attending the forum, including Otilide, Simone Lipante, Ana Teresa and Minister Luciana Santos. She also lauded India's ongoing efforts toward inclusion.

PAKISTAN'S ECONOMIC MISMANAGEMENT PUSHES POVERTY, INEQUALITY TO RECORD HIGHS

Diary Times Desk : Pakistan's poverty rate has soared to 29%, the highest in 11 years, while income inequality has climbed to its worst level in nearly three decades, exposing deep cracks in the country's economic management. According to a government survey, nearly 70 million Pakistanis now live below the monthly poverty threshold of Rs 8,484, as reported by The Express Tribune. According to The Express Tribune, the preliminary findings for fiscal year 2024-25 show poverty has jumped 32% compared to 2018-19, when the last survey was conducted. The poverty ratio stood at 21.9% in 2019 but has now surged to 28.9%, marking the highest level since 2014. At the same time, income inequality has reached 32.7, the steepest since 1998. Rural communities have borne the brunt of the crisis. Poverty in villages rose sharply from 28.2% to 36.2%, while urban poverty climbed from 11% to 17.4%. Provincial data paints.

REFORM UK MAKES MAJOR GAINS IN ENGLAND LOCAL POLLS, DEALING BLOW TO LABOUR, CONSERVATIVES



Diary Times Desk : Far-right-populist MP Nigel Farage-led Reform UK registered major gains in England's local elections, significantly denting support for both the ruling Labour Party and the opposition Conservatives, CNN reported.

According to CNN, results declared on Friday (local time) showed Reform UK gaining more than 600 council seats, while UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer's Labour Party lost over 450 seats.

The Conservative Party also suffered major setbacks, losing nearly 300 seats. "Labour are being wiped out by Reform in many of their most traditional areas, and what you're going to see later on today is the Conservative Party being wiped out in their heartlands," Farage told reporters on Friday, as quoted by CNN. Farage asserted that Reform UK was no longer merely a protest movement but had become a "truly national party" that was "here to stay". The results are being seen as a significant development in British politics, reflecting growing fragmentation of the traditional Labour-Conservative two-party system.

FAULTY HIV FIGURES RAISE ALARM IN NA PANEL AS PAKISTAN RISKS GLOBAL EMBARRASSMENT

Diary Times Desk : Pakistan's Parliamentary body has raised red flags over what it termed as "unreliable and incomplete statistics" being reported on HIV/AIDS in the nation, cautioning that the country could face humiliation at international platforms if inaccurate data is forwarded to global health agencies, as reported by The Express Tribune. According to The Express Tribune, the concerns were voiced during a meeting of the National Assembly's Standing Committee on National Health Services, chaired by Mahesh Kumar Malani. Lawmakers scrutinised figures presented by the health ministry and questioned their credibility, describing them as inconsistent with provincial data. Briefing the committee, officials said that the National AIDS Programme spends roughly \$300 to \$500 per year on each registered HIV patient. However, PPP MNA Shazia Sobia Somro sharply criticised the ministry's report, arguing that it failed to account for a significant number of cases across the country.

VALE CEO FLAGS ENORMOUS GROWTH POTENTIAL IN INDIA, SEEKS LOCAL PARTNERSHIPS IN STRATEGIC MINERALS SECTOR

Diary Times Desk : Vale CEO Gustavo Pimenta has identified India as one of the most promising global markets for iron ore and strategic minerals, underscoring the company's intent to deepen partnerships in the country. He was speaking at the Brazil-India Business Forum in New Delhi on Saturday. Highlighting mining's central role in modern life, Pimenta said the sector will gain even greater relevance amid the global energy transition and rapid digitalisation. Citing industry estimates, he noted that mineral supply will need to expand five to six times the current installed capacity to meet future demand, presenting a significant challenge and opportunity for mining companies, as cited by Brasil 247. Pimenta said Vale's engagement with India has grown steadily. While sales in the Indian market were modest three to four years ago, the company sold 10 million tonnes of iron ore in India last year. With India currently producing around 180 million tonnes of steel annually -- a figure projected to exceed 300 million tonnes in the next decade -- he described the country as a high-potential destination for infrastructure.

TRUMP ANNOUNCES 3-DAY CEASEFIRE BETWEEN UKRAINE-RUSSIA, CALLS IT "BEGINNING OF END" OF WAR



Diary Times Desk : US President Donald Trump on Friday (local time) announced a three-day ceasefire between Russia and Ukraine, noting that the temporary truce coincides with Russia's Victory Day celebrations commemorating the then-Soviet Union's role in World War II.

In a post on Truth Social, Trump said the ceasefire would take place from May 9 to 11 and would include a suspension of "all kinetic activity" between the two countries. "I am pleased to announce that there will be a THREE DAY CEASEFIRE (May 9th, 10th, and 11th) in the War between Russia and Ukraine. The Celebration in Russia is for Victory Day but, likewise, in Ukraine, because they were also a big part and factor of World War II," the post read. The US President expressed hope that the temporary halt in hostilities could mark "the beginning of the end" of the ongoing war.

The tools may change but the policy remains the same and IEEPA was a part of that", Greer said.

NHRC NOTICE TO MALABAR GOLD OVER COLLABORATION WITH PAKISTANI INFLUENCER

Diary Times Desk : The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has issued a notice to Kerala-based jewellery group Malabar Gold and Diamonds over alleged FEMA violations and collaboration with a Pakistani influencer known for her "anti-India" remarks. In a communication dated February 20, the Commission noted that the complaint alleged potential violations of human rights, and directed multiple authorities to submit an action taken report within two weeks. The notice was issued under Section 12 of the Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993. The NHRC instructed the Joint Secretary, Ministry of Home Affairs, the Secretary, Ministry of Corporate Affairs, and the Director-General of Police, Kerala, to examine different aspects of the complaint, including regulatory compliance and public order concerns. It also observed that the allegations prima facie appear to raise human rights issues warranting examination. The rights body also raised questions relating to corporate due diligence, cross-border financial compliance and regulatory adherence under the Indian law.

STUDYING IMPLICATIONS OF US SUPREME COURT JUDGEMENT, TRUMP ADMINISTRATION DECISIONS: COMMERCE MINISTRY

Diary Times Desk : The government said on Saturday that it is studying the implications of the US Supreme Court judgement on tariffs and the steps announced by the President Trump Administration. "We have noted the US Supreme Court judgement on tariffs yesterday. President Trump has also addressed a press conference in that regard. Some steps have been announced by the US Administration. We are studying all these developments for their implications," the Commerce and Industry Ministry said in a brief statement. In a major blow to US President Donald Trump's signature trade policy, the US Supreme Court on Friday ruled against most of his sweeping tariff measures. Trump later signed an order making 10 per cent global tariff on all countries, effective "almost immediately". A White House official told ANI that India is expected to pay this tariff, and this new tariff will remain in place until another authority.

VEDANTA MOVES NCLAT, CHALLENGES NCLT NOD TO ADANI'S BID FOR ACQUIRING JAIPRAKASH ASSOCIATES

Diary Times Desk : Business conglomerate Vedanta Group has approached the National Company Law Appellate Tribunal (NCLAT), challenging the NCLT's approval to Adani Group's bid for acquiring Jaiprakash Associates Ltd for Rs 14,535 crore. Anil Agarwal-led Vedanta Group was in the race to acquire Jaiprakash Associates Ltd (JAL) through an insolvency process, but the lenders in November last year approved the resolution plan or bid of Adani Enterprises Ltd. On March 17, the National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT), Allahabad bench, approved Adani Enterprises Ltd's Rs 14,535 crore bid to acquire Jaiprakash Associates Ltd (JAL) through the insolvency process. In a regulatory filing, JAL had informed that the NCLT, Allahabad bench, has "orally pronounced an order on March 17, 2026" approving the resolution plan submitted by Adani Enterprises Ltd.



CORPORATE LAWS AMENDMENT BILL TO BE INTRODUCED IN LOK SABHA ON MONDAY

Diary Times Desk : The Central Government will introduce the Corporate Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026, in the Lok Sabha on Monday, which aims to amend the Limited Liability Partnership (LLP) Act, 2008, and the Companies Act. According to the list of business of the Lower House, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman will introduce the Bill. The proposed legislation aims to amend the Companies Act, 2013, and the LLP Act, 2008, to facilitate ease of doing business and address gaps identified by the Company Law Committee in its 2022 report. The Bill is expected to incorporate CSR-related relaxations, based on the recommendations of the high-level committee on non-financial regulatory reforms led by former Cabinet Secretary Rajiv Gauba.

These include proposals to exempt certain classes of companies from mandatory CSR obligations, thereby reducing compliance burden, especially for smaller or less resource-intensive entities.



WEST ASIA CONFLICT, CRUDE OIL PRICES TO STEER STOCK MARKETS IN HOLIDAY-SHORTENED WEEK: ANALYSTS

Diary Times Desk : Developments related to the ongoing conflict in West Asia and its impact on crude oil prices will continue to rule investors' sentiment in a holiday-shortened week ahead, analysts said. Besides, trends in global markets, trading activity of foreign investors and rupee-dollar movement would also drive momentum in equities.

Stock markets would remain closed on Thursday for Shri Ram Navami. "This week is expected to remain data-sensitive amid ongoing global uncertainties. Developments in the West Asia conflict and movements in crude oil prices will continue to act as key external drivers and are likely to dictate the near-term market trend. "On the domestic front, investors will closely monitor HSBC Flash PMI data for manufacturing, services, and composite segments, which will provide an early indication of business activity trends," Ajit Mishra—SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said. Foreign investors have pulled out Rs 88,180 crore (about USD 9.6 billion) from Indian equities so far this month, weighed down by escalating tensions in West Asia, a weakening rupee and concerns over the impact of elevated crude oil prices on India's growth and corporate earnings.

Diary Times Desk : The combined market valuation of five of the top-10 most-valued firms eroded by Rs 1 lakh crore last week, with HDFC Bank taking the biggest hit.

Last week, the BSE benchmark Sensex dipped 30.96 points, or 0.04 per cent, and the NSE Nifty slipped 36.6 points, or 0.15 per cent.

"Markets ended the week on a largely flat note with a negative bias, reflecting underlying caution among participants. The tone remained positive during the first three sessions; however, a sharp decline on Thursday erased the gains, followed by a volatile final session," Ajit Mishra, SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said.

While HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank, Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), Bajaj Finance and Hindustan Unilever were the laggards, Reliance Industries, Bharti Airtel, State Bank of India, Infosys and Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) emerged as the winners.

The combined market valuation of the five firms eroded by Rs 1,02,771.87 crore.



GOVT ASKS GAS DISTRIBUTION FIRMS TO PRIORITISE PNG CONNECTIONS, INCREASES COMMERCIAL LPG ALLOCATION AMID WEST ASIA CONFLICT



Diary Times Desk : The Government of India has asked city gas distribution (CGD) companies to prioritise piped natural gas (PNG) connections for commercial establishments, and has also taken several steps to ensure stable fuel supplies as conflict in West Asia continues to impact energy flows. In an update released on Saturday, the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas said, "City Gas Distribution (CGD) entities have been advised by Govt. of India to prioritise PNG connections for commercial establishments such as restaurants, hotels and canteens across all their Gas, to address concerns regarding the availability of commercial LPG."

The ministry added that the government has also asked ministries and state governments to speed up approvals related to gas infrastructure. It said, "Govt. of India vide letter dated 19.03.2026 have requested all concerned Central Government Ministries to issue necessary directions... for immediate fast tracking and disposal of all pending and new permissions related to CGD infrastructure." The government has also encouraged government offices and establishments to move towards PNG usage where possible. "All Central Government establishments/Colonies/Officers/Canteens may also be advised to switch over to PNG wherever the same is available," the ministry said. To support commercial users, the government has increased the allocation of commercial LPG cylinders. According to the ministry, "Govt. of India vide letter dated 21.03.2026 has allowed another 20% allocation of commercial LPG to States, which would take overall allocation to 50%." "This additional 20% allocation shall be given on priority to sectors like restaurants, dhabas, hotels, industrial canteens, food processing/dairy, subsidised canteens/outlets run by State Govt. or local bodies for food, community kitchens, 5 Kg FTL for migrant labourers," the ministry added.

HIMACHAL MINISTER VIKRAMADITYA CALLS ON SHIVRAJ CHOUHAN FOR PENDING ROAD PROJECTS IN DODRA KWAR

Diary Times Desk : Himachal Pradesh minister Vikramaditya Singh on Saturday called on Union Minister for Rural Development Shivraj Singh Chouhan in New Delhi and took up the issue of pending road projects in extremely remote and high altitude area of Dodra Kwar in Shimla district. Singh, Himachal's public works minister, appraised Chouhan that a portion of the road sanctioned for the Dodra Kwar area under Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY) Phase-I has not yet been completed "due to extremely tough geographical conditions, difficult terrain, harsh weather and a very limited working season". He said the road is highly critical for the rural population there, for disaster management and emergency health services and the supply of essential commodities. Singh requested for special relaxations, additional financial support and technical assistance for the pending road construction.

NEW VACCINE LAUNCHED TO PROTECT AGAINST TETANUS AND DIPHTHERIA AT CRI IN KASAU LI

Diary Times Desk : Union Minister for Health and Family Welfare JP Nadda on Saturday launched the Tetanus and Adult Diphtheria (Td) vaccine at the Central Research Institute (CRI), Kasauli. Extensive scientific evidence indicates that widespread childhood immunisation with DPT vaccines has significantly reduced the incidence of diphtheria and tetanus in many countries. However, antibody levels — particularly for diphtheria — tend to decline over time, necessitating booster doses. In view of this, the World Health Organization (WHO) in 2006 recommended that countries transition from the Tetanus Toxoid (TT) vaccine to the Td vaccine. This recommendation was reaffirmed in the WHO Tetanus Vaccine Position Paper (2017) and through deliberations of the Strategic Advisory Group of Experts (SAGE) in 2002 and 2016. Terming the launch a major step in safeguarding the nation's health, Nadda said the rollout of a domestically manufactured vaccine marks a key achievement in attaining self-sufficiency in vaccine and drug manufacturing in India.

MASSIVE LANDSLIDE OCCURS IN HIMACHAL'S MANDI; 9 HOUSES EVACUATED

Diary Times Desk : Directions were issued to evacuate nine houses in Ropdu village in Himachal Pradesh's Mandi district on Sunday following a massive landslide. A landslide occurred in Kotli subdivision following intermittent rains over the past three days. A cow shed was completely damaged, while large boulders and debris remain precariously perched on the hillside, continuing to pose a grave and immediate threat to the village below. Officials and the former Pradhan (village head) rushed to the scene and directed the evacuation of the nine houses that had been endangered. A video of the landslide went viral on the internet. Hill-cutting work is currently being carried out at the location over the village, residents said. Meanwhile, the local Meteorological station on Sunday issued a yellow warning of thunderstorms with lightning and gusty winds with speeds of 30-40 kmph at isolated places in Chamba, Kangra, Kullu, and Mandi districts on Monday and Thursday. It also predicted a wet spell in the state over the next five days, even as the weather remained dry on Sunday and bright sunshine greeted the people.



HIMACHAL PRADESH POLICE DETAIN 96 DRUG TRAFFICKERS IN 'ANTI-CHITTA' CRACKDOWN

Diary Times Desk : The Himachal Pradesh Police has detained 96 drug traffickers under the Prevention of Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (PIT-NDPS) Act, 1988, as part of the "anti-chitta" drive launched by Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu on November 15, 2025. This includes 65 drug traffickers detained till December 31, 2025, and 31 detained in 2026 so far. Preventive detention orders have been issued against eight notorious drug traffickers, including five from Shimla district and one each from Dehra, Nurpur, and Una. A spokesperson for the Himachal Pradesh Police stated that the police are carrying out well-planned and coordinated operations across the state under the PIT-NDPS Act to break organised drug trafficking networks. The police worked closely across districts, used accurate intelligence, and followed a clear legal plan to dismantle the organised drug supply network. A detailed investigation is underway to check the movable and immovable properties of the detained traffickers. If any property is found to have been bought with money earned from illegal drug activities, it will be seized according to the law. "This step aims not only to punish the offenders but also to break.

PUNJAB, HIMACHAL RESIDENTS HOLD JOINT PROTEST AGAINST TAX HIKE: 'BORDERS MAY EXIST ON MAPS, BUT NOT IN OUR HEARTS'

Diary Times Desk : Residents of Punjab and Himachal Pradesh came together at the Mehatpur entry toll barrier in Himachal Pradesh to protest against the sharp increase in entry tax on vehicles registered outside the state. The protest reflected deep public anger and shared social and economic ties between people living on both sides of the border. The Himachal Pradesh Government recently raised the entry tax for vehicles registered outside the state from Rs 70 to 170, triggering resentment among daily commuters, traders, lawyers, employees, and families who cross the border frequently for work, education, healthcare, and social obligations. Protesters said the hike was sudden, steep, and insensitive to the realities of border populations. The gathering saw slogans against the tax hike and appeals for its immediate rollback. From the Punjab side, the protest was led by common people residing on state borders and BJP leader Rakesh Pammi. From the Himachal side, leadership came from BJP MLA from Una and former state BJP president Satpal Satti. Subhash Sharma, state vice-president of Punjab BJP, said, "Political borders should not become walls between people who have lived like one family for generations.

CANADA SEEKS TO WITHHOLD SENSITIVE NATIONAL SECURITY EVIDENCE IN NIJJAR MURDER TRIAL

Diary Times Desk : After accusing Indian agents of involvement in the murder of Hardeep Singh Nijjar, Canada's justice department is now seeking to withhold certain sensitive national security evidence in the ongoing trial. The case has remained a major irritant in India-Canada relations since then Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau first publicly alleged Indian involvement in September 2023. According to Global News, federal lawyers representing Canada's Attorney General have filed an application in Federal Court requesting permission to suppress specific evidence, arguing that its disclosure would be "injurious to international relations and national security." The application was filed under Section 38 of the Canada Evidence Act. The report further stated that a notice of application submitted to the Federal Court indicates the federal Attorney General received four notices during 2024 and 2025 flagging sensitive or potentially injurious information related to the case.

GANG'S SMART MOVES FAIL TO KEEP IT OUT OF POLICE POLICE NET; 6 ARRESTED FOR HIGH-PROFILE THEFTS

Diary Times Desk : Faridkot police have busted a notorious inter-district gang responsible for high-profile thefts across Punjab, with the arrest of six people. The police also recovered Rs 2.20 lakh in cash, along with a .32 bore revolver from their possession. The accused were identified as Mangal Singh, alias Akash of Ferozepur, already facing two NDPS cases, Nirmala Devi, of Ferozepur, Rita Rani of Fazilka, Pappu Singh, alias Toti of Fazilka, Sita Rani, Ferozepur, and Veer Singh, alias Veeru of Ferozepur. A daring robbery at an oil factory in Jaito on February 7 has triggered a police investigation and search operation against the accused after they had stolen Rs 15.50 lakh in cash, a licensed revolver, and important documents. SSP Dr. Pragya Jain said the gang employed highly sophisticated and deceptive tactics to mislead the police: The female members of the gang would conduct "recce" (spying) during the day at factories, shops, and houses to identify targets.

PUNJAB EX-MINISTER LALJIT BHULLAR, FATHER BOOKED AFTER WAREHOUSING OFFICIAL'S DEATH SPARKS ROW

Diary Times Desk : The Amritsar police on Sunday registered a case against former Punjab transport minister Laljit Bhullar after Punjab Warehousing Corporation district manager Gagandeep Randhawa committed suicide on Saturday. The incident has triggered a political storm in Punjab, with opposition parties targeting the AAP government. Prominent political leaders visited the aggrieved family at their house at Ranjit Avenue on Saturday. Besides Bhullar, his father Sukhdev Bhullar and personal assistant Dilbagh Singh have also been booked. They have been booked under Sections 108 (abetment to suicide), 351 (criminal intimidation) and 3(5) (common intention) of the BNS. In her complaint, Upinder Kaur, wife of the deceased, alleged that the former minister, his father and his PA allegedly assaulted her husband and even struck him with a pistol. She alleged that they humiliated him to the extent that he was forced to take his life.



PRO-PEOPLE BUDGET WILL BE PRESENTED ON MARCH 8: PUNJAB CM BHAGWANT MANN

Diary Times Desk : Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Singh Mann on Saturday said his government will present its fifth Budget on March 8, reiterating that it will once again be a "pro-people budget" focused on the welfare of every section of society. DELHI ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE SUMMONS TOP PUNJAB OFFICIALS OVER PRIVILEGE MATTER

Diary Times Desk : The Delhi Assembly's Privileges Committee on Saturday issued summons to three senior officials of the Government of Punjab – the Additional Chief Secretary (Home), the Director General of Police (DGP), and the Commissioner of Police, Jalandhar – directing them to appear in person before the committee on February 27. The summons has been issued under the relevant Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business of the House in connection with an ongoing privilege matter. The committee is scheduled to hold its sitting on February 27 to deliberate on issues arising from alleged remarks attributed to Atishi, Leader of Opposition in the Delhi Assembly. According to the Secretariat, the written replies submitted by the concerned Punjab officials pursuant to the committee's earlier directions have been taken on record and will be examined during the forthcoming sitting. However, the committee has reiterated that matters of privilege are personal to the individuals concerned and must be answered in their individual capacity, as conveyed earlier in the Secretariat's communication dated February 13.

YAMUNANAGAR'S TOWN AND PLANNING DEPARTMENT DEMOLISHES UNPAVED ROADS, DEMARCATION BLOCKS IN VYASPUR

Diary Times Desk : A team of Town and Country Planning department demolished several unpaved roads, demarcation blocks and damp proof course in an illegal colony in Vyaspur town of Yamunanagar district. The said unauthorised colony was being developed on the Vyaspur-Chhachhrauli road in Vyaspur town of Yamunanagar, which covered an area of about 2 acres.

District Town Planner (DTP) Rajesh Kumar said that the demolition action was initiated with the assistance of the district administration. "Following orders from the Deputy Commissioner Preeti, the demolition drive was carried out with the help of Duty Magistrate Sanjeev Kumar, Technical Assistant of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare Department and police force," said DTP Rajesh Kumar.

"Notices were issued to the defaulters as per rules under subsection-2 of the Controlled Area Act number-12 of 1963," the DTP said. He said that the defaulters did not comply with departmental orders. He further added that the landowners did not obtain the necessary permission before establishing this illegal colony, hence the demolition drive was carried out. He appealed to the general public that no one should buy or sell plots in illegal colonies.



Drones have already revolutionized warfare. They're about to do it again

Invention, it must be humbly admitted, does not consist in creating out of void, but out of chaos." Mary Shelley, "Frankenstein," 1818.

"War is chaos. It always has been. But technology makes it worse. It changes the fear." Pierce Brown, "Golden Son," 2015.

Drones – and artificial intelligence – have reshaped the modern battlefield and are about to do so again. Nowhere is that more evident than in Ukraine.

Invaded by Russia in 2022, outmanned and outgunned by one of the world's strongest militaries, Kyiv quickly proved that drones – in the air, on the ground, and at sea – could hold off a Russian victory that many expected within weeks, if not days.

But drones came to the forefront of warfare relatively recently, some analysts say, with the 2020 conflict between Armenia and Azerbaijan in Nagorno-Karabakh a major turning point.

Much like the Kalashnikov rifle in the previous century, mass adoption of drones became an asymmetric weapon of choice for forces facing long odds in global warfare, such as the Hamas militant group in Gaza; anti-junta rebels in Myanmar's civil war; and the militaries of poorer nations, including many in Africa.

But the Goliaths have caught up, while – according to one report – drug cartels the world over are innovating, improving and adapting drones to fight the narco-wars of the future.

"It's like gunpowder. That's how insanely it's changed the war," Patrick Shepherd, a former US Army officer, said of the advent of cheap aerial drones.

Its invention from chaos, as myriad regional conflagrations coincide with an era of unparalleled technological advance. It's probably just the beginning.

The evolution of drones

Drones aren't a recent invention. Britain and the United States experimented with radio-controlled unmanned aircraft during World War I, according to the Imperial War Museum in London.

"We were flying hundreds of drones over North Vietnam during the war," said Russ Lee, a curator in the aeronautics department at the National Air and Space Museum in Washington. During that Southeast Asian conflict in 1960s and early '70s, US forces began using drones for many of the same missions we see today – reconnaissance or carrying munitions, or for use as decoys and psy-ops platforms, according to the Imperial War Museum.

The US began widespread use of drones during Operation Desert Storm, the response to Iraq's 1990 invasion of Kuwait. The Tomahawk land-attack missile – a cruise missile but also an unmanned aerial vehicle as it can change course and target in-flight – saw its first combat in 1991.



Australia's About To Find Out

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU KICK MILLIONS OF TEENS OFF SOCIAL MEDIA?

It's August, and a show of hands in an auditorium filled with 300 students at All Saints Anglican School in Australia shows that few of the Grade 9 and 10 students sitting in plush red seats had heard of the country's impending ban on social media, much less how to prepare for it.



"People have basically thought, what is it we do offline? Do we let young people into strip clubs, into bars, buying alcohol, buying cigarettes? What are the norms that we have and what are the norms that we want to have online?"

"It's very important to save photos," Kirra Pendergast, founder of cyber safety organization Ctrl+Shift, lectures from the stage. "You need to prepare."

An alarmed murmur spreads around the room as the students realize what's about to be lost. "Can you get your account back when you turn 16?" one girl asks. "What if I lie about my age?" asks another.

Less than two weeks before the ban, we have more answers.

From December 10, sites

that meet the Australian government's definition of an "age-restricted social media platform" will need to show that they're doing enough to eject or block children under 16 or face fines of up to 49.5 million Australian dollars (\$32 million).

The list includes Snapchat, Facebook, Instagram, Kick, Reddit, Threads, TikTok, Twitch, X, and YouTube. The government says it's protecting children from potentially harmful content; the sites say they're already building safer systems.

Meta says it'll start deactivating accounts and blocking new Facebook, Instagram and Threads accounts from December 4. Under-16s are being encouraged to download their content.

Snap says users can deactivate their accounts for up to three years, or until they turn 16. Snap streaks – the daily swapping of photos of ordinary life, vacations, walls, foreheads, anything to signal an online presence – will end.

There's another sting in the ban, too, coming at the end of the Australian school year before the summer break in the southern hemisphere. For eight weeks, there'll be no school, no teachers – and no scrolling.

For millions of children, it could be the first school break they spend in years without the company of time-killing social media algorithms, or an easy way to contact their friends. Even for parents who support the ban, it could be a very long summer.

Other countries around the world are taking notes as Australia explores new territory that some say mirrors safety evolutions of years past – the dawning realization that maybe cars need safety belts, and that perhaps cigarettes should come with some kind of health warning.

As with any seismic step in social policy, there are cheer squads, naysayers and those who don't care what Australia – a country known to love rules – is doing to (and for) its children.

A Blue Schoolbag In A Mass Grave

SRI LANKA'S BLOODY PAST IS RE-EMERGING FROM THE SOIL

Two human skeletons lie entangled on the rough earth – the arms of one wrapped around the other's head, as though protecting them from danger. Simply known as numbers 177 and 178, their identities remain a mystery. They are among 240 human skeletal remains, including children and babies, uncovered at this mass gravesite in Chemmani in Sri Lanka's northern Jaffna district.

Tamils, who have lived in the north and east of Sri Lanka for thousands of years, are primarily followers of Hinduism, with a significant Christian minority population, but the commission determined that the fact the bodies were buried naked rules out customary Hindu burials. "There is a reasonable likelihood that the burials were unlawful and pursuant to extrajudicial killings," it said.

The war was fought along ethnic lines, pitting the majority Buddhist Sinhalese state against the predominantly Hindu ethnic minority rebels fighting for a separate Tamil homeland in the north and east after years of anti-Tamil violence. The Tigers were ultimately defeated. Atrocities were committed by both sides, according to the United Nations, which estimates up to 100,000 people were killed in the conflict, with thousands of others forcibly disappeared.

Sixteen years after the war ended, families of the victims and missing are still fighting for justice and accountability.

"One day the truth will come," said V S Niranjan, a lawyer representing relatives of people who went missing in Jaffna.

A blue school bag
Just a stone's throw from a main road, the Chemmani gravesite is one of more than 20 mass graves identified in Sri Lanka.

Many of the gravesites that pockmark the north and east of the country are believed to contain the victims of atrocities committed during the civil war. Caught between warring rebel fighters and the Sri Lankan army, the Tamil community in these regions bore the brunt of the violence.

The military occupied Jaffna from 1995 until the end of the war. Chemmani first gained international attention in 1998 when Sri Lankan soldier former Lance Cpl. Somaratne Rajapakse, who was on trial for the rape and murder of schoolgirl Krishanthi Kumaraswamy, confessed that hundreds of Tamils had been buried there after the Sri Lankan army retook Jaffna.

For decades, the mass grave remained hidden until construction workers clearing land in the grounds of a Hindu cemetery in February unearthed human skeletal remains.

Their discovery prompted a court-ordered forensic excavation of the site in May and June, which initially uncovered 19 skeletons. Since then, the bones of hundreds more people have been found.

A baby's milk bottle, a blue schoolbag, bangles and cloth fragments have been uncovered alongside the bones.

More than 90% of the remains had no form of clothing. The bodies were buried in a disordered way, heaped together in shallow graves of 1.5-2 feet, according to the Human Rights Commission of Sri Lanka, an independent national body that investigates violations of fundamental rights.



MY VENICE: BIANCA ARRIVABENE, DEPUTY CHAIRMAN OF CHRISTIE'S ITALY

Diary Times Desk : The build-up to the Venice Biennale is my favourite time of year. Over the coming months, many of our most important clients will pass through the city. Delegations from all the different countries, as well as curators, gallerists and artists, are already in town, working on their shows. Sitting in a café, you may overhear conversations about this piece of art or that installation. You hear about which artists are coming and their plans, and your imagination starts running wild.

There are so many shows to look forward to. I can't wait to see Jenny Saville at Ca' Pesaro, Marina Abramović at Gallerie dell'Accademia, Lorna Simpson at Punta della Dogana, Michael Armitage at Palazzo Grassi and the Peggy Guggenheim show at Palazzo Venier dei Leoni – along with the Biennale itself, of course.

I was a teenager when I first visited the Biennale. I found it exhilarating, and I knew I wanted to be part of this huge organisation that involved artists from all over the world, each of them with something important to say.

Start the Biennale with a coffee at Paradiso right at the entrance of the Giardini. Get there early, before the gates open, and think about which artists you would like to see. Make the Central Pavilion your first destination of the day and take it from there.

If you sit in Harry's Bar long enough, you'll see everyone in town. All the artists, curators, collectors and celebrities pass through those doors at some point during the Biennale. Caffè Florian on Piazza San Marco is another good people-watching spot. Go there at sunset and you'll see the whole art world walk by.

The brand new kid in town is Do Farai, a lovely, tiny trattoria in the Dorsoduro neighbourhood where the food is yummy. Enjoy a drink in the Campiello dei Squelini, before or afterwards, to experience Venetian perfection.

The best focaccia comes from Dal Non Colussi bakery in Calle Lunga San Barnaba. It is a family business that was started by the grandfather in 1956 and is now run by the granddaughter, the lovely Marina. It's very special. Any waterfront café will give you a taste of Venetian life, but for a sense of the real Venice you should head to the Rialto fish market on a Saturday morning. Have a spritz at Naranzaria, just off the market square. They do great cicchetti and aperitifs.

Adrien Meyer, global head of Private Sales, and his team at Christie's have a very particular set of skills. They probably know more than anyone else about where the world's most important works of art are kept – and can connect their owners with willing buyers behind closed doors to broker deals beyond the auction saleroom.

In 2025, he oversaw the equivalent of four transactions a day, conducted via an international network of 500 specialists spread across 40 departments, ranging from antiquities to wine, Chinese ceramics to handbags, and rare books to contemporary art. Still signing contracts on 31 December, his team made \$1.5 billion worth of private sales – a quarter of Christie's total sales in 2025. The previous year, private sales were up 41 per cent: proof that if an object exists, chances are Meyer and his Private Sales team can match it with a buyer.

'My job is to hunt for works of art. But unlike auctions, where you act on behalf of the seller, private sales are more focused on the buyer,' he says. 'We get to know their tastes, patterns, needs, then find things that might interest them.'

It's a skill Meyer has acquired over the course of more than 25 years in the business. 'From the age of seven, every weekend my father would take me to the local salerooms in Paris,' he recalls. 'I was fascinated by the atmosphere and the chance of a discovery.' After studying at the Ecole du Louvre, Meyer began working in the world of auctions around 2000, joining Christie's European Furniture department four years later. In 2010, he moved to the Impressionist and Modern Art department in New York, before taking the reins of Private Sales in 2019. Despite the department's discreetness, it has existed since the very beginning. In 1779, the company's founder, James Christie, negotiated the private sale of around 200 paintings from the collection of Britain's first prime minister, Robert Walpole, to Catherine the Great for £40,500 – works that are now a key part of the Hermitage collection. Many buyers still have similar motivations today, says Meyer. A collector might approach him because they require a particular period Basquiat to fill a gap in their collection, or a Richter to hang above their mantel in time for a party at the weekend. A decorator might be urgently seeking a Roman marble to furnish a project that can't wait until the next auction season, or someone could be looking for a Birkin bag for their partner's birthday the next day. Then there are those burdened with 'underbidder regret'.
